OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 9.—Slowly but surely Jack Walton, self-appointed czar and dictator of Oklahoma, who created a near reign of terror in this state by his autocratic actions and arming of questionable characters, is sinking into oblivion as the legislature waits to convene on October 17 to consider impeachment proceedings against the arrogant and dictatorial governor of this state. Two weeks ago The Fiery Cross stated that Walton's reign was tottering to ruin. The prophecy now being reached and Walton is all but a memory.

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MOB ATTACKS KLAN MEETING AT READING

MEN KNOCKED UNCONSCIOUS AS BRICKS ARE HURLED THROUGH WINDOWS

Police Battle for Six Hours in Effort to Curt Mob—Sensational Auto Chase Through Streets

READING, Pa., Oct. 8.—No more arrests have followed those made last week when, among others, P. J. McGovern, said to be the leader of the mob that attacked an alleged Klan meeting and attacked the attack after the alleged Klansmen left the building, was held by the police.

The police battled for six hours to quell the disturbance which started when a big rock was hurled through one of the windows and knocked unconscious a man who sat close to the window. The police of the mob again started when several alleged Klansmen were found in one of the downtown streets.

**ALLEGED SLAVE GIRL LIBERATED THROUGH INFLUENCE OF KLAN**  
 Sues Italian for \$25,000 After He Follows Her to Chicago From Louisiana  
 Defendant Admits He Shot Her "Two or Three Times"—Governor Parker's Name Mentioned  
 (Special to Fiery Cross)  
 HAMMOND, La., Oct. 6.—Marie Armstead, who followed to Chicago by Joseph Graziano, has sued the latter for \$25,000 following her release by the courts in Chicago. The girl testified in Chicago that Graziano attacked her when she was 17 years of age and had been held her in virtual slavery. She had run away from her master several times, she said, and that once he had shot her. Graziano said he had shot her "two or three times." It was stated here that the Ku Klux Klan was instrumental in creating a sentiment that finally resulted in the girl being liberated. It is said here that the situation had long been known. The Klan was mentioned in the hearing held in Chicago.  
 The following press dispatch was received here under a Chicago date line last week:  
 Judge David today granted a writ of habeas corpus in behalf of Marie Armstead, fugitive 20-year-old girl from Hammond, La., and ordered her freed. At the same time, the court caused her three pursuers from Hammond, Joe Graziano, attorney; Robert McGehee, and a deputy sheriff, arrested in a train by certain Klan deputies for their return to Louisiana.  
 Slander Purpose Seen  
 "The charges brought against this girl by this man are groundless," said the judge. "I see a slander purpose to take this girl back to Louisiana."  
 Judge David then ordered assistant state attorneys present to inform Governor Parker of Louisiana of the way he had been treated by certain citizens of Hammond, and that Governor Small of Illinois be informed of the facts to block any further attempts to extradite Marie Armstead of Hammond.  
 "As Graziano was leaving the court, he was served with a writ of injunction of the Illinois of a civil suit for \$25,000 damages in circuit court by the Armstead girl. She charges him with seduction, false arrest and inflicting personal injuries.  
 Legal Battle Set Up  
 What first appeared to be a commonplace effort to apprehend a servant charged with larceny from her employer, turned into a legal battle set up by some invisible power.  
 Marie Armstead faced her "master," Joe Graziano, in Judge David's court. But the girl was not a shrinking, fearful, unwilling witness. Rather it was Graziano, who first set himself up as the aggrieved complainant, who was apologetic, backward, hesitant. When the hearing began, having been coached yesterday, Judge David inquired of Robert McGehee, a lawyer who came up from Louisiana with Joe Graziano and a deputy sheriff, how he came to be present in court.  
 Governor Parker Mentioned  
 "Your honor," said the Southerner, "I was asked by the Governor of Louisiana to be here to press the prosecution of this girl. I represent the state."  
 He immediately followed this statement with the astounding information that he was brought along by Graziano and that Graziano is paying his expenses.  
 Graziano was put on the stand and sworn. He testified that the girl came to him three and a half years ago as a servant. He denied improper relations with her. Under cross-examination, however, Graziano hesitatingly admitted that he "shot the girl two or three times."  
 "I thought she was a burlar one night," he said casually.  
 Graziano, under cross-examination by Assistant State's Attorneys Milton Smith and Michel Romano, admitted that the rix he at first said the girl stole, and was worth \$1,000 was worth only about \$250. Graziano became nervous as the cross-examination proceeded, and said that he went to Baton Rouge, after Marie had fled from Hammond and "saw some people about papers" to bring her back.  
 Received a Telegram?  
 "While I was there I got a telegram from the best people in Hammond saying that I would have to track her and bring her back to Louisiana and send her to the pen."  
 Attorney Michel volunteered information about the Klan in his home town down in Louisiana but no attention was paid to it.  
 The hearing on Marie's petition for a writ of habeas corpus, which would free her and prevent the pursuers from Louisiana taking her back, continued.  
 Shot on Trying to Escape  
 Court room spectators, however, were of the opinion that Judge David would free the girl.  
 The girl swore that Graziano attacked her when she was 17 years old, and had since held her in a state of virtual slavery in his home in Hammond. She said she had run away from her master several times but that he always caught her and brought her back. Once, she said, he shot her when she ran away from him.  
 She declared that "outside parties" had agreed in her last attempt to get away from the slavery to which I was subjected."

