UN-AMERICAN UNITY LEAGUE, NEAR ROCKS, HOLDS AN ELECTION

Rumors of Internal Strife Leak Out Following Refusal of Judge Deery to Serve

Purse Strings Tighten as Attempt to "Fix" Negro Fully—Boycott Brings Hot Words

(By Wingfoot)

Following an election of officers by the un-American Unity League on Wednesday night of last week, much comment is being heard and questions asked as to why that un-American organization holds so many elections of officers. The fact that James E. Deery refused to accept nomination to the office of president is also causing considerable comment. It has been rumored that the election of officers was held to cover up the fact that Mr. Deery no longer wished to serve as president and that the league did not wish to make his resignation public; therefore, another convenient election of officers was held.

The new officers of the un-American Unity League are: Jacob Morgan, attorney, president; Dr. Amelia Keller, "neither Catholic, Jew nor negro," vice-president; Henry E. Harmon, secretary; Ralph Bamberger, ably fitted for the position, treasurer.

League About to Crack

For the past ten days persistent rumors to the effect that the un-American Unity League was about to crack have been afloat. Blocked on every side in their campaign of destruction, hate and un-Americanism, the action of the city council in refusing to be a party to its nefarious campaign, is now said to be the last little straw upon the big camel's back. Internal strife, it is hinted, was the cause of the election. From other quarters comes the report that certain officers were anxious to "get out from under."

Smiles greet the assertion of the league that it has several thousands of members in Marion county. Scowls are also said to have greeted those agents seeking money with which to carry on the fight against Protestantism in Indianapolis. There are those who were willing to give, it is understood, when it was thought that the league was "going to get some place," but with naught but reversals purse strings tightened up, it is even possible that Gus Efromony, of the H. P. Weston Company, is tired of digging up for a lost cause.

Boycott Brings Protest

Another story that has evidently leaked out, because of the fact that it persists in "going the rounds," is that the action of the league in "ordering a copy of the council's action sent to all members of the league" caused a big blow-up by those who could see nothing but wholesale boycott as a reason for the action. "The order" suddenly caused a light to dawn upon certain members of the league, it is said, and these certain members "spoke right out in school." And with the result that the un-American Unity League, sponsored by "Mad" Pat O'Donnell, jury fixer, and Joe Roach, assassin, again elect officers.

To add to the league's troubles, a report has been circulated that much trouble is being experienced in "fixing" the negro population, although enough propaganda has been spread to cause the lower class of negroes to begin arming themselves with guns purchased of a certain well-known negro politician in Indiana avenue. Also to have negroes in the community around Twelfth and Fayette streets subscribe for Tolerance, the hate sheet, and donate money for the building of a Catholic church.

However, where intelligence holds sway, the un-American Unity League is against a stone wall; the intelligent negroes of Indianapolis are not falling for buncombe put out by "Mad Pat's" followers. This is another strain that helped strain the hump on the back of the ship of the desert; the intelligent negro who has prospered under Protestant rule, is not arming himself to shoot down Protestants.

Dr. Keller Promoted

It is possible, though, that the followers of assassin Joe Roach believed that Dr. Amelia Keller, who is neither Catholic, Jew nor negro, would be able to "carry the message to Garcia," and called another election to put her in office when those already empowered by the league began to falter when brought to face with the impending possibilities created by the league in its program

Merchants, hotels, cafes and restaurants are stocking up and making arrangements to handle the biggest crowd in the history of all days in this city. It is expected that more than 100,000 Indiana Klansmen alone will find the road to Kokomo. With Ohio declaring that her delegations will outnumber those of the Hoosier state, and Illinois and Michigan prepared to send thousands upon thousands of Klansmen to the Independence Day celebration, it almost takes one's breath to attempt an estimate of just how many real Americans will be to Kokomo.

Although the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan will celebrate our independence throughout the nation, while thousands of fiery crosses are thrown their stars high in the heavens, the meet in this city will be the largest Klan gathering ever held to date.

Local Klansmen Active

The local Klan members have been working diligently to the point that the visiting Klansmen will find hospitality at every hand and no inconvenience mar their perfect day. The grounds on which the program of the day will be held is the property of the local Klan.

A feature of the day will be the part taken by the women of the Ku Klux Klan, who will participate in the ceremonies. This will be the first occasion that the women's organization will have taken part in any joint ceremonies of such a nature. The recent amalgamation of patriotic women's organizations into one order, and the recognition by the Imperial Klansman, makes this possible.

KANSAS CITY, June 30.—While Kansas City paid homage to the president a quiet gathering of men in white robes, displaying flaming crosses, and on horses garbed in white, met in a pasture at Forty-fourth street and Wood avenue, Kansas City, Kas.

According to members of the crowd of 1,800 persons who watched the ceremonies it was initiation night for the Kansas City, Kas., Ku Klux Klan. Two hundred new members are said to have been enrolled on the Klan's books.

It was the first time in the history of the Kansas City, Kas., Klan, that Klansmen came mounted on horses. The site of the meeting is outside the city limits and as a consequence Kansas City, Kas., policemen made no attempt to disperse the crowd.

