

VALPARAISO SCENE OF GIGANTIC PARADE

50,000 Throng City in Gigantic Frolic and Monster Parade

6,000 in Long Procession—Gorgeous Floats Bring Rounds of Applause

Excursions from Illinois, Ohio, Michigan and Indiana Points Are Jammed—Barbecue, Rodeo, Bands and Circus Stunts on Program—Speakers Cheered

(By Staff Correspondent)
VALPARAISO, Ind., May 19.—Before one of the largest crowds ever gathered in this place, and estimated at 50,000, the Ku Klux Klan paraded here tonight in a monster procession that took more than an hour to pass a given point. More than one-half the 6,000 marchers were with robes and practically all of those in their regular marching uniforms. In the procession were 600 members of the Women's Organization which lent much to the procession. The women presented a most charming sight and were widely cheered as they passed along the line of march, which extended over four miles. The Women's Organization furnished the galaxy of American flags for the occasion.

The parade was part of all-day festivities of the Ku Klux Klan, and which jammed the city with fun-seeking Klansmen from points in Indiana, Ohio, Michigan and Illinois. The parade formed at the fair grounds and marched through the city streets to the cheers of the throngs that crammed every available inch of the line of march. Multi-colored floats, decorated with flags and electric fire crosses and inspiring band music, presented a sight that will long be remembered by the citizens of this city and those who journeyed here from afar.

Heavy excursion trains began to arrive in the city early Saturday morning from points in Indiana, and came trains from other states. Thousands of Klansmen took advantage of the excursion rates of the railroads and one train with thirteen coaches discharged its hundreds of passengers from Indianapolis. Trains from Chicago were also packed.

1,000 Machines From Chicago

As early as five o'clock Saturday morning the roads leading to Valparaiso were thick with automobiles coming from every direction. By noon the restaurants and hotels were finding it difficult to take care of the thousands of guests. In the afternoon a big barbecue was being held. It was estimated that there were 1,000 automobiles from Chicago alone.

Valparaiso really welcomed the hosts that began sweeping down the city at sunrise. But never before had such a large throng of people, and number of visitors and the cafes, hotels and restaurants were taxed to their very utmost to handle the vast throng.

TEXAS GAMBLERS GET JOLT FROM THE KLAN

Another Victory Scored in Campaign to Clean Up Lone Star State

EL PASO, Tex., May 22.—The Ku Klux Klan, which has made such an enviable record in the preserving of law and order in Texas, has scored another victory in its campaign to keep the state clean.

The anti-gambling law has been notoriously violated and all the attendant evils, such as playing with funds belonging to another and run-

ning up of debts, have brought about a serious condition. Determined to stop the practice, the Klan set on the trail of the guilty persons. After a good bit of work the Klan found sufficient evidence to proceed and warrants were sworn out for a raid, and a not a headquarters by the gamblers, was raided. Thirty-five men were taken into custody.

Bets Freely Made The information received indicates that bets had been made freely on the races in Maryland, Kentucky and New York. It is expected that convictions will be numerous, and the grip of the gamblers has been dealt a serious blow. This victory for the Klan has added a little more, if it is possible, to the fine opinion in regard to it held by the law-abiding people of the state.

KLAN BURIAL HELD IN BUCYRUS, OHIO

BUCYRUS, Ohio, May 22.—What is thought to be the first funeral in Ohio at which the Ku Klux Klan was officially present, was held here last week when Milo M. Haines, former Boy Scout Commissioner, who died very suddenly, was laid to rest. The funeral was attended by an unusually large number of persons and while it is believed that the larger number of them were Klansmen, only those men acting as pallbearers wore the regalia of the order.

The six uniformed Klansmen stood at attention outside the residence as the services were held and at the conclusion of which they entered the house and bore the casket to the waiting hearse. They accompanied the cortege to the Oakwood cemetery and lowered the coffin into the grave.

Klan Retains Attorneys to Aid in Clean Up on Forces Selling Whisky Illegally

COLUMBIA CITY, Ind., May 22.—Whitley county prides itself as the driest county in Indiana and due acknowledgment of the services rendered is given the Ku Klux Klan.

Marchaled together are citizens of Columbia City and surrounding towns who demand a strict enforcement of the laws. Bootleggers are not wanted, and against these community lice the forces of the organization have been leveled. Moonshiners have been their particular prey. The sheriff police and the county prosecutor have been given aid of the kind needed to throttle the liquor peddlers.