**300 CANDIDATES AT LEWISTON, MONTANA**  
 Initiations Carried On by True Americans While Alien Opposition Gnashes Teeth  
 LEWISTON, Mont., Oct. 6.—Despite anonymous letters received by officers of Lewiston Klan No. 8, members of Montana, which declared that they would be killed if they attempted to hold any public naturalization ceremony, the greatest meeting of Klansmen ever held in Montana was staged at Lewiston last week.  
 Announcement of the meeting was made public a couple of weeks ago and the threats started to pour in. It was openly stated by several bootleggers and gamblers that the Klan meeting would be assaulted and broken up should it be held.  
 No Attempt at Violence  
 However, no attempt at violence was made when three thousand Klansmen gathered on the top of a hill ten miles west of the city and initiated 292 candidates in Lewiston Klan while 15,000 spectators looked on.  
 The element opposed to the Klan stood on the outside of the meeting using vile language and cursing the organization. Beyond this there was no trouble. The great crowd was served refreshments by the Lewiston Klan at the conclusion of the ceremonial and fireworks display.

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CROWD HEARS TALK ON KLAN AT ALLEGAN

ALLEGAN, Mich., Oct. 6.—The announcement that there would be a meeting of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan here last Wednesday resulted in the courthouse lawn being packed with persons who appeared anxious to hear about the great and famous organization.

Klan was warmly received by the crowd which was free with its applause. The ideals of the Klan, such as good citizenship, taxation, schools, and the separation of Church and State, were brought up by the speaker and the sentiment of the crowd seemed to be with him on the stand.

The directors of the Junior Klan are meeting with wonderful success, both in the large cities and in the country. The excellent quality of the character of these lads, from all over the two states mentioned, reports of the enthusiasm which is running rampant among the lads of hundreds of communities, which the organization is now in active operation.

Sentiment Being Created. Already the pressure being brought by these lads in creating sentiment for the Bible in the public schools, is being felt. The organization by improving on the lad's importance of the Bible and of attending church and Sunday school. TRIAL OF LEO HOGAN SET FOR OCTOBER 10

Has Been in Jail Under Heavy Bond Since Firing Into an Alleged Klan Meeting

(Special to Fiery Cross) ROCHESTER, Ind., Oct. 8.—The trial of Leo Hogan, arrested last summer for firing upon an alleged Klan meeting and wounding a man and a woman, and after firing three shots at the sheriff at Knox, Indiana, is scheduled to open in this city on October 10, a change of venue having been secured by his attorneys. It was believed at the time of his arrest that a plea of insanity would be entered when the trial opened. Whether or not this plan has been changed is not known.