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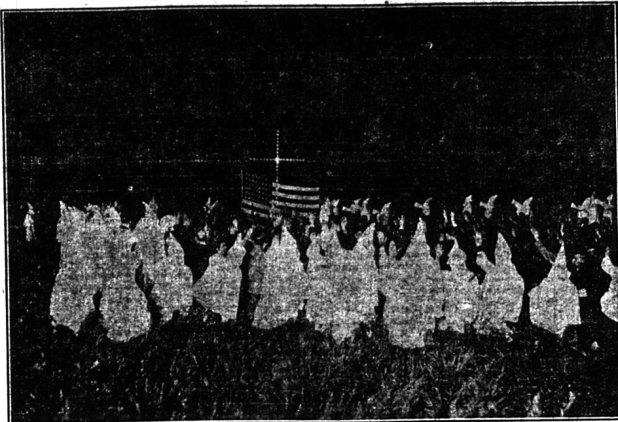
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An Open-Air Meeting at St. Louis, Mo.

America holds back no helpful hand when it is within her power and province to serve; but her flag is her own, and she has consecrated every thread of it with the blood of her own heroes and the tears of her own patriotic womanhood.

If left to their unspoken wishes, a lot of congressmen would go around on Independence Day squawking: "One flag, one God, and one—thimbleful of whiskey!"

The snappiest argument against immigration may be seen in the moans and customs of East Chicago

or the slums of any large American city. In the adjectival language of a friend of ours who discussed racial mixture with a dissenting acquaintance, "Amalgamation? Hell! Do you want your 100 per cent daughter to marry a diseased fruit peddler? Get this stuff home to you!"

The Klan wages war—but not on sect nor race. The streets of Philadelphia swarm with people. The buzz of voices ebbs and flows like the moan and growl of a sea slapping at its rocks. The people flood the streets and swirl and wash about the steps of Independence hall. In the steps of the old Statehouse an old man grasps the ringing tangle of a great bell on which is inscribed "Proclaim liberty throughout the land unto all the inhabitants thereof." Far below him stands a lad waiting to call up to him the momentous news—if it should come!—that the ring of the bell through all the eons as long as the earth shall stand. "They dare not do it! They will not do it!" murmurs the crowd in the streets. "They never will do it! They dare not do it!" echoes the old bell-ringer. In the room where immortality is made, men with loss of sleep and indescribable emotions, John Adams and blunt Benjamin Franklin argue ponderously and fiercely for the adoption of their "declaration of independence," which Thomas Jefferson put into words an evening or so before. Roger Sherman, sailow of face, nods his sage head grimly from time to time—he had written much of the "declaration," too, but Tom's wording was better—as the debate goes on. Livingston, silent and pondering, as usual, silent, patient as the slow gods, watches with strange intensity the face of each objecting congressman or "delegate." It was like this the day before—sharp fighting. But now, at last, the debate is finished—like the snap of a broken wire too long taut. The end comes with a rush—the "declaration" is adopted. There is a stir—an unvoiced murmur. The boy who stands waiting at the door far below calls up to the old man in the steps, "Ring, Ring, Ring! Grand pa, ring!" And, on the moment, the brazen clangor of the bell begins—in an instant a wave of sound from the other bells in the city peaks out in accordant harmony. From the streets a mighty roar goes up. The people are mad with joy because more than fifty wise and good men have decided to sign such a document of liberty as the old world has never seen before. Shrieking, hallooing, beating the air with fists and canes, the patriots shout with voices

A MOST IMPRESSIVE
CEREMONY IS HELD

Large Class of Candidates Is Initiated at Chillicothe—Many Spectators Present

CHILICOTHE, O., July 2.—A most impressive ceremony was held here on Monday night of last week when the Ku Klux Klan initiated a large class of candidates at a point east of the end of the Main street car line. More than 8,000 persons journeyed to the spot to witness the ceremony which created a most beautiful scene.

At seven o'clock in the evening Main street was jammed with automobiles headed for the place where it was believed that the initiation was to take place. At eight o'clock, the time set for the ceremony to begin, it is estimated that more than 1,000 automobiles were jammed along Main street within a few blocks of the park.

Three "K's" symbolizing the organization, blazed into flame at about 8:30. It was then seen that within a circle of Klansmen in full regalia that a big class of candidates stood ready for the ceremonial which then got under way.