Recently the Columbia City Klan retained attorneys to assist Prosecutor George O. Compton in the trial of three "hip pocket" vendors and the three penal farm sentences resulting kept Mr. Compton's record for convictions since the first year of the year at 100 per cent.

Klan Acquires Broaden With the broadening of the Klan's activities against "leggers" to this extent, there would seem nothing left to be done of the precedent-making character, but even this action was not the ultimate. Last week, they burrowed into sales of liquor at Churubusco and found the source of the wet supply coming from Green township, Noble county.

Sheriff Sam W. Steel of Whitley county was given the information. He got in touch with Sheriff Charles Black, Noble county, and together they visited the Green township farm. No one was home, but a search was made and a mammoth still, two barrels of mash, bottles, corks and other paraphernalia of a "moonshiner's" outfit were uncovered. A

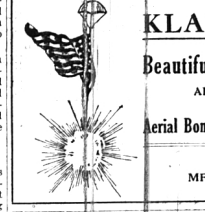
MIAMI CEREMONIAL DRAWS BIG CROWD

Complaints Numerous

Counsel then asked if the chief had received complaints coming from women. After a moment's hesitation, he replied: "Yes, but I wanted their husbands to come in and file complaints."

Q. You know the reputation of 251 Hennepin? A. Yes, I had some reports. Q. 250 Marquette avenue? A. Yes, but not so many squawks.

Q. You didn't knock any over? A. Yes, but I didn't knock any over. "No, I didn't knock any over," the chief repeated, "I didn't knock where to go."

Attorney Hughes then directed his examination inquiring of the witness if he had any knowledge of boozing. "Reports come to me quite often," replied Chief Jensen, denying upon their motion by his chief witness that he had specific information against the Golden West Hotel.

The attorney went back to his former lead. Q. Did you ever go into parties where you saw liquor drunk? A. I can't say. Q. Then you admit liquor was drunk?

The state objected, and after argument between attorneys, the court sustained objections to questions connecting the chief of police with seeing intoxicating liquor drunk.

Shook Them Down Then came a witness whose testimony was the first, until that time, that had been particularly damaging to the state's case. William T. Coe, a Minneapolis attorney, told of visiting 25 Washington street, St. Paul, between twenty and twenty-five tables, with men playing cards; that the room held between 150 and 200, there was a man at the door, the door guarded by a wicket and a chain; but, he added, "I got in anyway."

"I went after Blake who told me to see Jensen," said Mr. Coe. Q. Do you know Mr. Cullen, the mayor's secretary? He then told of visiting the mayor's office, of the mayor being busy and finally insisting with Mr. Coe, that his client, who lost \$2,200 at the Washington street gambling dive, be returned his money, at least \$400 of it, which his client had received from his wife on which to make a payment on property. That, as a result of the loss, the family was destitute and in want.

"I left the mayor's office and by the time I had reached my own office, Mr. Blake was waiting for me with the money," testified Mr. Coe. Q. Is there anyone associated in business with Mr. Blake? A. In partnership with him are Bob Hamilton and "Dutch" Nelson. Q. (By Olson) Tell me, Mr. Coe, were you employed by your client on a contingent fee basis? A. Yes, I was. Q. How much did you get out of it? Mr. Coe said the courtroom was packed and men and women were standing up two and three deep in and outside the spectator's rail. From the crowd came a general laugh when Attorney Coe said that he had received \$50 per cent.

Mrs. Kennedy on Stand With the attorney's testimony in the record, Defense Attorney Hughes called Mrs. Glensy Kennedy to the stand. She was on the stand over four hours, the remainder of the afternoon and into the afternoon of the next.

Attorney Hughes re-read the statements the document contained. She denied each one of them, including the statement that she had never seen Glaram a bribe.

Q. Did you dictate the statements this contains? A. No, Chief Jensen dictated it and gave it to me to sign. Q. Had you at any time seen Mr. Jensen before the time you called at his office? A. Not that I remember.

The witness then went on to relate that she later called upon Mayor Leach at his office, was able to see him, and that the mayor told her not to worry, that he would see that the police would not gain either her or Glaram.

"He told me that he would see the chief and tell him to let me alone and assured me that he would not bother me any more," she said. Mr. Hughes then inquired of Mrs. Kennedy some of the places where she had taken up her residence.