Bitter Toward Klan. Hogan, who attended Indiana university, is an ex-secretary of the Knights of Columbus and has voiced bitter words against the Ku Klux Klan. His wild act of firing on unarmed persons peacefully attending a meeting in which there were many women, is but one of the many reported from all parts of the United States.

At the time of his arrest he was placed in the jail at Knox and after his hearing his bond was placed at \$20,000 or \$10,000 each on two accounts. This was never furnished and he was kept in the jail at Knox until brought to the jail in this city to be kept.

GOVERNOR WALTON IS FADING INTO OBIVION

of persons in the criminal class standing staunchly behind Walton is not to be denied. His pardon record has made him many friends in that connection.

In a letter to a Chicago newspaper, Rev. Rolf Pomeroy Crum, pastor of Trinity Episcopal Church, and secretary of the Methodist Alliance, bitterly denounced Governor Walton and declared the governor's sympathies were all with the underworld.

"Walton Nullified Courts" "Walton's record for paroles and pardons," declared Reverend Crum, "has practically nullified the work of the courts. To date this year he has granted fifty-eight pardons and ten hundred and forty-seven paroles. Former Governor Robertson was had enough, but Governor Walton has far surpassed him. He has nullified the laws of the jails to dangerous gunmen, who are running at large in this state. He has given freedom to no visible reason, to bootleggers, dope sellers and other law violators who have hardly served a day in jail. He has made a mockery of our courts and of justice, even going into county jails, freeing criminals without waiting for them to reach the state penitentiary."

This scathing denunciation of the acts of Walton is voiced throughout the state by the citizenry. Very few acts are those which brought about his downfall even though other acts were committed by Governor Oklahoma. Two months ago the state of Oklahoma, and especially the city of Tulsa, has seen freedom, abiding and prosperous. The best city and county administration Tulsa had ever had was in operation working toward the common good. Statistics prove that there were fewer murders, fewer holdups and other law violations than ever before. The bootleggers and women of low character had been driven out of town.

Swooped Down on Tulsa. It was then that Governor Walton swooped down on the peaceful city of Tulsa and Tulsa county with martial law, declared the city and county in a state of insurrection and demanded the resignation of certain city and county officials, who said were in league with the Ku Klux Klan. In two months of martial law there has not been one disturbance or altercation in which a citizen or soldier has been killed or wounded and most of the time there has been no company of soldiers, two men entering military law in Tulsa. As one citizen put it, "It speaks well for the Klan," "But it is especially so in the face of the fact that Governor Walton and his followers have made many boasts and many boasts."

The Dying Gargle. The "fight" now being planned by Governor Walton to forestall any move against him in a legal way, and the dying gargle of a drowning man and the last stab at grandstanding before the people of Oklahoma and America.

The mere fact his name has faded from the front pages of the large daily newspapers and from some of the smaller ones, is the surest sign that he is forever politically dead and his aspirations to be a senator have "died absorbing."

(Continued From Page 1) above every other consideration, has to take girls, between the ages of twelve and eighteen, into the Women of the Ku Klux Klan, instead of into the Junior Klan where the donation is but one dollar.

The Women of the Ku Klux Klan is a separate and distinct organization and is not affiliated with the Junior Klan which is for boys and girls between the ages of twelve and eighteen. And in turn, those two organizations are separate and wholly apart from the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan. These girls who have been exploited, however, have been made members of the Junior Klan at a donation two dollars less than that which was paid.

Restitution Is Demanded. Restitution by these abhorers of patriotism is demanded. By the Fiery Cross which is for real patriots, not the impostors or impostors, or both, have returned to these girls and boys the money wrongfully taken from them.