A huge fiery cross blazed as the candidates pledged themselves to uphold the Christian religion and the Constitution of the United States. The ceremony lasted about two hours. That rise above the wild, sweet, free clang and clamor of the joyous bells, his lips drawn—reads once more to himself the last line of that famous pronouncement—"and for the support of this declaration, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor." He looks up, nods, then carefully, in as large letters as his pen will make, he signs the paper. From without the countless thousands of a people's deathless joy come into him in tumultuous cadences. Franklin, now that the great stress is over, smiles his broad, contented smile, and slumps forward a little in his seat. Jefferson folds his thin, nervous hands together so sharply that the nails cut the flesh. Then there is a sort of pause, but, on the instant, those history-making fathers begin their march to the desk. And one can almost hear, above the muffled roar of the multitude outside, the sharp scratching of the fateful quill—

Many people who were, at first, enemies of the Klan, have become converted to the truth, loyalty, and fervency of its teachings. One of our objectors says: "We have always believed in free schools—schools for and by the people. The Klan certainly stands for that. Free schools should make a people eternally free from the dangers of doubt and bigotry." Another remarks: "The Klan is really a wholly American institution recognizing no head outside of our own country. Even in religion it is more tolerant than its enemies." And again, another points out that remarkably far-seeing suggestion of Daniel Webster: "Let our object be our country, our whole country, and nothing but our country." Entire pages might be taken up in showing that the truest and most loyal men and women of the present day are turning, just as the fathers of old, to risk their lives and fortunes, and to pledge their sacred honor to keep this country pure for religion, science, art, and the holy offices of patriotic understanding and ideal American good government.

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SPECULATION TAKES PLACE OF SURPRISE FOLLOWING SERMON

Rev. J. M. Eakins' Mention of Rev. F. E. Davison's Actions in Cause of Comment

Rumor of "Lecture Tour" Can Not Be Verified—Liberty Hall Project Is Boosted—Letter Received

Speculation has followed the surprise occasioned by the farewell sermon of Rev. James M. Eakins, former pastor of the Memorial Presbyterian Church, located at Ashland avenue and Eleventh street, when the pastor delivered a sermon taken by his congregation to be anti-Klan. His remarks indicated to the minds of many that he was fully in accord with the action of the "mysterious sixteen," who passed a resolution at a special meeting held while the president of their body was out of town and justification of which was not given all the members.

The speculation has arisen among certain members of the church as to why Reverend Eakins chose a sermon of this kind as his farewell address before his congregation. The sermon added one to the list of resigned ministers who have preached anti-Klan sermons. Just why Reverend Eakins chose to mention Rev. F. E. Davison, deposed pastor of the Englewood Christian Church, who, it is understood, has been the recipient of a letter from Priest Smith of the St. Philip Neri Catholic Church, commending him on his stand against the Klan, is not known.

Cases Quite Different
 Reverend Eakins' case is quite different from that of Reverend Davison, who was asked to resign because of his alleged despotic actions in dictating what could or what could not be held in the way of meetings in the Englewood Community Hall, a hall which it has been charged, was urged by Reverend Davison in an attempt to block the movement to construct a ten-story building in East Michigan street, to be used as a community home for Protestant churches of that part of the city.

It is said that Priest Smith was much opposed to the building, which is to be known as Liberty Hall, fearing, it is alleged, that it would interfere with the activities of his church. A committee of nine, it is charged, was appointed by Priest Smith to spread propaganda against the building of the hall.

A member of Priest Smith's church, a Mrs. Kirby, who has since acquired the title of "official heckler," was in the community hall of the Englewood Church on the night of the 100 per cent American meeting, and heckled one of the speakers. She has since appeared and heckled other speakers delivering addresses on Americanism. The meeting, in question was bitterly opposed by Reverend Davison and Priest Smith.

Since the resignation of Reverend Davison, who is a member of the board of trustees of Butler College, and is working in co-operation with Gus Ezyrosmann of the H. P. Wason Company, to secure the removal of a trustee who is fighting to keep Butler from being made subservient to Catholic influences, the Hustling Hundred of the Englewood Church has gotten behind the Liberty Hall project and the movement is going forward with renewed vigor. The movement has been purged of all Catholic influences.

To "Quit Their Pulpits"
 A report that Reverend Davison would spend his time in lecturing against the Klan, could not be verified. It is believed that the report followed the statement by a Christian minister, who was one of the "mysterious sixteen," that certain ministers would "quit their pulpits to devote all their time against the Ku Klux Klan if the Klan didn't quit being so active." Whether or not these ministers were to be paid as lecturers by the un-American Unity League could not be learned.

Due to the fact that the Christian Church is wholly a congregational church—that is, the ministers are to be guided by the will of their congregations, and can not speak or act for the church without the will of the congregation—has brought much criticism on the actions of the "mysterious sixteen." Christian ministers who voted on the resolution condemning the Klan and approving the act of a brother minister who defied

the church laws. It has also been pointed out that the "mysterious sixteen" represent in this city a very, very small minority of the approximately two hundred Christian ministers and pastors in Indianapolis.

Fundamental Principles Disregarded
 It is understood that other Christian pastors in this city are hanging in the balance, due to certain sermons against a movement that is commended by the vast majority of their congregations. The actions of a small group of Christian ministers, which did not represent the sentiments of the congregations or the majority of the Christian ministers and pastors of the city, by a big degree, in voting through a resolution condemning a man, whose acts were in direct opposition to the fundamental principles upon which the Christian church is founded, has not set well with thousands of members of the Christian church in this city.