Q. Did you see liquor served at the Golden West Hotel? A. Yes, I certainly did. At one time I helped pack it there myself. Q. You help pack it there myself. Has he ever visited your apartment? She answered that she knew the mayor before and after his election, testifying that the mayor had visited her apartment at 1400 West Twenty-second street, and at these times had furnished him with girls.

Portraying some of the conditions she testified to existing in the underworld, Mrs. Kennedy explained that a large portion of the "business" for the women were picked up by taxi drivers, swore that the majority of them solicited and shared in the profits, as did the bellboys in hotels. The apartments were operated on an "exchange" basis, she said, and one place was short of girls, a call would go out to another.

Frank McCormick, the witness named, was the man generally credited as being able to "fix" things. Mrs. Kennedy got over another one on the state to the discredit of the chief of police, when she testified that she had the private telephone number of Chief of Detectives Frank Brunskill, of Minneapolis "third grade" reputation.

Q. You've called up that number? A. I think I have. The witness made similar allegations against Brunskill she did against the mayor.

The witness then related the story of herself being interviewed by Deane and Sullivan, one the admitted E. C. of North Star Klan No. 2, and the other a deputy sheriff.

Have you ever had occasion to see the mayor while representing people who have lost money in gambling? A. Yes. The amount was \$600, lost at 213 Hennepin avenue.

In the face of objections by the county attorney, he testified that the mayor had told him the matter would be reported to Chief Jensen, that he had waited a week, no action taken closing the place was taken. The witness testified that he had talks with gamblers losing money, on the court ruled that the talk of the underworld was already conceded as material in the case.

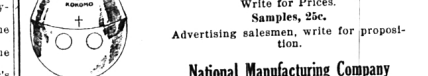

Samson and Delilah

Those who are familiar with the Bible readily recall the story of Samson and Delilah. Of how the strength of Samson lay in his hair and how treacherous Delilah, after lulling Samson to sleep, had his locks shorn and, with his strength gone, he was easy prey for the Philistines.

Although this parable was written thousands of years ago, it could not have more fittingly depicted the condition as exists in this country today.

America is the Samson of the world. It is trying to wreck the vast public school system which lies the strength of America.

To quote the Chicago Herald-Examiner: "There are enemies of the public school that oppose it and constantly seek to control because they do not believe in American principles upon which the public school is founded."

Embodied in the same editorial, the writer also says that, "What we are today we owe to the free and democratic institution of education—the public school."

No truer words were ever written than those quoted above and it is there any reason why true blooded Americans should not fight the enemies of these schools that bestow upon man his greatest gift—that of an education?

The world had practically stood still for centuries under the rule that fought education. In four hundred years America had accomplished more than the combined countries of the world had done in many times that number of years.

And Samson said unto her: If they blind me with seven green withs that were never dried, then shall I be weak as other men. Judges 16:22.

Peculiar it is that Samson said seven green withs. Peculiar inasmuch as that power that has always guided education has its headquarters in the city that is built on seven hills. It is the Delilah, plotting, planning to tear America of its public school system, that its strength might be gone.

Ever denying the allegations that it does not believe in education, despite the absolute figures that countries under its control reek with illiteracy, this power plots to control America's public school. The figures, prepared by the Census Bureau of the United States government, establish beyond cavil that this system, emanating from Rome, is the world's arch-enemy of education.

Spain concludes the possibility of going into a mass of figures at this time, although a comparison, drawn from authentic figures and from the source spoken of above, would not be amiss. We will choose eight countries, dominated and controlled by that rule, which openly states in the face of these figures that it believes in education, and give the rate of illiteracy in them:

Argentina, 5.4 per cent; Brazil, 88.2 per cent; Spain, 58.7 per cent; Bolivia, 82.9 per cent; Chile, 49.5 per cent; Portugal, 68.9 per cent; Colombia, 73 per cent; Mexico, 70.7 per cent. The total shows an average of 68.1 per cent.

Eight countries, free of the dictations of this foreign power, with their rate of illiteracy, follow: England, 1.8 per cent; Australia, 1.8 per cent; Holland, 3 per cent; United States, 7.7 per cent; Denmark, 2 per cent; Scotland, 1.5 per cent; Sweden, 2 per cent; Canada, 11 per cent. This total of illiteracy reaches only 3.1 per cent. It must be taken into consideration that the herds of slaves in our industrial centers, and practically all of whom are subjects of this same system that is lighting education.

