

KENTUCKY MAYORS MADE TARGET OF WRATH

Citizens of Lexington Hold Monster Protest Meeting Following Arrest of Man Who Leads Gathering in Lord's Prayer and Singing of "America"

Victim of Wrath Directed From Foreign Shore Placed Under \$2,000 Bond—Case Now Under Advisement—Kentuckians Are Responding to Clarion Call—Incident Similar to Other Outrages.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Aug. 14.—Dr. E. H. Lougher, arrested here on August 1 immediately following the recitation of the Lord's prayer and the singing of the national anthem, and whose case was taken under advisement on last Friday, was fined \$200 and costs by Judge Joseph H. Bullock. It was stated here today by attorneys for the defendant that the case will be appealed by the defendant as "it is necessary to establish the right of free speech." Judge Bullock is considered a "protege" of Mayor Bradley, who is responsible for the situation, and is expecting the aid of the mayor at the next election, it is understood. Dr. Lougher is at liberty on a \$200 appeal bond.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Aug. 13.—Never before in the memory of the present generation in this city has there been the indignation manifest as is now felt in this city following the arrest of Dr. E. H. Lougher on August 1 as he stood on the courthouse steps in this city immediately following his having led an assembly in the Lord's prayer and the singing of the first verse of "America." The intense feeling found vent in a big protest meeting here on last Wednesday night, at which resolutions were adopted condemning the actions of the police and deprecating the incident which brought disgrace to the city.

The protest meeting was held on the night immediately following the arrest of Dr. Lougher, and at which many witnesses were heard and which lasted over until midnight. At the conclusion of the hearing of the evidence Judge Joseph H. Bullock took the case under advisement. Dr. Lougher is at liberty on bond.

Intense Interest in Trial

Intense interest centered in the trial and this interest was given a boost when it was testified by a witness that he saw a Catholic priest give the order to the policeman who arrested Dr. Lougher.

The arrest of Dr. Lougher took place on the night of August 1 when he was taken into custody by a crowd of 1,000 persons as he stood upon the courthouse steps. The arrest followed the recitation of the Lord's prayer and the singing of the first verse of "America." Dr. Lougher was taken to a despot in attempting to deny American citizens the right of free speech. County officials have given the speaker the right to use the courthouse steps and the high-banded methods of the local officials, which are now being condemned on every side, was almost beyond the belief of the citizens of Lexington who feel deeply the disgrace of this arrogant and un-American act.

Dr. Lougher had spoken less than five minutes and, according to persons who were in the audience, had said absolutely nothing that could in any way be construed as "riotous conduct." He had not mentioned the Ku Klux Klan when he was arrested by the police. The arrest was simply an act of an arrogant and despotic official, and the outcome of the incident now at work to undermine the institutions of America and to drag down her ideal of freedom and devastating foreign political ring operating in this country, as in others, under the cloak of "freedom."

Repeats Lord's Prayer; Arrested

When the speaker was arrested and dragged off to jail, he was liberated on a \$100 bond after being charged with inciting a riot. C. C. Bosworth, of the sheriff's office, went on the bond. Dr. Lougher returned to the courthouse where the crowd awaited him and led the gathering in the Lord's prayer, which was followed by the singing of the first verse of "America." As the last words were being spoken, he was again arrested and thrown into a cell at the county jail. He was again liberated on a \$100 bond signed by A. S. Johnson, father of Deputy Sheriff Johnson. AMERICAN CITIZENS ORDERED FROM TOWN

Mayor of Leitchfield, Ky., Tells

Chief of Police to Take
Action Against Men

(Special to Flier Cross)

LEITCHFIELD, Ky., Aug. 13.—Following in the footsteps of the mayor of Leitchfield, Ohio, who has assumed rights to which the law, as interpreted by competent legal authorities, does not entitle him, he ordered out of town, through his chief of police, two American citizens because they wished to hold a meeting.

Floyd Padgett, of East Palestine, an employer of the mayor and asked permission to hold a meeting. They were "advised" by the mayor to leave town. Falling back on their rights as free American citizens, they refused to do until it is alleged that the chief of police, "called" on them and told them to "get out of town."

