

JUDGES' REPORT FOR STATE AWARDS.

The Board of Architect Judges recommended the Indiana State Building for an award "for beauty of design and merit in display of its material and for its careful construction."

STATE AGRICULTURAL EXHIBIT.

The samples of wheat, corn, oats, and all varieties of grass seeds were very superior in quality and displayed in a very artistic and ornamental way in glass jars of different sizes, and so arranged in the pavilion as to form pyramids twenty feet in height. There were sixty varieties of wheat in jars and eighty varieties in straw; forty varieties of corn in grain and stalk; twelve varieties of oats, two of rye, two of buckwheat, one of sugar cane, one of hemp, one of millet, ten of orchard grass, one of flax seed, five of beans, five of peas, one of peanuts.

The exhibit was excellent in quality, and all the grain plump, and fine in color, fully complying with all the rules, giving data as to growing and cultivation of the grain on exhibition. I recommend an award.

INDIANA BUILDING STONE EXHIBIT.

I report that this exhibit has been examined by me. It is a good exhibit of the chief building stone of the State. The specimens, dressed cubes, etc., of various sizes, up to twelve inches, are chiefly oolitic limestone of sub-carboniferous age, and together with slabs and smaller blocks representing some forty quarries, afford an excellent idea of the quality and general character of this product. The collection is rendered more instructive by the accompanying colored geological map, showing the location and the distribution of the developed quarries.

The exhibit of the Bedford Quarries Company is deserving of especial mention, and the whole of an award.

INDIANA COAL EXHIBIT.

I report that the Indiana exhibit of bituminous coals represented by cards No. 9,366 to 9,379, inclusive, is intended to be a collective one, as shown by the accompanying letter from the gentlemen in charge of same.

This exhibit consists of twelve large blocks of bituminous coal, one large polished slab of cannel coal and broken coal and coke made from the same. These exhibits are representative of the large Indiana coal fields, which are 7,000 square miles in area, and extends entirely across the State from north to south, in which coal beds range in thickness from six inches to eleven feet, and averaging four feet. The coals of this field are mined on a very large scale and are extensively used in the central West, where they are known as Indiana block coals.

The cannel coal is accompanied by an analysis showing it to be of excellent quality.

I consider this collective exhibit worthy of an award, because it is an instructive and excellent presentation of the coal and coal beds of Indiana.

INDIANA OOLITIC LIMESTONE EXHIBIT.

I report that this exhibit, and all other individual exhibits of Indiana oolitic limestone, constitutes a collective State exhibit, this classification being in accordance with the wishes of the gentleman in charge of the Indiana State exhibit.

This collection consists of cubes, slabs, rectangular and irregular masses of oolitic stone, rough and variously dressed, lettered, ornamented and polished. The specimens are taken from various quarries, operated by different firms, representing all the oolitic limestone deposits.

A close examination of the stone shows that it consists of minute granules, mixed with occasional large and regular fossil fragments, the latter being smaller than the fossil fragments of the Bowling Green; Ky., oolitic.

Two colors are distinguishable, *i. e.*, buff and blue, the latter as a rule coming from a greater depth than the former.

Analysis of two specimens of Indiana oolitic limestone made by Professor F. N. Clark, of the United States Geological Survey.

Absorption test gave for the buff 0.72 per cent, and for the blue 0.44 per cent. Crumbling strength for both colors, 14,000 pounds to the cubic inch, as determined by the United States government. The weight of the blue, 170 pounds to the cubic foot. A freezing test, conducted by Mr. J. A. Tanner of the Louisville Polytechnic Institute, gave very satisfactory results.

One of the items of the collection is a single block, carved, representing, in a single piece, an anvil, hammer, chain with lock, key and staple and cog-wheel.

This carving shows well the capabilities of this stone for ornamental work. A number of blocks and a slab were polished, the surface reflecting the light brilliantly, and showing clearly the fossil outlines.

The supply of stone is inexhaustible, and can be taken out in large masses, the largest block thus far removed being twelve feet long by six feet three inches in the other dimensions.

The methods of quarrying adopted are fully up to date, and involve the use of steam channelers and subsequent sawing into blocks and planing, if necessary, with steam planers. The history of these quarries shows that the first was opened in 1855, the second in 1857, the third in 1867, the fourth in 1877. While it is evident that the stone has been known locally for forty years, it is equally true that its national reputation has been built up within the last ten years.

The rapidity with which the stone has become popular over a wide area of the United States is the best kind of evidence as to its merit.

The stone has been used in the leading cities in all parts of the United States for buildings both public and private, there being in New York City alone thirty-eight or more public buildings which are entirely or in part constructed of this stone.

This stone is recommended for an award on the following grounds:

Purity of composition.

Homogeneity as shown by outcrops and use in buildings.

Susceptibility to ornamentation and polishing, and for the rapidity with which it has grown in popular favor as a structural material for both rough and ornamental construction in most of our large cities.
