## KLANSMEN, TO KOKOMO ON INDEPENDENCE DAY!

Plans Going Forward for Most Stupendous Gathering of American Citizens Ever Held in Hoosierdom—Preparations for Crowd Anticipated at 250,000 "Hoosiers", "Suckers" from Illinois and "Buckeyes" from Ohio—Klansmen All.

Tri-State Meet to Be Held at Beautiful Malfalfa Park, Klan's Own Gathering Place, Where Largest Naturalization Ceremony Will Take Place on July 4th—Where National, State and Local Officers of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan Will Deliver Stirring Messages of Patriotism—State Organization to Be Formed.

Klansmen, on to Kokomo! Ohio, Illinois, Michigan, and Indiana, hear the clarion call!

On July 4th, at 10 o'clock a. m., will be heard a bugle call, followed by fifty bands in unison, playing the national anthem in Malfalfa park, near Kokomo.

Immediately following the invocation, then the greatest outburst of patriotic expression will shake the hills of Howard county, and reverberate throughout all Klansdom of the northland.

The tri-state meet, the greatest Fourth of July celebration, remarkable for its patriotism, fervor and genuine enthusiasm, will be under way. Not less than 250,000 people will participate, and one high Klan official even estimates that over 300,000 Klansmen will be present on this eventful and stupendous occasion.

Even from far away Virginia they will come. Minnesota will have its delegation there; Iowa will leave the cornfield and attend. Illinois will gather itself from the mud or dust and enjoy Indiana good roads to Kokomo; the hills of Kentucky are sending their delegations, and Ohio—there is just nothing to it. State headquarters in Ohio are even now boasting that they will have a larger per capita attendance than Indiana itself. Michigan, if its roads are cleared of "moonshiners" and "rum runners," is going to be there, and the largest gathering of robes and unadorned Klansmen. The latest electrical fiery crosses ever emblazoned against a darkened sky will be a feature. From the south, a massed chorus of 1,000 on the morning of July 6th, it will be a riot of patriotism.

Corps of Experts Making Arrangements

Naturally, things done Klanslike, are things done well. Just now, Kokomo itself is in the throes of activities in preparation for handling the monumental and momentous affair in every single detail. Men who are experts in handling traffic are cooperating with local men in arrangements for one-way traffic to and from Malfalfa park, located a short distance west of Kokomo. Men familiar with and fully equipped to handle entertainment in every one of its features are making arrangements for the most detailed and carefully planned entertainment and for the comfort of those who are to attend. In order that everyone may hear the addresses of stirring messages of mental and moral uplift, the most ideal and unexcelled gathering place, typical in that it is a wonderful expression of God's creation and the big outdoors, the inspiration of the setting is in itself full of appeal.

In addition to the hordes from all the Northern and Western States, together with the participants from Illinois and Ohio, who are classing this as their official participation in the Tri-State meet, Indiana itself will be represented by delegations, in many instances 100 per cent attendance, from over a hundred local Klans, throughout the state.

THOSE BILLS FOR AUTO REPAIRS AND THE TAXPAYERS IN GENERAL GET "ATTENTION"

City Hospital Affairs Under Investigation and It Is So "Hot" Even the Milk Is Soured—Bribe and Blankets Also in Evidence

## 'FRILLS AND FANCIES' IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Catholic Paper Admits Life of Church Depends on Parochial Teaching

(By Staff Correspondent)

COLUMBUS, O., June 27.—Every time The Catholic Columbian opens its editorial mind in defense of the parochial school system, it puts its foot into it. What is written to be an explanation turns out to be a statement of the facts as advocates of the public schools have always seen them. Thus, the article published in the current issue, "Why We Emphasize Our School System," is a revelation of the rut into which the Catholic schools have fallen.

After stating the daily press for failure to give adequate space to parochial school activities and results, the editorial says, "It is true that the parochial school by the eradication of the myriad of frills and fancies that clutter our public school system, is enabled to make financial headway in a notoriously poor clientele, there might be an ugly situation developed."

Attitude Has Changed But Little

By "frills and fancies" the editor undoubtedly refers to the new things in education which are being experimented with. It is essential that for otherwise no progress would be made, and the public schools would fall into the same "dough of despondence" in which the parochial schools, although satisfied, and themselves. The church schools of the future were just after keeping out the new in science and learning, and their attitude towards these things seems to have changed little since the days of Galileo.