Followed Into Country

Padgett and his friend then left town and returned on last Thursday but were not allowed to enter the country. They were followed by a patrol of twelve miles into the country. It is understood that the mayor had attempted to arrest the two men in Leitchfield and it was at the "request" of the banker that the mayor was ordered to take them out of town. It is not verified, but it is generally known that the banker has "changed" his mind and for this reason he desires that the meetings be held.

DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 14.—The Klan wave has engulfed Michigan.

The meeting today was necessitated by action taken last night by interests opposed to the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, when riders were sent to the county notifying Catholics not to attend the fair because of the truck being on the grounds. This fair is under boycott following the midnight rides in the interests of those alien influences that are battling against the survival of Protestantism.

The Midnight Ride

At midnight last night members of the board of directors were called from their beds and notified of the impending boycott if The Fiery Cross truck was not removed from the grounds at once. Hurrying and securing took place all night as mankind in Tipton received orders from the higher-ups to force the removal of The Fiery Cross truck.

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PRESIDENT HARDING IS LAID AT REST IN CEMETERY IN MARION

Lies in Dim Vault Near Mother—
—Ceremony Ends Simply
and Calmly

No Solemn Music of Bands or
Military Pageant Marks
Funeral Cortege

MARION, O., Aug. 16.—A large cross of red and white flowers was among floral tributes received at the Harding home. Women in flowers were the letters "K. K. K." in a tag, "From the Ku Klux Klan." It was set at the front of the floral tributes on the lawn.

MARION, Ohio, August 12.—Harding of Ohio today is sleeping time away near the mother at whose knee his first childish dream of greatness was prattled.

Before his tomb, as the chiming voices of the choir sang softly among the trees, "Nearer, My God, to Thee," another tender, brave woman stood with aching heart, her veiled face lifted to the sky. A moment later she stepped a meager moment into the dim vault where the dead husband's remains lay. Then she turned away, brave to the last, to face the lonely years ahead. She waited not to see the iron gates close softly upon her dead.

Harding is home forever from life's high places, where the restless, heady winds of ambition blew; home beneath Ohio soil, for above him the vaulted room in Marion with grass-grown sod; home among the friends and neighbors of his youth, the kindly people of a kindly town. Time is ended for him and the shouting and clamor that surrounded the great is done.

Ended Simply, Calmly

It was a long road to that silent vault about which there closed tonight a guard of the citizen soldiery of his own state. There was endless ceremony of the nation's and the people's making to mark the way. But it ended simply, calmly and as the dead would have had it end. Aside from the multitude that waited the long way from his father's home to the vault and those who close-packed to make a living setting for the funeral rites, there was not much to mark it as the burial of one who had held highest power in his grasp. There were the tanned men of his guard from the stater services of the nation, the admiral and generals who formed his honor escort, the friend and comrade who now is president in his stead, the colleagues of his grief-stricken cabinet. That was all, except at the last, distant gunfire as he came to his tomb and the soft tones of a bugle sounding a soldier's requiem as the gates were closed.

Otherwise the funeral service was that of a simple and much-loved citizen of Ohio, for all Ohio seemed to have come today to bid him farewell. Through whose number will never be known, passed beside his casket and looked their last upon the dead face before the time for the last journey came.

Coolidge and Cabinet

From his father's house he went out again, carried by the steadfast men who have stood constantly to guard a dead commander. No solemn music of bands or military pageant marked his going, save the great flag of the president drooping in mourning and carried before him to the gates of the tomb as he went. In cars behind the simple hearse that carried now this honored leader, came President Coolidge and the cabinet and the friends and close kin. There, too, came Chief Justice Taft and General Pershing. Last to leave the memorial house was Mrs. Harding in black and with veiled face, and just ahead of her walked the old father, his face plainly showing the agony of his grief.

Through the silent, face-walled street the cortege passed and around the corner to the quiet cemetery. As it came toward the gates the guns spoke afar in honor.