It should be remembered by the readers of The Fiery Cross that there are three groups of patriots, all separate and apart from the Women of the Ku Klux Klan. One is the Women of the Ku Klux Klan, the members of which must be women over eighteen years of age. Another is the Junior Klan, for boys and girls of the ages of twelve to eighteen. The Junior Klan is composed of two divisions, a division each for the boys and for the girls. The donation for each is three dollars. The donation for the Women of the Ku Klux Klan, which is not affiliated with either of the two other organizations, is five dollars.

The following appeared in the editorial columns of the New York Tribune on October 11: "Governor Walton, defeated by his countrymen by a vote of some five to one, continues to bang his drum and declaim against 'the invisible empire' of the Klan. Meantime, with the aid of his personally appointed private police, he is still hanging to the last shreds of his own 'visible empire' as dictator of the state of Oklahoma."

"It is not likely that after this overwhelming defeat even so colossal a pretender can last long. Events are gently but firmly taking the Governor by the collar and hoisting him out of the gubernatorial chair. ILLINOIS LEADS IN CLAIMS OF SOLDIERS

Establishes Precedent for Other States—Bonds Issued for Bonus for Bonus SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Oct. 6.—Establishing a precedent among the states of the Union, Illinois will issue soldier bonus bonds in payment of \$57,000 soldier bonus bonds in payment of the next allotment of \$15,000,000 of bonds is sold here October 16. The \$15,000,000 bonds will be offered at 4 1/2 per cent, an increase from the 4 1/4 per cent, which failed to get a bidder at the last three auctions.

According to information from the American Legion headquarters in Indianapolis no other state has issued bonds in payment of soldier claims. Thus far the Illinois state recognition board has approved a total of \$19,203,007.50, of which \$10,000,000 have been paid.

That leaves claims totaling \$5,203,007.50 ready to be paid as soon as the money becomes available by the October 16 sale.

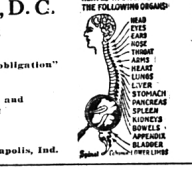

WILL PROBE STRANGE DEATHBED STATEMENT

Grand Jury to Investigate Following Reports That Odd Circumstances Prevailed NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—The chemical analysis made by Dr. Alexander O. Gettler, Bellevue hospital toxicologist, of the body of Mrs. Gertrude Emily Gorman Webb, revealed that the quantity of mercury contained in the organs examined was insufficient, alone, to have caused her death. Mrs. Webb died the evening of Sept. 25, last, in the Westchester-Biltmore Country Club at Rye under circumstances that led her relatives and friends to suspect she had been murdered with slow poison.

Sends Report to Coroner Dr. Gettler completed his preliminary tests today and forwarded a full report to Coroner Edward F. Fitzgerald of Westchester county, who consulted with District Attorney Arthur Rowland in the courtroom yesterday. Neither Dr. Gettler, Coroner Fitzgerald, nor District Attorney Rowland would disclose any part of the bulky report compiled by Dr. Gettler and his assistants at the Bellevue hospital laboratories, but the nature of the report was learned from experts who had been in constant touch with the examinations.

Dr. Meyer Tells of Deathbed While the Westchester authorities were engaged in studying the chemical report, Dr. William J. Meyer, who attended Mrs. Webb at her country club, and who declined to sign a death certificate, saying he believed death had come under suspicious circumstances, warranting an immediate autopsy, told reporters in an interview the details of the deathbed statement of Mrs. Webb.

Grand Jury to Be Told He quoted in detail what he could remember of the alleged deathbed statement and said he would supply the grand jury next Monday certain facts of the incident which he had forgotten during his testimony before that body last Tuesday.

Relatives and friends of Mrs. Webb, with their attorneys, decided to forego their previous plan of asking Gov. Smith to appoint a special deputy attorney-general to take over the investigation into Mrs. Webb's death.