What has kept the "clericalness" of the parochial schools "notoriously poor," if it is not the schools themselves? It is thus admitted that the education of the church school can not fit its proteges to compete with the product of the American public schools after life.

To Propagate Aims

That the purpose of parochial education in general, is not so much to prepare youth for life, but to propagate the aims of the Roman church is seen from the final paragraph of this editorial: "But we are not neglectful of the most obvious duty to our church if we failed in recording the success of the schools with which our church can not succeed."

The last seven words of that statement are remarkable ones. In other words, were Catholics entirely devoid of the Roman church, they would have their eyes open to the facts of life as they exist and not as the church wants them to believe. It is not that it would be hard after such an education to gain the "blind devotion" for the political machine, which is now possible through the spider-like web of parochial schools.

## LILLIAN STRINGER SAYS NIX TO LEW

REFUSES TO SERVE UNDER LIMBER LUNG AND REJECTS APPOINTMENT

Serves Notice of Non-Acceptance of Appointment as Member in City Park Through Flery Cross

Another attempt of Limber Lunged Lew to silence an American citizen by the use of the Roman church has been rebuffed. Lillian Stringer, 710 Massachusetts avenue, seriously objects to being placed on the city payroll, where reflection of her humiliation would cause her to be, at least by inference, a member of the un-American Unity League.

Miss Stringer, who was active in assisting in the election of Limber Lunged Lew when she thought him to be at least 40 per cent American, was recently appointed as park matron for St. Clair park, entirely without her knowledge or consent. The first indication she had of her appointment being through the newspapers.

Enemies press from outside the Klan and a few small petty jealousies inside the Klan are fanned into flame by forces outside the organization, and apparently keep an otherwise tranquil pool simmering, if not boiling.

Every grouse act or statement receives the widest publicity, and that there is an anti-Klan propaganda agency here the ground to "start the wings" and then give them "the wing" is not denied.

Interests entirely alien to the Klan as a whole, twenty-four hours out of the day and every day in the week and all indicate a direct and carefully planned assault of this organization on the Klan by its enemies through the channels of unfavorable publicity, which seems to be the order of the day. Just where these orders come from and the influence behind them is highly significant, and they certainly have the earmarks of being inspired by that well-organized force, the greatest in the world, Roman Catholic propaganda.

The only regret about the entire situation is, however, that certain individuals in the organization of the Klan, otherwise well-meaning, intelligent men, fail to realize that they are but tools of the enemy. They are too busy with the glow of the glory of publicity, and it only gives the enemy a mind of a new order.

## SENTIMENT CHANGES IN CRAWFORDSVILLE

Propaganda by the Combined Forces of Opposition Is Overcome in Big Demonstration

CRAWFORDSVILLE, Ind., June 23.—Before a crowd of thousands of people who taxed the parking space of this city to its capacity, the largest and most pretentious parade ever held in this part of the state was given by the local Knights and Women of the Ku Klux Klan, Friday night. The demonstration consisted of a public speaking platform, a parade, a monster parade, and a public initiation.

In this city where the Invisible Empire has met the very bitterest of opposition, where the chief of police urged his friends to show respect to Old Glory if it was carried by Klansmen, where countless resolutions condemning the Klan have been passed, and where the un-American Unity League attempted to force a city ordinance through the council, preventing parades—in such a city, five hundred Klansmen, the order dared to stage one of the most beautiful parades the writer has ever witnessed.

Dark had not fallen before the men and women belonging to the orders in surrounding cities began arriving at the Montgomery county grounds. A guard was thrown about the grounds early in the evening, and no one except 100 per cent Americans entered the gate. The men and women robed and remained on the grounds until the signal came from the downtown districts that the speaking had ended.

EAST CHICAGO, Ind., June 26.—The allies of the Calumet district have banded together in an attempt to drive the Ku Klux Klan from Hammond, East Chicago and Gary, and to bring disrepute upon the American organization. Backed and aided by Mayor R. O. Johnson, convicted in Federal court during the "Gary bootlegging cases," and now at liberty on parole, and Mayor Frank Hallahan, of East Chicago, who is openly charged with turning his office over to meetings of the un-American Unity League, these foreign elements are plotting and planning the overthrow of Protestantism in the Calumet district, which also includes Calumet and Indiana Harbor in addition to Gary, East Chicago, Hammond and smaller communities. Enemies Flee After Shooting at Guards Who Find Them Hidden in Grass

COLUMBUS, O., June 25.—That enemies of the Klan will go to any extreme to break into meetings was demonstrated near London, Madison county, last Wednesday night, when 1,000 Klansmen in full regalia, representing delegations from this city, Springfield and London, initiated 600 candidates in a wood southwest of London.