The vault stands ivy-wrapped and set back into the gentle hill, with little space before it. So the funeral train was halted at a distance and the casket lifted down to be carried to a resting place before the open entrance of the tomb. Already a group of senators who knew this dead president under the capitol dome before he passed to the White House were gathered in waiting in line across the roadway that runs before the entrance. With them stood the corporation of calling days, Ford, Edison and Firestone.

Last Service Begins

The cabinet family came to stand closer, at the foot of the casket, with their new chief standing sorrowfully among them. The admirals, in gleaming white, lined the way to the left, the generals to the right, and beyond, behind the cabinet, stood the little party of intimates and friends who made the Alaska journey that death broke so suddenly.

Then came Dr. Harding, with the snows of his eighty years showing on his bare head, and then the brave widow, walking to her place at the right of the casket with Secretary Christian and the members of the grief-broken family.

Within the shadow of the doorway of the vault the casket stood. Then came the choir and the song, "Lead, Kindly Light." The last service for Warren Harding had begun. Prayers followed, spoken by an old friend of the dead president, the scriptural passages that hearten men in sorrow were read and again the choir sang. The last hymn of this simple, reverent service was "Nearer,

My God, to Thee," and as the soft blending voices came to the last chords Mrs. Harding slowly raised her veiled face and stood as though in prayer to Him above that the dead husband, who in a moment would be shut away from her forever, might know that peace beyond understanding, which God's mercy holds out to humanity at the last.

Proseune Benediction

The voices died away, and with lifted hand Bishop Anderson of the Methodist Episcopal Church pronounced the benediction: "Now unto Him that is able to keep us from falling, and to present us faultless before the presence of His Glory, with exceeding joy, to the only wise God, our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and forevermore. Amen."

The funeral party and the hundreds who lined them about stood motionless and silent a moment. Then the soldiers and sailors and marines who have kept the honor watch all the way from San Francisco and who alone have carried this casket stepped forward. Facing the tomb they lifted it slowly and slowly bore it in through the shadowy doorway. And at that moment the nation stood silent in sorrow.

FIERY CROSS TRIBUTE TO WARREN HARDING

Great Crowd Gathers on River Shore to See Klan Emblem—Heads Bowed in Sorrow

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Aug. 11.—Evansville Ku Klux Klan members paid tribute to the dead president last night by burning a fiery cross on the bank of the Ohio, immediately across the river opposite the foot of Main street. Several thousand persons gathered in Sunset park and along the river front, witnessed the ceremony, standing with bowed heads as the flaming tribute to the dead chief executive was burning.
Notices of the burning tribute passed out during the day caused hundreds to flock to the water front shortly after dark last night. An expectant hush fell over the throng when the hour bell of the U. S. S. Kanawha sounded 8:30 o'clock. A moment later a signal was flashed from the bridge of the revenue cutter to watchers on the opposite side of the river and the flaming cross leaped from the blackness of the Kentucky shore.

Presenters Vivid Picture
The cross, thirty feet high and twenty feet wide, presented a beautiful, vivid picture as it blazed against the inky background. It burned for nearly thirty minutes, during which time the crowd remained silent and watching. When the flames reached their height, a rowboat crept silently to the middle of the river and a clear baritone voice sang "Nearer, My God to Thee." An occasional flash of light lighting failed to deflect from the beauty of the blazing tribute.
When the cross reached its final embers, it was towed down the river and finally disappeared in the darkness.

NEWPORT, Ind., Aug. 10.—The Women of the Ku Klux Klan held initiation ceremonies here last week and the oath of Americanism was administered to a large class of candidates.
A parade of both Knights and Ladies in full regalia was held before the initiation ceremony, and a crowd of from 3,000 to 5,000 persons applauded them along the line of march.