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GREAT ACTIVITY IN AND NEAR T. HAUTE

THREE HAUTE, Ind., July 2.—It was reported that more than 1,000 men were initiated into the Ku Klux Klan on last Thursday evening at the grounds purchased by the Klan on Lafayette road. It is also rumored that a big ceremony at which approximately 3,000 members will be initiated, will be held at the same place tonight. The park, which contains twenty-two acres, was a scene of great activity last night, but no news was officially given out by the Klansmen. On Thursday night a steady stream of automobiles fanned into the park for more than three hours.

Reports from Black Hawk and New-Goshen state that ceremonies were held at those places where large classes of candidates were initiated.

MURDEROUS ATTACK

ON UNARMED MEN

Rain of Shots Follow Lighting

of Fiery Cross—Vulgar

Language Used

PORT WAYNE, Ind., July 2.—No
arrests have been made following
the firing on men who are said to
have been lighting the Fiery Cross
while leaving the spot where they had
lighted a fiery cross at Dunfee, a vil-
lage in this county. Ten or twelve
shots were fired at the alleged Klan-
smen by men who emerged from a
house in that vicinity. The language
used by the men who fired on the
unarmed men is said to have been
extremely vile and vulgar.

The affair added one more such
incident to the long and growing list
in which enemies of the Klan have
been on unarmed men and in some
instances women. One man, Leo
Hogan, is now in jail at Knox, In-
diana, and his bond fixed at \$25,000
for having fired into a meeting where
alleged Klansmen and women were
in attendance. Knox is not far from
Port Wayne.

True Colors Are Seen
The lawless acts of the opposition
is redounding to the favor of the
Klan, however. Persons who once
believed the stories vilifying the Klan
are now having incidents in which
the enemy's true colors are shown
and are beginning to change their
minds. The incident at Dunfee has had
a stimulating effect and Protestants
are realizing more than ever that
any organization which is strictly

A certain magazine has recently
had an entertaining article by a man
that was born in a foreign land, who,
after he came to the United States,
married a woman born in another
country. For years both of them
looked longingly to the scenes and
associations of their childhood days.
They had on old memories and planned
for the time when they could go
back to enjoy the many blessings of-
fered by their native lands. America
treated them well; they were prosper-
ed abundantly, and had a large
circle of acquaintances and friends,
and two children.

Finally the long-looked-for oc-
casion arrived and they embarked on
an ocean liner for the countries of
their nativity, tenderly recalling the
memories of the past. It is amusing
to read the writer's experiences. How cir-
cumstanced were the lives of their
old friends and acquaintances! Most
of the women never even read a
newspaper, except incidentally; and
the men knew little of the great
problems Europe was confronting.
(Our two American friends thought
these would be the chief topics of
conversation.) Instead, they talked
of the prices of vegetables at the
local market, or other matters of
small importance. As the days went
by, this man and his wife were more
and more disillusioned, and in their
minds compared the wonderful ad-
vantages offered by the United
States to the very limited advantages
of the countries of Europe.

The people that have lived here
all their lives little realize how
much they have to be thankful for.
However, a study of conditions in
the old world will give them some
conception of their blessings. They
are living under the Stars and
Stripes, the most glorious national
emblem in all the world. Here we
enjoy a measure of liberty that no
other people in the world have.
While some other governments may
be "liberal," the citizens are so ham-
pered by old traditions, systems, etc.,
that they do not have the opportu-
nity for progress that we have. When
a man or woman is surrounded by
the ways of the past and by people more
or less in bondage to ancient cus-
toms he is terribly handicapped.

A recent magazine article is de-
voted to a study of the premier of
Italy, Mussolini, who, it appears, is
one of the most ambitious dictators
since the days of Napoleon. He is
said to have written strongly against
a government of the people, by the
people, and for the people. He is
said to make his way when there is so
much opposition on every hand to
liberty of action and conscience, and
such a mass of traditions and other
relics of the past, is as difficult as to
traverse an African jungle. But in
this glorious country there is less to
hinder the progressive soul than
anywhere else on the earth.

We have a great variety of food
products, plenty of coal, oil, ores of
various kinds, great forests, water-
power, etc. The country is compar-
atively new and therefore not handi-
capped by traditions to the extent
the old world is. We have free
speech, a free press, religious liberty,
and abundant opportunity to de-
velop sturdy moral character. While
there are many in our national life to
deplore, yet when this land is com-

which to rejoice.

As we have just observed Decora-
tion day, when the heroes of the civil
war were honored, and are ap-
proaching Independence day, which is
celebrated in honor of the signing of
that immortal document, the Declara-
tion of Independence, we should
think more seriously of how much
we owe to our country and what our
duties and responsibilities are; and
we can best repay those who have
gone before for their sacrifice and
love of liberty by doing our utmost
to preserve what they purchased at
so great a cost.

EVANSVILLE JUDGE DENOUNCES TACTICS

behind the movement here to clean up the bootlegging conditions. He vilified the organization and brought out the fact that Gordon is a Jew. He offered no other defense for Gordon.