Legion Resents the Laxity at Cemetery "Poor Box" is Kept at Gate in France and Conditions are Deplorable, Says Spafford NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—An investigation of what he says are the deplorable conditions of the American Military Cemetery of Belleau Wood, France, will be demanded of Congress by Edward E. Spafford, New York state commander of the American Legion, said recently.

Commander Spafford expressed indignation that a "poor box" is kept at the entrance to the cemetery for solicitation of funds from foreign and American visitors to maintain the grounds where 2,170 American soldiers and marines are sleeping.

The Legion commander's statement was based upon a dispatch to an afternoon newspaper from Paris describing the state of the cemetery as pitiful because appropriations of Congress were insufficient. It said officials of the Graves Registration Service in France knew nothing of the "poor box" and thought it might be a device of French laborers to extract tips.

Ground Is Bare The Paris dispatch quoted American visitors to the cemetery as saying that the ground was bare and resembles the foundation construction of a New York skyscraper.

Expressing gratitude that the condition had been revealed, Commander Spafford said the Legion would demand punishment of every American who has been guilty of neglect of duty. He said the Legion had been promised that the cemetery would be placed in perfect condition last summer.

OTHER STATES SHOULD SEE THE LESSON

(From the Cleveland Plain Dealer) Oklahoma's turbulent experiences in trying to bring its governor to the bar of public opinion to answer for his conduct calls attention to a situation which exists in practically every state, perhaps in every federal state in the Union. In few states if anywhere is provision made for bringing the legislator into special session by any other process than by call of the governor. If the governor happens not to want such a session his constituents are helpless. Ohio and the other states need a constitutional provision similar to that indorsed at the polls in Oklahoma on Tuesday, which provides a method for investigating the conduct of officials subject to impeachment and for such action as the law state officials warrant. The members of the house is sufficient to call the special session. General legislation at a session thus called is forbidden.

State constitutions, with few if any exceptions, have followed the practice of calling a special session to the governors exclusive authority to summon a special legislative session when in his judgment such a session is desirable. They make no allowance for such a situation as developed in Oklahoma.

A similar situation might develop in Ohio or in any other state. Were a governor of Ohio suddenly to announce editorial ambitions, call on the national guard without ample provocation or do anything else which the people of the state believed dangerous to their peace and welfare—assuming the legislature were not then in session—the state to curb or punish him.

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TEAR BOMBS READY AT LAFAYETTE, IND.?

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KU KLUX MEETING OVERFLOWS HALL 5,000 on Outside Unable to Get In—Speaker Cheered Continuously at Worcester, Mass.

WORCESTER, Mass., Oct. 6.—One of the most successful Klan meetings ever held here filled Mechanics Hall last night with an overflowing crowd of Americans who were all anxious to hear more of the famous orator. The crowd filled every seat on the main floor and in the balcony of the big auditorium and a crowd estimated from three to five thousand gathered on the outside but were unable to wedge their way in. The police department sent 110 officers to the vicinity of the hall while the crowd was gathering, but as the mass of people were mostly Americans there was no trouble of any kind.

Responsive Audience The speaker proved his ability as a dramatic orator and found a responsive audience. When he recited a poem on Americanism at the conclusion of his talk, a quartet sang softly from an adjoining room, their voices blending with the tones of the leader in such a manner as to create a lasting impression.

The crowd sat spellbound at the conclusion of the poem and for a minute, it seemed, there was absolute silence. Then came tremendous applause.

The speaker began his address by saying that his idea of an American was "one who owes his entire allegiance to our flag and country. 'No man is a good American,' he said, 'if his allegiance is divided.'"

A storm of applause and cheers swept through the hall at this remark, showing he had struck upon the sentiments of the entire crowd. The crowd roared with laughter a few minutes later when he pointed to where a number of newspaper men sat, and said: "We have the press with us tonight."

After the laughter had subsided, he said the reporters were not responsible for what went into the papers and that they were the brains of the profession.