THE MELTING POT IN AMERICA NO LONGER FUNCTIONS—CABLE

Congressman Declares Larger Cities Are "Merely Islands of Aliens"

Postal Savings Department Now Advertises in Twenty-four Languages

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 13.—"The melting pot in America, clogged by tens of thousands of unassimilable foreign-born immigrants, has ceased to function, and American cities are becoming veritable alien islands," says Congressman John L. Cable of Lima, Ohio.
"The greatest invasion of this country ever attempted by foreign-born persons began at 12:01 a. m., July 1 last," declares Congressman Cable, who has devoted much study to the immigration question. Influx of the quota for the new fiscal year, under the restrictive immigration law, began July 1, when fleets flying foreign flags and carrying thousands of immigrants were approaching American ports.
"Nothing is so important to a nation as the proper selection of the kind of people seeking to make up its population. We have no room for undesirable," the modern melting pot is ceasing to function. The alloys will not fuse.
Of the 14,000,000 foreign-born in our country less than half are naturalized. About 3,000,000 cannot speak the American language. Even the equal number can not read it. Our large cities are veritable alien islands in the United States. Even the postoffice department advertises its postal savings system in twenty-four languages. Tens of thousands of foreign-born are here unlawfully. Steamship companies, through the European press, are placing advertisements, indicating how our immigration laws may be avoided by traveling on their lines to Cuba. These conditions should not exist.

Congress Should Act
"Congress should enact promptly a national alien registration law under which those here unlawfully should be sent back to the country whence they came. Those naturalized, here lawfully, should be given opportunity for education. Then, if they reject our country and its constitution, let them return to the country of their choice. We have no room for but one language and one loyalty—to the United States."

The freedom of the press has been attacked and the right of citizens to gather in peaceful assemblies has been attacked. In practically each and every instance the same charge has been placed against the "offenders," that of riotous conduct. What is the influence behind this act in guiding them to acts against the freedom of American citizens? Is it coincidence that causes the same charge to be placed against the victims of this influence on widely different "offenses" in far removed localities? We can hardly believe so.

Concurs in Klan's View

More and more the newspapers of the country are coming to see that the demands of the Ku Klux Klan for the preservation of the white race are really the sound and sensible changes members of the organization have long known them to be.

When "The Old Man" gave his talk on "Back to the Constitution" at Buckeye lake, many garbled reports were published, and he was made to say many things he never had in mind. But he did advocate that the supreme court be not permitted to override the laws made by the direct representatives of the people. Many critics went on a hue and cry to the effect that the Klan would overturn the highest judicial body in the nation and other such nonsense.

In May, 1922, the supreme court declared unconstitutional the law enacted by congress for the purpose of curbing child labor. It is a fact, proved by official statistics, that since that action child labor in many lines of industry has increased enormously.

It will take as long as it will to pass a general amendment putting an end to the present pernicious practice of the federal courts."

We do not agree there. It is our opinion that before long an American congress will be elected which will see to it that the representatives of the people are the representatives in fact and as in name. They will return to the constitution—not amend it—but put into practice the plans laid in it by the founding fathers, and put a stop to the present abuse of its authority by the supreme court.

The procession was almost one mile in length and formed on the race track at the fair grounds and marched to the downtown streets of the city. Among the outstanding features of the parade, which was led by mounted Klansmen in full regalia, was a float representing the Ship of State.

As early as noon autoists began arriving at the fair grounds and by six o'clock it was estimated that ten thousand persons were in the grounds. Home-cooked food was served at booths which dotted the grounds. During the afternoon a balloon ascension was made and vaudeville acts were staged. The balloon was a massive affair and on each side was a fiery cross, twenty-two feet high.

Initiation Is Held

Late in the afternoon, after all vaudeville features were over, a national speaker for the Women of the Ku Klux Klan delivered an address to the women who were present. During the evening the women initiated a large class of candidates.

At eight o'clock Rev. Blair spoke before a crowd that jammed the grandstand and overflowed into the race track and took up all other available space surrounding the stand. He was interrupted repeatedly by applause.

KLAN SENDS FLORAL TRIBUTE TO HARDING

Dead President Exemplified Many Klan Ideals by His Public and Private Life

MARION, O., Aug. 11.—Ohio more than any other state in the Union feels the loss of Warren Gamaliel Harding, president of the United States, and her native son.