It is understood that Abe Silverman, who on Saturday morning stood in the hall outside the courtroom while the jury was out on a bootlegging case, and offered to bet "a hundred to a nickel" that the defendant would be acquitted, paid all attorney fees in connection with the Gordon case. Silverman also stated that he would run over any member of the detective association which is aiding the Klan in the cleanup following the refusal of the city police to act, that he could.

Silverman Wants to Bet
The jury in the Gordon case disagreed and on Saturday morning, in the case of Eugene Culley, charged with illicit sale of liquor, at which time Silverman wanted to bet that Culley would be acquitted, the jury brought in a verdict of not guilty. The jury venues for these cases are selected by the chief of police and the city clerk.

City Clerk Foley, who created much excitement in court about ten days ago when the bootlegging cases began getting under way by throwing his arms about and seeking an argument with Joe Huntington of the detective association, which acted on information furnished by the Ku Klux Klan, when the police refused to act, has not been in court for several days. It has been stated as an open fact that Foley has gone on the bonds of bootleggers in the past.

This latter statement has brought up the question of who went on the head of a negro arrested last Wednesday night on the charge of transporting liquor, and when the police left two grips of liquor at the southern railroad crossing and refused to confiscate it, telling members of the detective association that it was up to them to move it "because one of the two negroes got away." The association detectives took the two grips containing the liquor to the county jail. The above mentioned liquor consisted of several gallons of alcohol and whisky. A report of this arrest and confiscation has not appeared in the local newspapers. The liquor was being brought here from Chicago.

Police Notified
The association detectives had been notified of the shipment and told the police that the liquor was to be brought in on a certain train. That things are reaching a climax here is not to be doubted. Klan investigators, backed by the Indiana Detective Association, which is making the arrests because of the refusal of the local police to co-operate in the clean-up, are quietly planning a new attack on the vice in Evansville. The acts of certain attorneys in court and the fact that convictions are hard to secure will lead the investigation into entirely new channels, it is understood.

Attorneys have tried in every way to belittle the detective association which is acting under the state laws of Indiana, and are working up the fires of prejudice in court by attempting to get alleged bootleggers acquitted by attacking and vilifying the Klan. Lorin Kiely, the attorney who was administered in court on Saturday morning, and whose father is a member of the police in the sanitary department, referred to the detectives as "stool pigeons."

Special Judges Demanded
Judge Ireland, who demanded that there be order in the court room during his absence, has not sat on any of the cases arising from arrests made by the detectives, the attorneys demanding special judges.

Attorney John W. Spencer, who vilified the Klan on Friday, was the cause of the scathing rebuke by Judge Ireland Saturday morning. Gordon, the defendant, was in need of a defense and it is understood that Spencer virtually admitted that his only hope was to create sentiment against the Klan. His remarks created much disorder in the courtroom. It is understood the jury stood ten to two for conviction in the Gordon case. In the case of John Orr, which was tried on last Tuesday and in which the jury disagreed, it is said that the vote stood ten to two for conviction.

It is believed here today that perjury charges will grow out of some of the cases tried in court by the defendants were arrested by members of the detective association. Much conflicting evidence has been heard. While this is usual in most cases, the trials are marked with "too many alibis," as one attorney put it.

Klan Membership Increases

The trials are having the effect of causing the citizens of Evansville to give more attention to certain charges made that Evansville is the scene of much vice. Sarcasm and vilification by attorneys, who are seeking the release of men arrested on bootlegging charges, is not sitting well with thousands of Evansville residents. The reaction is that the Ku Klux Klan of this city is increasing its membership at a greatly increased rate.

Perry Klansmen Hold Big Meeting

PERRY, Ia., June 29.—One of the most beautiful ceremonies staged in Iowa in recent months took place near this city when a huge class of candidates from Perry and nearby towns were naturalized into the Invisible Empire of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

can't guess as to the actual fiscal contribution of the federal government.

The treasury does keep, and publishes, a record of the amount of money received and paid out. It doesn't strike a balance on that basis, however, because the figures are given with reference to matters almost equally important and somewhat more complex. At the present moment, there have been filed and are pending unpaid bills against the treasury for more than \$100 million. No treasury statement reaches such trifles.

Recently an unofficial report was made to determine the national balance sheet, such as any legitimate business concern would be expected to make. The report was competent and painstaking as they were, had to admit almost complete failure. It was not possible to make more than the most fragmentary report. It was revealed that the treasury had a cash balance of about a cash book, which perhaps does not contain fifty per cent of what ob-

First, that, if in a single year the government were to pay its current unbonded debts, wipe out deficits, liquidate even those pending claims which have been audited and approved, and meet regularly appropriated annual expenses, at least ten billions of revenue would be required.

least five billions of current liabilities, with about one billion of quick assets on the right side of the ledger.