Klansmen had noticed two machines, one carrying four men and the other two men, past down the road adjacent to the farm in which the ceremony was held. The strangers turned off their headlights and swung into a lane on the next farm. They did this unnoted.

It was not until the meeting was well under way that the onlookers noticed a dark figure in the weeds to the rear of him. The signal was given and the guards advanced. Not only the onlookers but several of the Klansmen fled back to the parked machines. Flashlights were turned on them and their identities revealed.

Ordered Away

They were ordered away. In retreating one of the Klansmen fired two shots. The two machines made their getaway, but were followed into London by five Klansmen in a car. They were scattered.

However, two of them were recognized in a side street, fleeing out of their machine. The sheriff confronted them. A crowd gathered, including the town marshal. He was asked to arrest them. The Klansmen, telling him they would file affidavits. However, the village police officer "passed them by" by saying the alleged offense was committed in the county outside of his jurisdiction and the sheriff would have to handle it. The Klansmen allowed the matter to drop temporarily.

Denies Allegations

Some weeks ago, in an article referring to the Atlanta situation, Ben Sullivan was referred to as the personal attorney of Colonel Simmons. In this same article reference was made to Catholic attorneys and the inference was given that Mr. Sullivan was a Roman Catholic. This is in error. The Mr. Sullivan referred to here at that time is not a Roman Catholic but is a 100 per cent loyal American and a Methodist.

His father, grandfather and ancestors were all Methodists and at the present time he is doing much constructive work in cooperation with building up the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan and in furthering the ideals and principles of the organization.

## VAST CROWD THROWS JASONVILLE STREETS

Rain Fails to Balk Parade and  
Public Speaking—Band and  
Quartet Are Present

JASONVILLE, Ind., June 25.—The mammoth crowd that jammed Jasonville on the night of the Ku Klux Klan parade and public speaking is still a topic of conversation here despite the fact that clouds hovered in the sky all day and that rain fell during most of that time, a crowd that was estimated to be more than 40,000 persons crowded the streets over which the parade passed. The demonstration was held on May 25 and persons from all over the county and from points outside the county helped to swell the crowd.

The parade was led by the Bloomfield band of thirty-five pieces and left the ball park at 8:45. Twelve white horses, carrying knights in

full regalia, were at the head of the procession. The marchers were cheered lustily as they passed through the streets jammed with spectators. The procession disbanded at the grove, where a speech was delivered on Americanism.

Quartet Sings

Following the breaking up of the parade the band rendered two numbers and the Jasonville quartet sang the "Old Rugged Cross." Following this the speaker spoke for almost two hours, being interrupted from time to time with loud applause.

After the address, a part of which was devoted to the public schools, many in the vast crowd surged forward to congratulate him on his eloquence and upon the manner in which he handled his subject. The address, while making very plain certain points, was absolutely free of any remarks that could in any way be construed as hateful.

## NEWSPAPER STORY IS BRANDED AS LIE

Insidious Propaganda Is Waged  
Against H. T. D. A. Fol-  
lowing Vice Raids

BLOOMFIELD, Ind., June 25.—Much insidious propaganda is being followed in an article which appeared in a Terre Haute newspaper about one week ago in which it was stated that ill feelings were reported to exist at the Vigo Mining Company's mines following the claim that members of the H. T. D. A. went to the mine armed to protect fellow members.

It is claimed here that the story which appeared is practically untrue in all respects and was part of propaganda spread to discredit the H. T. D. A. because it has been instrumental in breaking up gambling games, raising blind tigers and making it uncomfortable for men who held the morality of young girls too lightly.

It was stated in the article in question that the miners object to working with a member of the H. T. D. A. because it is a part of the state constabulary and would be used in case of a strike. A member of the Horse Thief Detective Association has no connection with the state constabulary.

However, it is claimed by those familiar with the association that no member ever appeared at the mine to protect other members, or for any other purpose with the exception that one member appeared there to secure work. He was wholly unarmed at the time. It being suspected, it is claimed, that he was a one hundred per cent American, precluded the possibility of his securing work there.

It is stated, however, that the association has a large part of its membership in the mine fields and the men are sympathetic to organized labor.