In the funeral services held here yesterday floral tributes were received from organizations, civic, patriotic, fraternal and benevolent orders, paying a last bit of homage to the deceased.

Among the tributes was a five-foot fiery cross, formed of scarlet lilies and straw flowers. On the cross-pieces were the initials, "K. K. K." in white flowers. The token was accompanied by a brief note of condolence to Mrs. Harding, signed, Invisible Empire, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

Thus nearly half a million members of the Ku Klux Klan in the Buckeye state paid their last respects to a man, who, although not a member of their organization, by his acts and daily life, exemplified many of the principles and ideals which this organization is seeking to bring about in American life.

Klansmen from all parts of the state attended the funeral services as private individuals.

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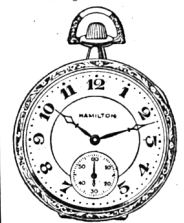

FOREIGNERS HOLD U. S. 'DOPE' LAW LIGHTLY

Deportation of Aliens Convicted of Breaking Narcotic Rules Is Demanded

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 11.—C. Madison, United States district attorney, announced recently that he would ask E. P. Reynolds, immigration officer in charge of the district, to add in compelling deportation charges against aliens found guilty of violating the Harrison anti-narcotic act.

"Every alien in the western Missouri district convicted of violating the narcotic act will be deported," Mr. Madison said. "Deportation action will be retroactive to June, 1922, when the narcotic act was amended, and the deportation clause approved."

Between one hundred and one hundred and fifty aliens, the large majority Italian, have been convicted of violating the narcotic act in the last year, Mr. Madison announced.

Complete Record Kept

A complete record of the proceedings against them will be kept, and when the sentences have expired the aliens will be arrested at the penitentiary area on deportation warrants and held.

More than 90 per cent of the local violators of the narcotic law are Italians, it is said.

"At present there are more than two hundred deportation proceedings pending in this district against aliens who are serving sentences in the penitentiary," Mr. Reynolds said. "All of the proceedings are not based upon a violation of the narcotic law, as other felonies are included."

MAYOR'S ACT BRINGS DOWN CRITICISM

(Continued from Page 1)

to \$1,000 each when, on the following Wednesday, the trial was continued. The action of City Attorney William George W. Ott signed both bonds.

Investigation conducted in this city by a correspondent of The Fiery Cross brings to light the fact that a certain political ring disturbed, and the un-American political machine. The testimony of at least one witness that a Roman Catholic priest was seen to give the word to the arresting officer, a Roman Catholic, was heard in evidence at the trial. That despite Bradley, officially known as mayor, and his followers are now feeling the effects of their un-American act is plainly seen. The efforts of time and the changing of the charge against the defendant to the charge of peace, can be construed in no other way.

Mayor Assumes Role of Nero

Mayor Bradley, in assuming the role of Nero and acting as if nothing was happening, has shown that no meeting could be held, took upon himself far too much. His action was not legal, but it was a deliberate, despicable, and only brought down upon his shoulders the condemnation and criticism of outraged citizens. The leading citizens of Lexington had no bones in denouncing the mayor. The protest meeting, at which more than 3,000 were in attendance, and which was led by Captain Keller, a war veteran now past eighty years of age, and Dr. H. E. Hardy, formerly of the University of Transylvania, showed how Lexington stands in opposition to the mayor. The latter was elected permanent chairman of the meeting which passed the resolution to condemn the acts of Mayor Bradley, E. K. Keller, O. S. Johnson and George Ott were chosen as a committee to deliver copies of the resolution to the city officials, press, the mayor and Dr. Lougher.

Mayor Bradley, who assumed the rights of a czar, declared that his reason for ordering the meeting stopped was that it was in the "interest of the city."

"On these grounds," said Mayor Bradley, "we ruled that the meeting in the interest of the city of Lexington would not be held and we will continue to resist such demonstrations as long as we are mayor of the city of Lexington."

To Redraft Constitution?