Since its creators are not here to rewrite that provision of the constitution to make it function as they intended, let us now undertake, in their honor and our interest as citizen stockholders to make the basic law so specific with reference to all-important fiscal matters that no man

That part of the constitution which should be rewritten to provide for an annual balance sheet, a balance sheet which would reveal to the last detail the actual condition of the treasury. It should show—

- Receipts and expenditures;
- All unpaid bills, with their auditors and
- Outstanding claims against every

There should be revealed fully the extent and status of the public's national property.

All debt transactions should be disclosed.

The lid should be lifted with reference to all internal revenue matters—Tax returns, refundments, fines at the ruling should be regarded as public records, and treated accordingly.

In short, the present practice half-truth, and the rest secret should be superseded by a constitutionally imposed principle of the whole truth, and nothing but the whole truth, and nothing but the complete, impartial truth, with a complete disclosure of the treasury.

Congressional Reconstruction

The national legislature has descended to such depths of political depravity that the constitution makers would hardly recognize it as the representative institution established by them.

Particularly is the house so completely boss-controlled that its con-

duct is regularly both an evasion and a violation of the constitution, especially when it is done by a senator. It is usually and publicly. It organizes itself upon the basis of a special privilege, and it is a permanent public service. It is a privilege which is not subject to challenge in the face of the basic law ignoring the unequivocal mandate of the constitution to the senate for record votes. It has set up a contrivance called seniority through which to bestow power upon the few and to deprive the many of participation in government and of the right of instruction. It is hapless and it is a waste of time. It is a waste of the funds that time best spent which would have been better spent upon the pettiest of personal and local legislation. With respect to appropriations and revenue, it is a waste of time. It is a waste of the more and more numerous duties, as the constitution has imposed duties, as the part of the lawmaking branch which

The constitution must now be amended to deal specifically with the crucial public problem of the legislative machinery. There has developed such subtle secrecy, so much false precedent and practice, so many unwritten laws, that through no

The constitution should be constructively changed to provide:

First, that every election contest shall be decided by state or local authorities, to prevent the present shameful delays in such matters, guard against selfish partisan results and to protect the fundamental principle that the right of choice

not in congress, but in the people themselves. Let house and senate retain the power of punishment and eviction for just causes, but when membership is disputed that is should no more be a subject of legislative manipulation, or barter of trade, than should an original election.

Second, that Congress shall meet not thirteen months hence, but within six months.

KU KLUX KLAN CELLERATES AT SEBRING**Immense Throng Gathered for Occasion—Crowd Estimated at 25,000**

SEBRING, Ohio, July 2.—We have in our eventful career seen many gatherings of a patriotic nature, but we believe we have never seen one that showed more One Hundred Per Cent Americanism than the one at Sebring last Saturday.

There was nothing secret about the meeting place as all the roads were marked with three big K's and arrows pointing the way to the meeting place. Also signs advertising the meeting were to be seen everywhere. All who desired to see and all who were curious had the opportunity to satisfy that curiosity in full.

As we entered the town, and even before we were struck with the spirit of the occasion. Scarcely a house but displayed "Old Glory" in some form or other, and every street displayed a profusion of Red, White and Blue in the form of flags, bunting, pennants, etc. It surely had the appearance of a gala day.

As the day advanced the crowds were continually augmented by new arrivals until by the time of the parade, 9 o'clock, p. m., the streets were virtually impassable. And the parade—say, boy, it was sure some pageant. Fully two miles of marching men, four to ten abreast, led by a Klan file and drum corps, and interspersed with several other bands, among them being the famous Boys' Band of Alliance, uniformed in white sailor suits. About two thousand Klansmen, in robes, marched in the van, led by officers on horse, and they were followed by thousands of other Klansmen in civilian clothing. Along the entire line of march the procession was loudly cheered by the spectators. One of the patriotic and imposing sights was a large cross done in red electric light bulbs suspended over the street. As the huge American flags passed nearly all the spectators bared their heads. The crowd in attendance was estimated at 25,000, coming from Akron, Cleveland, Youngstown, Pittsburg, New Castle, Alliance, East Palestine, East Liverpool, Warren, Ravenna and many other places.

After the parade a meeting was held at the race track and a class of about fifteen hundred was initiated. The grounds were then thrown open to all, and a fireworks display was given which would rival some of the best Fourth of July demonstrations.

Sebring handled the big crowd nicely and most hospitably. And, say, it was the most orderly crowd you ever saw. As is always the case

at Klan meetings there was not a fight, not even an exchange of words during the whole day; and still some say the Klan is an awful bunch.

One thing that was striking was the fact that places with the 100% sign up were crowded to capacity all day and evening. It certainly showed the spirit of Klansmen toward One Hundred Percenters. One restaurant man told us that never in all of his long experience in Sebring had he had such a day. No circus or other demonstration had ever brought such a crowd to town.

The first Nashville gathering of the Klans since reconstruction days was staged June 1, by Nashville Klan, Realm of Tennessee, on the top of historic Fort Morgan Hill near the city water works. Several hundred allons were naturalized and thousands of people were attracted to the scene by the huge fiery cross which could be seen from all points of the city.