These figures present a withering and conclusive indictment of that system that would ruin our public school system. It thrives best where there is little or no education. Therefore, is it not only natural that it would strive education in these United States? Let every American be on his guard!

Delilah first lulled Samson to sleep before the attempt to take from him his strength. Then she "began to afflict him" and his "strength went from him." The schools are flooded with histories that belittle that movement which first broke the hold of that political system that fights education. Is man who suddenly finds his home being robbed, and grapples with the burglar, to be accused of stirring up strife because he could, if he wished, stand peacefully aside and permit the robbery? Who is to be blamed for the resultant fight? The one who would steal or the one who has been lulled to sleep and is now "being afflicted."

Howbeit the hair of his head began to grow again after he was shaven. Judges 16:22.

biles were soon on the roads leading from Culver. Harris was found in a ditch near the bridge and was soon surrounded by an excited and angry crowd of men. It was then that the members of the Ku Klux Klan, headed by their oath to aid in law enforcement and the upholding of the law at all times, took steps that prevented the lynching of the negro who was held until Marshal Murphy reached the spot and placed Harris under arrest.

Feeling was running high when Harris was placed in jail and in order to prevent further trouble his trial was held the next day.

It is the very heart of the nation, the place where all classes of citizens stand upon a common footing to receive from their government a liberal education in order that they may become worthy citizens of tomorrow. Public schools should instill in our American youth the highest and noblest Americanism, and no teacher nor official who carries along with his work any mental reservation whatsoever should be allowed to hold a position in this institution. It is the solemn duty of earnest and devoted men and women, those who are loyal to their country and their flag, to defend this public school and to see to it that only those persons who are wholeheartedly loyal to the principle of real Americanism should be employed as teachers and officials.

Where Is the Change? Knock Out Evidence But it was for L. W. Boyce, manager of a private detective agency, to play a trump card for the defense. His testimony had never recited in the Jensen trial. Q. How long have you lived here? A. Twenty-two years. Q. Do you know Frank McCormick? A. Yes. Q. Do you know his business prior to prohibition? A. He was a saloonkeeper. Q. Any other kind of business? The witness testified it was common knowledge he operated a gambling resort contingent to the entrance to the saloon. Q. In June, 1922, did McCormick see you? A. Yes, he called at my office several times during that month. Q. Explain what connections you had with him. Mr. Boyce stated that McCormick had requested him to see the mayor, that he saw Mayor Leach, was employed by him on a private party on the track of three gambling houses, and to report back to the mayor without the cognizance of the police department. Q. How many did the mayor call your attention to, to "get the goods on?" A. Three of them. Two of these, he added, were at 21 and 23 31st street.

Witness explained the raids. His operative met the "purity" police squad at a given location and led them to the quarters without giving out the party's destinations. Q. And were you paid for this work for which you create a private party? A. My bill was \$204. This amount was handed to me in currency by Frank McCormick, who called at my office. Wouldn't Come Across The inference of the workings of the "system" was too plain for further explanation and the attorney did not attempt to draw conclusions from the witness, whether the places were hiring their competitors or whether the proprietors of them had failed to "come across."

Q. Did you, after this work, have any talk about the work? The state objected. Hughes to Olson: Do you seriously object, Olson? Olson: I do. The question was withdrawn. Q. Have you had a talk with McCormick since in June, 1922? Rev. Carl Bartsch, pastor of the English Lutheran Church, next took the stand and related that during the fall of 1921, with the present incumbent as mayor, he and another minister had toured gambling resorts, had obtained entrance to 26 South Washington avenue, had registered his complaint at the city hall, and had made a second tour and found the same conditions to exist. There had been no action taken, no remedy obtained.

Cops Within Earshot. "I was in the alley next to 26 Washington avenue," elucidated the Rev. Bartsch, "and from the windows could plainly hear the rickling of chips, and rickling ahead of me was the police station. In the open door of the police garage I saw policemen." This he said, was several days following the registering of the complaint. Mayor, Gambler's Reference Joseph M. Griffith had the upstairs of 50 Washington avenue, South, which was formerly used as a rooming house, for rent. He told of summer of 1922, asking him, if he had the upstairs for rent—the matter of the amount of rent did not seem to bother him, whether he paid \$10.00 or \$50.00, or more.