Inasmuch as a Roman Catholic priest was seen to give the word for the arrest of Dr. Lougher, and to swear testimony in court, it is interesting to ponder over just who we consist of. Due credit should be given the mayor, however, for admitting that he was but the "mayor of Lexington," instead of claiming that he was the United States Supreme Court, writer of the Declaration of Independence, president of the United States and governor of Kentucky, as his act would indicate he thought himself to be. In view of the fact that the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of Kentucky guarantees free speech, one might take it that he had drafted the constitution and was thinking of making a change in order to exclude members of the Ku Klux Klan or anyone who might wish to speak in their behalf or, in fact, anyone whose views did not coincide with those of the mayor, or whom the mayor might think would not if he should hear them.

At the protest meeting, H. B. Farrell was elected secretary. He said he was a Baptist minister and "proud of it."

Captain Keller stated that he was not a member of the Klan, but "if anybody wanted to arrest him for saying the Lord's prayer, let him do so and there would be more h— raised than enough."

Dr. Hardy also stated that he was not a member of the Klan. "We are here," said Dr. Hardy, "to enter a protest against any attempt to limit free speech, and that man or body of men who dares to keep a free-born American from speaking in an unbecomingly American liberty."

"I am an American," he continued, "and if talking is a crime, let me be tried for treason."

Speakers Applauded

Dr. Hardy, as well as others who spoke at the meeting, were applauded enthusiastically by those gathered there.

The meeting, the success of which was most gratifying to those who are decrying the mad acts of a self-centered mayor and a hidden influence, was the vent through which burning indignation held by the citizens of Lexington found outlet. No act of a public official has caused such criticism, condemnation and censure as has this wholly and wholly unwarranted arrest of a man who was leading an assemblage in prayer and the singing of the national anthem. A more un-American act is hard to imagine. Had it taken place in darkest Russia it possibly could have been understood. The stigma placed on the American city of Lexington by this despicable act has aroused the residents as nothing else could have done. Not only the citizens of Lexington, but the resentment reaches throughout the entire state of Kentucky. The reaction now being felt by those who perpetrated this nefarious arrest is terrific.

At the trial approximately ninety well-known citizens were ready to testify for the defense. Among these witnesses were ministers, business men, deputies from the sheriff's office, attorneys and other staunch citizens of this city.

Clergyman Is Implicated

After six witnesses for the defense had testified that there had been no disturbance and no attempt was made to interfere with the police, and there had been testimony that a Roman Catholic priest was seen to tell the arresting officer to proceed,

and the defense stated that the remaining testimony would be similar to that of the testimony already given, the court then agreed that the remaining eighty-eight witnesses would have testified to substantially the same things and that their names be recorded.

The first witness for the prosecution was Chief Reagan, who led the brave squad which swooped down on the man who was leading the meeting in reciting the Lord's prayer and reading the national anthem.

He testified that several fiery crosses had been burned in the surrounding territory. Just what he had to do with the arrest of Dr. Lougher for singing "America" on the courthouse steps, for which permission had been granted by the county officials, was not made clear.

The courtroom was packed to suffocation throughout the trial and hundreds were refused admittance. At the conclusion of the hearing of the testimony of the first witness the case was taken under advisement by Judge Hullock and it is expected that a decision will be rendered by the judge not later than Tuesday afternoon.

O'Brien's Words Illuminating

The words of J. J. O'Brien, commissioner of the state police, are illuminating. Upon learning that the protest meeting was to be held, he stated, in the absence of Mayor Bradley—who was out of the city—that "no attempt would be made to break up the meeting if the mayor consented to it." Just what J. J. O'Brien considers a "properly conducted" meeting is hard to tell in view of the outrage committed by the mayor's "strong arm squad" when it arrested Dr. Lougher as he was attempting to deliver 4,000 persons because he wished to conform with the mayor's mad order until the case could prove to the mayor that such a thing is possible, that Lexington is a part of the United States and is governed by the United States laws, and that the mayor is to be arrested for leading American citizens in prayer and in singing the national anthem. If a man is to be arrested for leading American citizens in prayer and in singing the national anthem, then the Bradleys, O'Briens and Reagans, together with their strong arm squads, at the last gallop into Lexington and the Ku Klux Klan has been formed too late to stop the foreign influence, aided and abetted by the men as committed the outrage in this city on the night of August 1, that are attempting to take from the American people their liberty and turn the country over to be despoiled, rifled and left to decay and rot in ignominious and in countries in Europe and others in the western hemisphere.