Press Can Not Hurt Klan He also said that the press of today was not big enough to hurt the Ku Klux Klan and that it was fast becoming accredited by the people because they could not believe what they read in it. "That is why the mass of people are preparing to lay down the old press and support the new," he said.

Fifteen Hundred Candidates The candidates, numbering about 1,500, came forward before the altar in a seemingly endless stream and the gigantic crowd cheered them wildly as they passed.

The most spectacular sight of the evening came just before the initiation ceremonies took place, when an airplane with an electric fiery cross across and circled the field. The cheers were deafening when this took place.

The Imperial Representative of the Klan was the main speaker of the evening and his talk was interrupted many times by loud and long applause from the enthusiastic crowd.

Taken all in all, it was a wonderful day for Klansdom in Texas and when the great crowd began to make their way homeward, it was with the thought that the day had been more than well spent.

**OREGON SCHOOL LAW MISQUOTED BY FOES**

**Public Schools Must Be Attended During Term—Private School Not Taboo**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—The Oregon school law, which may be taken to court for test as to constitutionality, attracts much attention from national capital educators.

That the law is misquoted by its enemies, and not well understood by the general public, is contended by its friends, who maintain that it will not, as charged, abolish the private school.

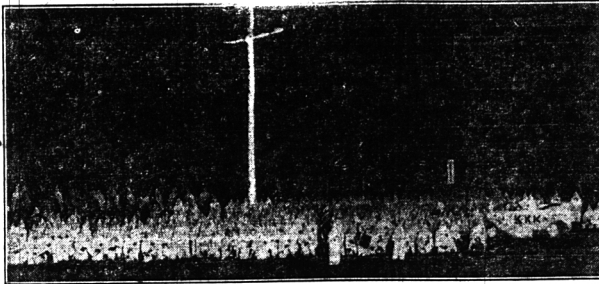
In support of this contention many quote the phrases of the law which state, not that a child may not attend a private school, but that parents or guardians must send children to the public school during its term. Nothing is said about sending a child to a private school at other times. A further quotation showing that the private school is not eliminated by the law reads that "in the

following cases children shall not be required to attend public schools.

**Written Permission Necessary**  
"Any child who is being taught for a like period of time by the parent or a private teacher such subjects as are usually taught in the first eight years in the public school; but before such child can be taught by a parent or a private teacher, such parent or private teacher must receive written permission from the county superintendent, and such permission shall not extend longer than the end of the current school year. Such child must report to the county school superintendent or some person designated by him at least once every three months and take an examination in the work covered. If, after such examination, the county superintendent shall determine that such child is not being properly taught, then the county superintendent shall order the parent, guardian, or other person to send such child to the public school the remainder of the school year."

**Board of Education Passes Resolution Demanding Scriptures Be Read Children**

FAIRMOUNT, Ind., Oct. 8.—At a meeting of the county board of education in this city on last Tuesday, a resolution was passed wherein Albert R. Hall, county superintendent of schools, was instructed to prepare a course of Bible study and present each teacher in the county schools with a copy. This resolution puts the Bible into all schools throughout the county under the jurisdiction of the board.

**The Resolution**  
The resolution, as passed, follows: "Whereas, the Holy Bible is the

foundation upon which our public schools were founded, and "Whereas, the Holy Bible has been discarded from our public schools, therefore, be it

Resolved, by the county board of trustees of Grant county, that the Holy Bible be again placed in our public schools, and a portion of it read to the schools by the teachers each day the schools are in session, the same to be read without comment by the teacher and in accordance with a course to be prepared for such reading. "The county superintendent of schools is hereby directed to prepare a course in Bible readings, and to present a copy of the course to each teacher in the county schools."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—Managing Director Meyer and Director Mondell of the war finance corporation and a representative of the department of agriculture were directed by President Coolidge to start immediately for the central northwest to discuss with the wheat growers of that section the formation of co-operative marketing associations which might avail themselves of government funds under the new rural credits act.