The mine which the newspaper article referred to is located near Gilmour. Recently gambling games were broken up and blind tigers raised after which threats were made to "get" members of the organization. All the members of the association are Protestants. The officials of the mines are said to be Catholics. A former mine boss is now in jail awaiting trial on the charge of murder. There have been five murders in Gilmour.

Much insidious propaganda is being spread against the H. T. D. A. because of its activities in convicting law breakers and because of the fact that it has wholly a Protestant membership in this county.

Following the initiation a banquet was held at an inn nearby and a fiery cross burned. During the proceedings a searchlight was thrown over the grounds so that no intruders were on the premises, which had been rented for the occasion by the Klan. A number of persons who held the reflection of the burning crosses, which were fired during the ceremony, made their way by autos to the grounds.

## NO DOUBT OF WHAT THE HOOSIERS WANT

MORAN, Ind., June 22.—It seems that every village, town and city in the country is eager to hear the message of Americanism which is being spread by the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

Last night one of the largest crowds that has ever been assembled in this city, listened attentively and earnestly to the remarks of a speaker who quietly yet forcefully presented to his audience the need for a re-dedication to those ideals of patriotism which are embodied in the principles of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

As the speaker stepped to the stand a flaming cross blazed forth, illuminating a huge American flag stirring gently in the evening breeze. At the conclusion of the address, the audience stood for a few minutes, thoughtful, motionless, then wildly applauded. There is no doubt that Hoosiers here want the Klan, and what it stands for.

PASTOR RECEIVES GIFT  
RENNSEL, Ind., June 25.—Dr. J. Budman Fleming, pastor of a local church, is in receipt of a most substantial gift of money from the Ku Klux Klan of this place. In the letter containing the money was a note which commended the pastor on his stand for 100 per cent Americanism.

## DISCRIMINATION IS SHOWN IN ACTIONS

Privilege Allowed Other Orders  
Is Denied Klan—Officials  
to Obey the Law

MAST LIVERPOOL, O., June 22.—With the realization dawning upon them that there is an American organization in East Liverpool whose membership includes the highest type of citizenship, foes of the Klan are using every effort to prevent the further growth of the organization.

Their latest move came within the past few weeks when a campaign was started to prevent the Klan from using the auditorium of the high school for their "secret" meetings.

This move was made despite the fact that the high school is a free public institution.

Working through the president of the school board, J. H. Brooks, himself a Protestant, the foes of the organization have demanded that the Klan be prevented from holding 100 per cent American meetings in an American institution.

This move was started as the result of three meetings which are said to have been held by the Klan in the school auditorium. Several members of the school board have been reported as being present at these meetings. The beginning of the campaign followed the attempt made by the present of the school board, J. H. Brooks, to gain entrance to one of the meetings. He was refused admission because of the fact that he did not have a card of invitation, admission being by card only.

Seeking to smooth things over, President Brooks called a secret meeting of the school board at which time he endeavored to gain the assent of the other members of the board to two resolutions which he had prepared, banning the Klan from the use of the auditorium. His endeavor failed. He refused to answer on direct questioning who the parties were that were urging him to force the issue against the Klan. He evaded the issue by saying that they were "good citizens." When charged by other members of the board that these "good citizens" were none other than the Knights of Columbus, he refused to deny the allegation.

The regular meeting of the school board was held on the evening of the same day that the secret meeting was held. The resolutions presented by President Brooks died for want of a second. Cornered, but refusing to admit defeat, Mr. Brooks then grasped his last opportunity and "passed the buck" by ordering the superintendent of schools not to allow the auditorium to be rented by the Klan, pointing out that a section of the Ohio general code permitted the use of the auditorium only if the general public was admitted and if there were no exclusions.

Superintendent Protests

The superintendent immediately protested against being placed in such an embarrassing position, but his appeals were in vain. There the matter rested. The Klan can use the auditorium if they are willing to allow Catholics, Jews or foreigners to attend their meetings.

Immediately from the American citizens of the city a protest ensued. They demand to know why it is that within the past few months other secret organizations have been allowed the use of the auditorium for their secret initiations and meetings, to which the general public was not admitted.

Recently the Knights of Columbus rented the auditorium for two meetings. Also the Odd Fellows, and only a matter of two weeks ago the colored lodge of Elks held secret sessions in this same auditorium. No protest was made against the use of the school by these other organizations, despite the fact that the general public was not invited. It was only when an American organization used the building for an American meeting that the opposition protested that the building should not be used for secret meetings.