Ku Kluxers Present \$10,086 to Hospital at Joplin, Missouri

JOPLIN, Mo., July 2.—Nine robed Klansmen, members of Ozark Klan No. 8, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, Connor hotel and presented \$10,086 in cash to campaign workers for the Freeman Memorial hospital who had met to report results of the follow-up campaign of the financial drive launched recently.

The gift, with a letter of explanation, was handed to C. S. Bankard, presiding chairman, who accepted the donation in behalf of the workers. The Klansmen were given a long ovation when Bankard read the letter and thanked the representatives of the Klan.

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KLANSIM BOOMING IN HAWKEYE STATE**Scores of Meetings Every Night—And Klansmen Are Being Made by Hundreds**

BURLINGTON, Ia., June 20.—Klansim is still booming along in fine shape in the Hawkeye state, and scores of good meetings in every section of the state, every night, and a few hundred added to the membership every week. Rev. L. M. Doren, formerly a Sioux City pastor, was back on a visit to his old field a few days ago, and made several Klan speeches. He is in Kansas City, now, and active in Klan work there. Last Saturday Rev. J. E. Sanders of

Marshalltown, delivered a strong address to an open meeting in that city, some people, and, have been noising about, trying to find out about Klan conditions at Oakland, but they got no information. Some people appear to have lots of time to attend to the business of other people.

Moffett was a minister of the Christian church and was a graduate of Butler college at Indianapolis.

ATTEMPT TO ATTACK REV. TOM ROBERTS**Police Guard Klan Speaker at Clinton**

CLINTON, Ia., June 30.—It was necessary to call police to quiet a troublemaker during an address by Rev. Tom Roberts, imperial lecturer for the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, during his address before an open meeting here last night.

A man started for the platform during the address with the apparent intention of attacking Roberts. Persons in the audience subdued him and police were called to protect the speaker. No further trouble was experienced and the talk was well received.

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Giant Ceremony at Crowley, La.—700 Aliens Are Initiated

CROWLEY, La., July 2.—More than 700 aliens were naturalized at a giant ceremonial here last week, to which special trains were run from many points in Louisiana and Texas. Some came from as far west as Houston.

Five thousand Klansmen came in by trains and other thousands came by automobile. More than eight special trains were run. Preceding the ceremony a big barbecue was served as a compliment from the Crowley Klan to the visitors.

An interesting feature of the day's

events was a horse race program in which the events were ridden by Klansmen in full regalia. A big brass band was in attendance throughout the day—all Klansmen.

SIoux CITY, Iowa, July 2.—Another narrow-minded grand master of Masons has developed in F. W. Glaze of this state. At a recent grand lodge meeting here Glaze said that there is no excuse for the Klan and that Masons should not join the Klan. He further said that Klan meetings must not be held in Masonic halls.

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GARY MAYOR SUPPORTED BY ALIEN INTERESTS

Court Fight for Control of City to Override "Vox Pop"

(By Staff Correspondent)

GARY, Ind., July 3.—The mayor of Gary, convicted by a jury in federal court for conspiracy to defeat the Volstead act, R. O. Johnson, the mayor of Gary, who refused a permit for a public meeting by the Ku Klux Klan after a week's deliberation, has been vindicated by the people of Gary.

The Gary Ku Klux Klan took no aid in the election, but the count of the votes for and against the proposition, is, nevertheless, an indication of the opinion of the people of Gary on the issue of government campaign, which ended last Tuesday with a vote against its adoption of two and a half to one.

Johnson's refusal to resign the majority after his conviction is accountable for the election, held for the distinct purpose of putting Johnson out of office and riding the city of its politician. The Post-Tribune, Gary's newspaper, sponsored the movement for a complete change in the personnel of city officials.

An unusually large colored vote was responsible for the defeat of the new form of government, declares the International News Service, heart-owned. Half of the anti-vote was colored, it is said.

Johnson jumped into the campaign against the proposed change of government and lined up the forces which had placed him in the previous election. Johnson and his cohorts beat the opposition, which was first and last for a wholesale clean-up. By the vote in which the movement was defeated, the mayor, convicted criminal and an enemy to clean city government, says he is vindicated.

The mayor has filed bonds for appeal to the United States circuit court. So has the majority of the other convicted law violators. City Judge Dunn, one of the prominent figures in the Johnson administration, resigned and is now serving his term in a federal prison.

Gary, with its twenty-eight different nationalities represented in its cosmopolitan goulash, has a thickening of negroes, comprising a condition 75 per cent ineligible for membership in the Ku Klux Klan. This majority, for the most part, is law-abiding, if the laws suit and fit in with the community life. Otherwise, the laws don't suit and they don't fit in.

Prohibition officials call it the wettest city in America. Mayor R. O. Johnson does not claim his election by the Protestant element of the community.

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BUCKEYE KLAN IN ACTION

Parade and Naturalization Follows Fiery Cross and Bombs in Air

MANCHESTER, O., June 28.—The Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of Mansfield and vicinity held a meeting north of this city Thursday night at 8:30, June 27, which was attended by one thousand Klansmen and men without the ranks who were very eager to join the ranks of the Invisible Empire.