The war finance corporation officials and the department of agriculture representative will be charged with directing the formation of co-operative associations among the wheat growers similar to those which have been operated successfully among the cotton planters and tobacco growers of the south, the raisin growers of California and the fruit raisers of the Pacific coast.

**Funds Would Be Provided**  
The plan of the administration contemplates that upon organization of these co-operative associations funds which will enable them to market the present wheat crop in an

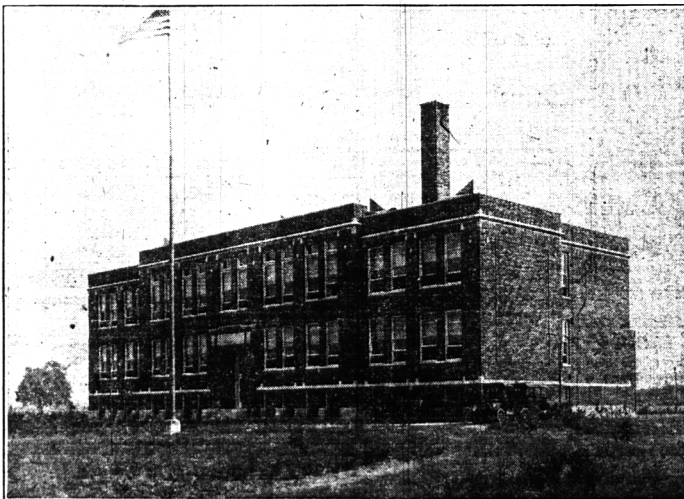

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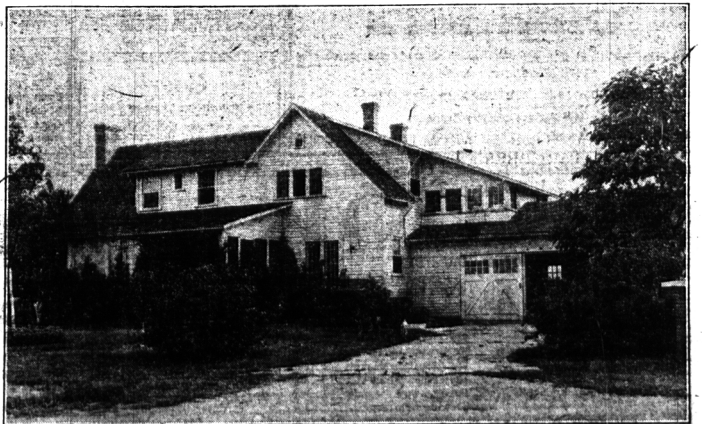

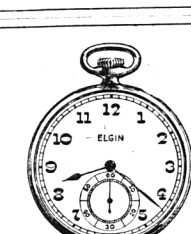
#### Heated Session of Township Trustees Results in Victory for Champions of Holy Writ

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### PROTESTANTS PARADE IN JERSEY CITY, N. J.

#### Twelve Thousand March Along Streets to Tunes of Inspiring Music

(Special to The Flery Cross) JERSEY CITY, N. J., Oct. 8.—The Protestant parade held in this city on last Saturday was the biggest ever staged by the churches of this county and a delegation from each was present in the line. It is estimated that more than 12,000 marchers were in line.

The military bearing of the women was freely commented upon all along the line of march. "It's their sense of rhythm," was the explanation of one bystander, a well-known musician.

Never has a parade in Jersey City been favored with more favorable weather than that of Saturday and early as ten in the morning people began to take their places on the boulevard, many providing themselves with canopies and bonnets for seats.

Wait Is Enlightened  
The long wait was enlightened by the passing of the many bands playing spirited marches on their way to the starting point, Pavilion avenue and the boulevard.

Soon after three o'clock the procession got under way, and headed by a platoon of mounted police units, Lieutenant Charlton, marched along the boulevard to Hudson County Park. After the police came the grand marshal, Rev. William Magar, and staff.

