## Capital Punishment?

The issue is between people who are certain that only the electric chair, the gas chamber, and the gallows protect us from an overwhelming horde of criminals, and others who consider these grim devices the stamp of a brutal and primitive society.

The number of executions in the United States has fallen from one hundred and ninety-nine (199) in 1935 to fifteen (15) in 1964. In many states which still retain capital punishment no one has been put to death for decades. As our civilization advances the use of the penalty will continue to decline.

Today, it is chiefly the indigent, the friendless, the Negro, and the mentally ill who are sentenced to death. Or the young. Only in 1964 Georgia raised the age limitation for execution to sixteen; it was formerly ten.

A total of 3,849 prisoners have been executed under civil authority in the United States from 1930 through 1964.

At the close of 1964, capital punishment was illegal in nine States of the Union. Oregon in 1964 became the latest State to abolish the death penalty, when a public referendum carried with sixty percent (60%) of the vote in the November election. Michigan abolished capital punishment in 1846 for all crimes except treason, and in 1963 also eliminated the death penalty for this offense. North Dakota abolished capital punishment in 1915, Minnesota in 1911, Maine in 1887, Wisconsin in 1853, and Rhode Island in 1852. Alaska and Hawaii eliminated the death penalty in 1957, shortly before achieving statehood.

However, two of these States retain the death penalty for certain exceptional crimes. North Dakota provides the death penalty for treason, as well as for first degree murder committed by a prisoner serving life sentence for first degree murder. Rhode Island has a mandatory death sentence for prisoners convicted of committing murder while serving a life sentence for any offense. Eleven of the fifteen executions in 1964 were by electrocution, and the remaining four were carried out in the gas chamber. Among the jurisdictions which retain the death penalty, twenty-four (24) prescribe electrocution, eleven (11) lethal gas, seven (7) hanging, and one shooting or hanging. Executions ordered by the Federal Courts are carried out in accordance with the method used by the State in which the sentence is imposed. If the laws of the State prohibit capital punishment, the court designates another State in which the sentence is to be carried out. 0

Of the fifteen (15) men executed in 1964, nine were sentenced for murder and six for rape. Eight of those executed were white and seven were Negro; five whites and four Negroes were sentenced for murder, and three whites and three Negroes for rape.

Two thousand and sixty-four (2,064), or 53.6 percent, of the 3,849 prisoners executed in the United States from 1930 through 1964 were Negro, 1,743 or 45.3 percent were white, and 42 or 1.1 percent were of other races.

Executions for murder account for 3,325, or 86.4 percent, of the executions carried out under civil authority in the United States since 1930. These were divided almost evenly between whites and non-whites. There were 455 executions for rape during the 35 year period, and 407, or 89.5 percent of these were non-white.

## Executions, State of Indiana 1897 - 1967

Although currently (May 1967) there are seven men "under sentence of death" at Indiana State Prison, there has not been an execution in Indiana since 1961.

During the sixty-four year period between 1897 and 1961 there have been a total of seventy-two (72) men executed for capital offenses in Indiana. Of these, thirteen were hanged during the period 1897-1907. Subsequent to passage by the Indiana General Assembly of an act specifying electrocution as the mode of execution, March 15, 1913, the remaining fifty-nine (59) were put to death in that manner.

The General Assembly passed the following Act: "An Act to amend sections 310 and 314 of an Act entitled, 'An Act Concerning Public Offenses', approved March 10, 1905."

#### DEATH PENALTY — ELECTROCUTION

Section 1: Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana that Section 310 of the above entitled Act to be amended to read as follows:

Death Penalty — How inflicted — Executioner. The punishment of death prescribed by law shall be inflicted in every case by causing to pass through the body of the convict a current of electricity of sufficient intensity to cause death, and the application and the continuance of such current through the body of such convict until such convict is dead. The death penalty shall be inflicted before the hour of sunrise upon such day, not less than one hundred (100) days after conviction, as the court may adjudge. The warden of the state prison, or, in case of his death, disability, or absence, his deputy, shall be the executioner.

Death Penalty—Execution inside Prison. The execution shall take place inside the walls of the Indiana State Prison, in a room arranged for that purpose. It shall be the duty of the warden and the board of trustees of such prison to provide the necessary room and appliances to carry out the electrocution as provided in this act.

Death Penalty—Who may be present. The following persons may be present at the execution, and none other: The warden and such persons as may be necessary to assist him in conducting the execution; the directors of the prison; two (2) physicians, including the prison physician; the spiritual adviser of the condemned; the friends of the condemned person, not exceeding ten (10) in number, that he may request shall be admitted.

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## INDIANA STATE PRISON ELECTRIC CHAIR

The present electric chair at the Indiana State Prison was contsructed out of parts taken from the defunct hangman's scaffold. The back and legs of the chair were formed from braces and uprights of the scaffold, while the seat and arms were made from the platform. Actual construction of the chair was performed by two prisoners, working under the superivsion of the prison's contstruction foreman of four decades ago.

New York's famous Sing Sing Prison and the Ohio State Prison were both visited and sketches were made of the electric chairs used in those institutions. Indiana's electric chair is patterened after Ohio's, with one exception. Ohio's official execut oner suggested that some other means than leather straps be found to secure the condemned man in the chair, since on several occasions in his experience the condemned man jerked loose from the straps when the electricity hit him. Indiana was the first state to adopt "iron rods" in place of leather straps to hold the condemned man in place in the electric chair during an execution.

#### Summary of Men Executed

The following study is a brief survey of the seventy two (72) executions carried out in the State of Indiana since 1897. The data contained in this study has been abstracted from the official records compiled and kept on all men committed to the Indiana State Prison.

Much of this source material, particulerly that of a biographical nature, was provided by the inmates themselves and is often times unconfirmed, contradictory, and of questionable validity. In this study we have made no attempt to confirm the validity of the source material, or attempted to reconcile such contradictory maerial as we have come across.