Efforts in Vain

Seeing that they are hopelessly in the minority, the opposition is using every means in their power to thwart the growth of a 100 per cent American organization. But their efforts are in vain, according to all reports, as it has been reported that this has only served to wake the Protestants of this district to the fact that the domination of foreign influences to their own homes and institutions. Membership in the Klan has been reported as increasing at a rate that is swamping Klan officials.

Realizing the situation here, officials of the Klan have since simply decided that they are a law-abiding organization and that they have not the least intention of breaking any laws of the state. They have declared that if it is against the law to hold secret meetings in the school auditorium, then they will abide by the law without protest or regard for the fact that other organizations have been permitted the use of the building for the same purpose.

That members of the school board are heartily in sympathy with the ideals of Americanism has been shown in their opposition to the plan

of President Brooks. The resolutions drawn up and presented by him were completely ignored by the other members of the board, all of them Protestant and Americans.

To Make Investigation

Protestants of the city have declared that they do not intend to allow this matter to rest where it is. It has been openly stated that an investigation will be made as to why the will of several thousand people is being opposed by one man. That the Protestant people of the city and vicinity are taking a much greater interest in the affairs of their free public schools, augurs well for the success of these schools in the future.

The schools of East Liverpool are in the worst financial situation in their history. The state has been forced to furnish funds to keep them open during the past term. The reason for this has been ascribed in some quarters as being due to the fact that those people who do not believe in free public schools, voted down a levy for school funds at the last election.

Obligation at Shirley

SHIRLEY, Ind., June 25.—A big and open naturalization was held at Shirley Saturday night, June 23d, and about 500 robed men took part. Shirley witnessed the largest crowd in its history on that evening.

## 100 Robed Klansmen at Funeral Services

COLUMBUS, Ind., June 22.—Funeral services for Leland Lazell, prominent local church worker, who was drowned here Sunday, were held from the Tabernacle Christian Church on June 19. One hundred robed Knights of the Ku Klux Klan participated in the funeral of their departed brother. Young Lazell had been a member of the organization since shortly after it was formed here and took a very active part in all Klan activities.

The largest crowd that has jammed its way into the local church for some time filled it to overflowing and listened attentively to the words of praise uttered by the Reverend Book He took as his text for the sermon the twelfth chapter of Romans and during his talk showed how the life of young Lazell had been but the carrying out of the teachings of the chapter. The dead youth was preparing to enter the ministry through Johnson's Bible School and was president of his Sunday School class, leader in the Christian Endeavor, secretary of the District Association of Sunday Schools and a delegate to the state Sunday School convention, which he had planned to attend today.

## WOMEN OF KLAN OPEN A NATION WIDE CAMPAIGN

RECOGNIZED BY IMPERIAL KLONCLUM, AMERICANS RENEW EFFORTS

Protestant Organizations Get Together and Start Membership Drive

Prominent Indianapolis and Indiana women are today busy in Indiana's part of the nation-wide campaign to advance the principles of the Women of the Ku Klux Klan, which has been endorsed by the Imperial Klondum of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

This women's auxiliary to the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan consists of a combination of all organizations of Protestant American women which have been successfully functioning in the United States. The order will be strictly by and for women and will have local branches known as Women's Klans and will have a ritual very similar to that of the Ku Klux Klan. Mrs. Lula A. Markwell of Little Rock, Arkansas, is the Imperial commander of the new order. Mrs. Markwell is one of the best known women in the country in church circles and in work for Protestant America. She is now actively engaged in arranging with prominent women in all parts of the country to handle the extension of this organization. No man is exploiting it for his individual gain.

Particularly Strong in Indiana The organization is particularly strong in Indiana and Ohio. The other states in which the organization is strong and has made great strides are Louisiana, Washington, Texas, Maryland, Oregon, California, Delaware, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

Those organizations which are now combined and affiliated with the Women of the Ku Klux Klan are the League of Protestant Women, Ladies of the Golden Mask, The American Women's League of the Golden Den, Puritan Daughters of America and Ladies of the Invisible Empire.

The organization will hold a big organization meeting within the next few weeks at either Little Rock or St. Louis. From that time on the organization will rally Protestant American women to its standard in every state in the Union. The women will fight for the same principles as those on which the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan is founded and at the same time will be active in other lines peculiar to women's organizations, such as social welfare work, the prevention of juvenile delinquency and other affairs of a kindred nature. It is planned to increase the membership to one million members in the next six months.