"I told him I would have to insist about the character of renters," said Griffith, "and he answered that I wouldn't have any trouble with him." Q. Did you insist upon references? A. Yes. Q. Who did he give you as references? A. The mayor and Chief of Police Jensen. Q. Did you call them up? (Objection by Olson. "I don't care for telephone conversations," he insisted. Objection overruled.) A. I called up the voice of the chief of police and a voice answered saying he was Chief Jensen. I explained to him that I had a flat to rent, that I wanted to be careful about the tenants who went there. I then explained that Ulrich wanted the flat and had given him the chief's name for reference.

Q. What did the chief say to you? A. That I wouldn't have any trouble with the rent, and I told him I didn't care about the rent, but wanted to know who I was getting in. He then told me that I wouldn't have any trouble with Ulrich, giving me to understand he was all right. Q. And you called up the mayor? A. I got the secretary of the mayor, Mr. Gullen, and got the same kind of understanding. Q. When did Ulrich next see you? A. He came back the next day. The witness then stated that Ulrich told him he wanted to operate three tables in the rear of the rooms upstairs, and a rooming house in the front—that he would make \$20.00 a night, and would be willing to pay \$250.00 a month rent.

Q. Did you rent to him? A. Yes. I tricked him out of the office. The place has been empty since. The Brown Case The defense sprang their principal surprise, tending to show the moral conduct of the mayor, when they brought in neighbors of Mrs. Charles Brown, 3249 Fifth avenue, South. Two of them testified to seeing Mayor Leach in the presence of Mrs. Brown the latter part of the summer of 1922. The general reputation of the Brown woman however, as late as 3 o'clock, and automobiles and taxis came in considerable number.

Mrs. Grace Weigel, 510 East Thirtieth street, a resident of the neighborhood for seven years, told particulars of seeing the mayor at the Brown home at least two times. Her testimony featured the morning of June 1, 1922, when she saw Mayor Leach and Mrs. Brown. Q. Did you have occasion to observe the house? A. Yes, by the noise of automobiles going by and the sound coming from the interior of the house. Q. Could you look into the Brown house? A. Yes, with the curtains up. Q. Who did you observe? A. I could particularly see what was going on in the kitchen? Q. How close to the kitchen were you? A. Close enough that in the summer I was able to hear conversation. Q. Did you hear any portion of the conversation? The witness said she could, and at once it identified the character of the parties attending. Q. Do you know Mrs. Brown as the widow of the former detective Charles Brown? A. Yes. Q. How soon did these parties occur after the funeral of Mr. Brown? A. They occurred previous to the funeral and after—they kept their right up.

Mmones and B. V. Ds The witness then testified that in August of 1922 there was one week in particular that the noise making was so loud that the neighborhood could not sleep. "I myself couldn't sleep with the conversation that went on," she said, testifying that on different times she saw women in their negligees, pink kimonos, and on one occasion seeing a woman in a white dress on; that at the time referred to the men were dressed in bathrobes and B. V. Ds. So far as noise was concerned, the piano was kept going until 3 o'clock in the morning, and when the inmates went out to the kitchen where refreshments were kept, would shout loud enough to be easily heard in the front part of the house. Preceding Mrs. Weigel on the stand was Samuel H. Davis, retired furniture manufacturer. "Do you know the premises of 3249 Fifth avenue, South?" he was asked. A. I live in that neighborhood. Q. Do you know the occupant of the house? A. Party by name of Brown. Q. Has this house ever come to your attention? Olson raised the first objection to the admissibility of this character of evidence, saying that he did not want the wife of an ex-policeur defamed. The court overruled the objection, that the testimony went out the allegations complained of in the attacking affidavit. A. There had been rumors about the place, and it had an unfavorable reputation. Q. Did you make any effort to have conditions complained of remedied? "Dropped In Incident." A. Yes, a Mr. Belair came to us and said that he would take the complaint to the police department. Q. Do you know the general reputation of the place? Would you call it disorderly? (Olson voiced another objection—overruled.) A. Yes, they kept open house until two, three and four o'clock in the morning. On cross-examination Mr. Davis was asked if Belair had requested him to swear out a complaint. A. No, he did not. At the time he only came to inquire.
