## CANDIDATE FOR ATTORNEY GENERAL OF INDIANA DISMISSED FROM KLAN

### "Bob" Moore Talked Himself Into Disfavor and Then Was Charged With Accepting a Bribe—A Crooked Trail Laid Bare.

Michigan City, Ind., April 2.—White John C. Farwell, Michigan City contractor, stands convicted in the LaPorte county circuit court, general H. Moore, former deputy prosecutor, and attorney Nathaniel Stern, charging them with receiving \$18 to dismiss against Farwell in the Michigan City case.

Following this action, according to the stories told, Moore was waited upon by a committee of the "Invisible Empire" read to him. Left to a vote, it is said, his removal was ordered by the organization.

Farwell will serve an indeterminate term in prison for having committed a criminal assault upon Mrs. Phillip Schuff of Michigan City. The grant of a pardon to Farwell was made at work. She is the mother of a baby 12 weeks old.

Subpoenaed by the state Friday were several Mishawakans and Mayor John A. Hibbard, banker, South Bend, who testified concerning Farwell's business enterprises in that city and Mishawaka prior to his coming here. Sackman, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, and James E. Kerwin, real estate broker.

The state endeavored to impeach Farwell's reputation for veracity and the testimony given by the South Bend and Mishawaka witnesses was regarded as damaging to the defendant's case.

Before coming to Michigan City, Farwell became seriously involved with prospective home builders and his departure from South Bend followed the filing of charges against him of obtaining money under false pretenses. The charges were never

### WEST INDIANAPOLIS LEAGUE DETERMINES TO COLLECT EVIDENCE AGAINST BOOTLEGGERS.

Private investigators may be employed by the Citizens League of West Indianapolis to clean that section of bootleggers.

## LA-FAYETTE RAID? POSSIBLE, BUT CHIEF OF POLICE AND MAYOR SURPRISED.

Lafayette, Ind., March 31.—That the Mayor and Chief of Police of Lafayette, who would not permit the Klan to parade, and even arrested innocent boys for tacking up a few signs announcing the parade, would permit a stunt of police headquarters, was simply out of the question.

## AW! LEW; QUIT KIDDING THE KLAN!

### ASK MIKE GLENN, HE KNOWS, AND HAS THE SAY.

No law now in effect can prevent the wearing of masks in public places, Taylor E. Groninger, city corporation counsel, asserted yesterday, following announcement by Mayor Lew Shank that he will take steps to have it stopped.

Mr. Groninger said the only law of the character is the "white cap" state law, which makes it unlawful for three or more persons to wear masks or other disguises when whipping another man or otherwise inflicting punishment illegally. This law, he explained, does not apply to demonstrations of the Ku Klux Klan, to which the mayor, however, has authority to pass any such law, according to Mr. Groninger, who may open the way for passage of an ordinance prohibiting the wearing of masks at any time except on Halloween night, according to several weeks ago by Councilman Otto Ray.

KLAN BUILDS HOSPITAL FOR OIL WORKERS

MAGNIFICENT BUILDING WILL BE CONSTRUCTED AT EL DORADO. The site upon which the hospital will be erected has not been selected as yet, but a location has been tentatively agreed upon.

Subscriptions for the hospital were started less than a month ago when the El Dorado, Ark., March 31.—The humanitarian act of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan is soon to be wrapped around the sturdy-bosomed of the oil and gas field workers of southern Arkansas and northern Louisiana.

Plans and specifications for the building are being donated by architects and contractors without cost to the Klan. James B. Erics and Son of El Dorado, Ark., has been selected as architect and contractor for the building.

Architect's plans call for a two-story and basement building, one ward to be placed in the underground chamber. In addition to the regular operating ward, a nurses' school is to be maintained, where student nurses will receive the same training as given in the hospitals of the first class, and upon the completion of their course will be given a graduation diploma.

On the most modern features of the hospital will be the operating rooms, which will be equipped with all the latest apparatus.

Three different types of wards are contemplated. One of them will be equipped with single and private baths, while another will accommodate two beds with other private facilities.

Just What Is The American Unity League?

THE FIERY CROSS IS IN POSSESSION OF, AND HAS DEFINITE PROOF THAT:

(1) The American Unity League, and its publication, called "Tolerance," are money-making enterprises and capitalize race hatreds and religious prejudices, and has political ambitions.

(2) The Roman Catholic Church has never yet officially endorsed or supported the League, and at the present time a few individuals, and some lay organizations of Catholics are its only support.

(3) Protestant and Jewish papers have repudiated the League because of its insincerity, and entire lack of honor, and its irresponsibility, and for the same reason reputable newspapers throughout the country are declining to print news furnished by them, or reprint articles credited to "Tolerance."

(4) The League's claim of large membership and great influence throughout the entire U. S. is not based on facts, as it has less than 10,000 members.

(5) Tolerance editors have no evidence of Klan membership against nine out of every ten names which they publish as being Klan members, and a recent list published in South Bend included two prominent Knights of Columbus.

(6) Agents for Tolerance have, however, stolen Klan memberships at the point of a gun, at one point in Indiana, and within the last forty-eight hours an alleged agent of the organization, at the point of a gun, threatened an organizer of the Women's Organization, and also a woman, at Rushville, and a representative of the Women's Organization, at the time of going to press, is unconscious and under the care of a physician after having been administered poison.

Haynes, federal prohibition commissioner. Applications for medicinal purposes have been filed with the prohibition unit.

It was said the large number of applications aroused the suspicions of the prohibition authorities as to whether the liquor was actually being used for medicinal purposes or whether it was simply a ruse of the liquor interests to withdraw whisky from bonded warehouses.

Authorities suspected that a lot of the liquor exported was finding its way back to the United States through illicit channels. Officials of the Anti-Saloon League suspected a plot of certain distillers to convert their stocks into money and decrease the "legitimate" supply so much that they would be allowed to start their distilleries going again.