The parade was preceded by an automobile decorated with a fine cross and containing Klansmen who gave this city an awakening idea of the activities of Klandom. After an arousing address by a noted Klan speaker who spoke on the ideals of the organization, over one hundred candidates were given permission to become members of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan. The meeting was closed with the burning of five beautiful fiery crosses and the firing of several large aerial bombs. Two hundred and fifty-one automobiles conveyed the great number to the field of meeting. Other meetings of similar nature are being planned and old Richland county can be counted on to put it over.

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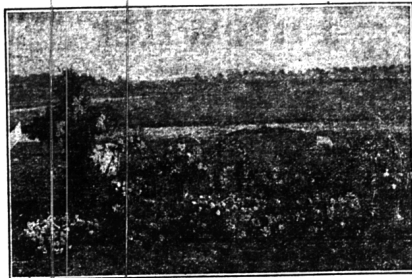
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KLAN TAKES PART IN FUNERAL

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WASHINGTON, D. C., July 2.—About three months ago an incendiary fire which broke out in the dead of night damaged one of the buildings of the Catholic university at Washington, D. C. Sixty young priests, lacking time to don their petticoats, scuttled out into the snow clad only in their nightgowns.

Immediately the newspapers of the country with their customary fairness wrote long articles pointing out that the fire had been caused by a band of masked men, armed with pistols, who broke into the building and set it on fire.

Catholic authorities of the college slyly fostered the idea that the work was that of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan and many wild-jamming editorials appeared giving this order credit for the outrage.

A "Bunk" Story

The following story was sent all over the United States by the United Press and is typical of the manner in which this "bunk" was headlined all over the country:

"Masked men fired a portion of the Catholic university here early Sunday.

Holding up a negro orderly at the point of a pistol they distributed kerosene-soaked rags throughout Caldwell hall and made good their escape before the flames swept through the building, causing damage estimated at \$1,000.

Monsignor George A. Dougherty, vice-rector of the university, making a report on the fire, directly charged it to incendiaries.

Clad only in their night clothing, sixty student priests, who lived in the building, were forced to seek other shelter in the white firemen fought the blaze.

"Authorities say a similar attempt was made on Trinity college, national Catholic girls' school, several weeks ago. Trinity college alumnus Catholic university, which is considered the greatest sectarian university in the country.

"The rooms in which the fire was started were occupied by a priest who was out of town. His apartment is on the third floor. There are two rooms to the suite. In the closet of one was found rags saturated with kerosene.

"The bed in the chamber was soaked with inflammable fluid and in a closet adjoining was packed a large quantity of some ignitable green substance which encouraged the flames.

"The gunmen, after their attack on the negro orderly, vanished in the hallway and escaped.

"A thorough investigation has been ordered by the powers at the university. It is earnestly believed by them that an anti-Catholic motive is to be blamed for the deed."

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One Fair Editor

The following editorial appeared in a recent edition of the Daily Progress, Charlottesville, Va.:

"While it may be true in some respects that the much-discussed 'Ku Klux Klan' has proven itself to be obnoxious in some parts of the country, it is just as true that some of the steps taken to suppress its activities in general, are just as obnoxious to the fundamental principles of American rights and sense of justice."

The recent developments at the national headquarters in Atlanta, Ga., go to show that there has been a very determined and thorough-going renovation of the organization, as well as a drastic house-cleaning, and the order bids fair to gradually remove the stigma which hitherto had adhered to it, mainly because of the wild and unauthorized actions of chance members here and there. And it can be recognized as a definite and very positive fact, that the deep-laid and settled efforts of certain elements in this country to suppress it as renovated and reorganized, will meet with conspicuous and entire failure.

But the particular instance of un-American hostility we have in mind, and against which strong protest has already been made and voiced in the press, is the foolish and drastic statute adopted by the New York State legislature, and signed by Governor Alfred E. Smith, requiring that all secret orders shall file with the secretary of state the names of the members. This is the extreme of legislative usurpation and interference, it must be admitted, and the members of the Ku Klux Klan have a perfect right to protest, as well as to refuse to comply with such an absurdly unconstitutional enactment. No matter what the Ku Klux Klan may do, or may have done, that does not justify the arbitrary invasion of the rights of privacy and peaceful assembly in this great country.

Governor Smith has already done several questionable acts affecting the rights and privileges of the majority of the people, but if he thinks that he will be able to gain favor by becoming sponsor for such an unnecessary and un-American regulation as this latest one aimed at the Klan, then he had better abandon his lofty ambitions to advance in national affairs and politics, and confine himself to direct work and activity for the people he is catering to in allowing this iniquity to be put upon the statute books of the greatest state in the Union."

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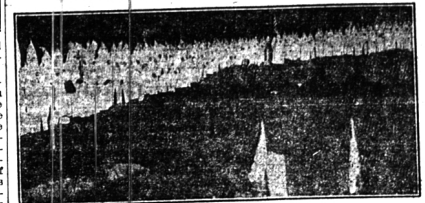