Women Planned Amalgamation The women themselves planned the amalgamation of the different organizations as mentioned above and then petitioned the Imperial Klondum of the Ku Klux Klan for recognition, the permission to use part of their name, sections of the ritual and constitution. This was granted by the klondum on June 2. It being the first women's organization ever recognized officially by the Klan, although orders of Protestant American women have been in existence almost ever since the time the Klan was organized.

The Women of the Ku Klux Klan has chartered solely a woman's organization under the laws of Arkansas. The order is a corporation and every woman who joins has a vested right in all properties and monies of the order. In this it is distinct from any man-owned or man-promoted woman's order conducted for the financial benefit of certain private individuals. The klondum at its meeting ruled that women's orders promoted by men were not desirable. No such promoters of such orders seeking their own financial gain should, the klondum ruled, be permitted to propagate through the medium of the Klan.

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## MORAL PRESSURE OF KLAN BRINGS RAIDS

Law Violators at Greenfield, Ind., Getting Close Attention of Local Authorities

GREENFIELD, Ind., June 25.—The moral pressure of the Ku Klux Klan is being felt here and continued raids are being made and arrests effected by the local authorities in connection with bootlegging. Last week a raiding squad, composed of ten men, confiscated a thirty-gallon still, testers, coloring fluid, a large quantity of mash and many other articles connected with the manufacture of liquor.

Some bonds in which bootleggers have been released have been set at high figures, one bond being \$3,000. This was in the case of Walter Deery, at whose place mash, bottles and corks were found. One arrest was effected on the charge of transporting liquor, the prisoner being caught on the National road. A woman companion, who denied all knowledge of the liquor, and who claimed to live in Indianapolis, was released.

Net Pulled Tighter Two men were arrested for speeding and intoxication while others are being picked up on other charges connected with the booze game. The net is being pulled tighter and tighter by the local authorities who have determined to bring the handling of booze in and around Greenfield to a stop.

The decent and law-abiding citizens are tired of the many infractions of the law and they are aroused to the point that they will stop at nothing to stop the criminals. That they are being backed by the officers is seen in the many raids and arrests being staged at this time.

## AUTOMOBILES BLOCK ROADS FOR MILES

LMA, O., June 25.—Several thousand members of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan gathered on a farm east of here Wednesday night and conducted naturalization ceremonies for several hundred candidates.

Three fiery crosses with three K's, erected on each side of the crosses, were burned, making a total of nine burning emblems which furnished light for the initiation and at the same time threw a weird, fantastic blanket of light over the throng. Thousands of machines blocked the road for two miles in each direction from the farm, making it necessary to press several robed men into service to clear the blockade so as to allow members to reach the place of meeting.

The groceries were worth about \$50.

Accept this gift as a material aid in your present adversity as coming from Him who sees all things and knows our every need. May He see fit to lighten your burdens be our prayer."

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## NOBLES' PARADE WAS A BIG EYE-OPENER

"Little Red School House" Float Brought Lusty Cheers in Procession at Capital

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 25.—The annual convention of the Ancient Arabic Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine has just concluded one of the most notable of its conventions. It was particularly notable in that it opened the eyes of Catholics and others to the power that Masonry really has in this country if it is directed toward the preservation of Americanism. A historical pageant was held on the last event of the program. In the floats representing the outstanding incidents in the founding of the country, pupils of the public schools learned for the first time the part played by Masons in the stirring days of the Revolutionary period. Fear of offense to Catholics here, no doubt, kept this information from being given in the histories studied by young Americans.

Washington Was a Mason

It is well known that Washington was a Mason, but not so well known that Paul Henry Warren, Patrick Henry, the men who comprised the Boston Tea Party, that

all but one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, the first chief justice of the United States, and other leaders also were Masons.

With this well known, and with the absence of Catholic elements from the founding of the country, founded for religious freedom, also obvious, children of Washington have at last been given the ground-work for them to build upon in the future to vote for a member of an organization that stands for what Americanism stands for.

The Little Red Schoolhouse The gentlemen on Sixteenth Street heights who came over here from Rome, must have found it a bitter pill to swallow, when the float in the parade bearing the "Little Red School House," one of the two "alms" of the Shriners, went past. He would have been more chagrined if he could have followed its progress down the mile from the Capitol to the White House and heard the roars of approval that greeted the float over its entire journey.