Then came the first division, consisting of the men of the county, headed by massed colors, as well as divisions. Walter ("Pop") Williams was the division marshal. Women of the churches constituted the second division, headed by Mrs. Floretta M. Henry. The men's organizations of the county came next, with John W. Shelby as marshal, and they were followed by a long double file of actors carrying those unable to walk in the leadership of George E. Entwistle. Charles E. Sweeney was chief of staff.

Distinctive Costumes Worn  
All the women's organizations wore distinctive costumes with a patriotic motive and the men's organization carried banners. The Junior Order was represented by several units and the P. O. S. of A. were out in force. Several uniformed drill teams were out and a contingent of kilted Highlanders preceded by a statueque drum major, attracted much attention and got lots of applause along the line. "Onward, Christian Soldiers," was the favorite marching tune, however, with all the bands and it was repeated time and again.

There were plenty of decorations along the route and most of the marchers carried flags, so that the scene in the park when the 12,000 paraders gathered about the speakers' stand was vivid with bright colors and exceedingly picturesque with its background of green provided by the close-cut grass.

Program Moves Smoothly  
Everything on the program moved smoothly, not a hitch being perceptible anywhere.

After the last unit had passed the reviewing stand the crowd moved in an orderly manner to the speaker's stand and grouped itself around it. Without any delay Captain Dabb mounted the stand and requested the assembly to join in singing "America." The crowd responded heartily with every head bowed. Chaplain Stanton then made the opening prayer. Captain Dabb then told in a few words the purpose of the annual gathering and said that the organization was not anti-anything, but was pro-Protestantism.

### MEYER TELLS HOW HE WOULD SECURE BANKS

#### Director of War Finance Corporation Says Institutions Do Not Respond Readily

(WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 6.—(Special.)—Officials of the federal reserve system have not displayed sufficient activity in inducing non-member state banks to come into the system, Eugene Meyer, Jr., managing director of the War Finance corporation, indicated lately before the joint congressional banking committee.

Not amendment, but better administration of the law is needed, declared Mr. Meyer, who said that the agricultural credit crisis of 1920 and 1921 could have been met to much better advantage if all the eligible nonmember banks, nearly 10,000, had been members of the federal reserve system.

Believes Bankers Will Help  
Basing his judgment on the successful efforts of the War Finance corporation to secure co-operation of the banking interests, Mr. Meyer said he believed that the bankers now outside the federal reserve system could be appealed to on the ground of broad public interest.

Mr. Meyer said he understood that at least one governor of a federal reserve bank had declared that the nonmember county banks were not wanted in the system. Representative McFadden, chairman of the joint committee, interrupted to state that a governor of a federal reserve bank had made such a statement to him within the last week.

Mr. McFadden and Representative Wingo both charged that there have been influences at work to keep bankers from participating in the present investigation of the reasons why nonmember banks have not joined the system.

Securing new members of the system is more a matter of administration than of law. If it were my job to recruit members, I would meet the parties in the case and discuss the matter with them. I would meet with the American Bankers' Association, with state bankers' associations and with state banking commissioners. I would ask for a definition of policy, the part of these different groups.

"In Washington we make a mistake not to ask the co-operation which I believe the bankers are willing to give. Our experience justifies the assertion that the situation will be better in the future if the member banks join the federal reserve system and do not depend on correspondent banks."

### LADIES HOLD BIG MEET AT GREENFIELD

#### City Crowded With Machines and People Jam Along Curbs to See Big Parade

GREENFIELD, Ind., Oct. 8.—One of the largest and most successful of the Ladies' Pro-sbyterian Ku Klux Klan ever held in the state, took place here last Saturday night when a parade was held and a large class of candidates initiated afterward.

The parade was a thing of beauty from start to finish and the dense crowds along the line of march cheered themselves hoarse as the marchers passed by. A company of mounted Klansmen in full regalia headed the march and were closely followed by the Ladies' Pro-sbyterian Klan, which rendered stirring music along the line of march.