Acts Thoroughly in Keeping

The acts of the officials in this city are thoroughly in keeping with those being practiced in Indianapolis by the police force of that city, under the direction of Chief Mike Mullin. Mike Mullin and Fire Chief O'Brien, in full drive against Protestantism and Americanism, have brought down the condemnation of the newspapers and public in general. It takes but a glance to convince one that the names vary but little and in both cases the religious faith of the fanatics who have taken the law into their own hands is as a whole is the same. In Springfield, Ohio, where the Bible and American flag were burned under insult and seventy-two men thrown into jail—and afterward released when the trial came up—there was a Chief O'Brien at the helm again. Lying in jail at this time at Knox, Ind., is a Leo Hogan, secretary of the Knights of Columbus, whose bond has been fixed at \$20,000 after being taken to a meeting of men and women and wounded two and admitted firing three shots at the sheriff who tried to arrest him. Just what influence is fighting the Ku Klux Klan is not hard to determine even though the opposition is working hard to cover up the truth. It is not hard for this hidden opposition to find tools to carry out their nefarious

designs against the Protestants of this country and against American ideals and American institutions. Lexington is today feeling the sting of un-American interests and is surrounded at the acts of her officials who have taken oath to uphold the law. Bitter opposition is being voiced by the citizens who are slowly recovering from the shock of the outrage and who are realizing the crying need of an organization such as the Ku Klux Klan to save the country from the dominance by such forces as are represented by Mayor Bradley, Vice-Mayor O'Brien and Chief Reagan in Lexington and the same brand throughout the entire breadth of America.

First-Hand Evidence Given

Regardless of the outcome of the trial here, one thing has been firmly established in the hearts of the true Americans of the great state of Kentucky—and that is the great need for the Ku Klux Klan. The underhanded, un-American and lawless acts practiced against the citizens of Lexington and of all Kentucky, first-hand evidence of the class of persons in our country who would kill the Klan because it is the strongest force in the United States today that is fighting to maintain the supremacy of Protestantism and the continuance of our government along the lines laid out by the founding fathers of this great republic.

The usurpation of power by every petty official, because of their belief that the Protestants are the enemy, is aptly pictured in Lexington through the arrest of a man on the charge of inciting riot when he is doing honor to his God and his country; a man arrested without a warrant, is charged, and at the instigation of a Catholic priest, according to testimony in open court.

KENTUCKY SHIFTING INTO KLAN COLUMN

Organization Grows With Increased Momentum—All Sections of State Active

(Special to Fiery Cross)

FRANKFORT, Ky., Aug. 14.—The Knights of the Ku Klux Klan is growing steadily and with an increased momentum throughout Kentucky. Tactics by the opposition have aroused the Protestants of this state which in turn brought out the truth about the Klan, and with the result that each county is now represented by the leading citizens of the community, who are fast becoming affiliated with the organization in all sections of the state.

In certain parts of the state the organized opposition has had a mighty foothold and has taken every measure possible to stop the growth of the order. This foothold is now being broken and the spotlight of truth is making itself felt in other sections of the state, where unadulterated Americanism has been more to the front, the Klan has made wonderful strides.

Disgraceful Affair.

The disgraceful affair in Lexington recently, wherein a man was arrested immediately after repeating the Lord's prayer in unison with an assemblage on the courthouse lawn, which had been given over to the use of the meeting by county officials, has brought a wave of indignation that is fast swelling the ranks of the Klan in this state.

Throughout the state a clamor has arisen to "know more about the Klan." The result is that the sturdy, stalwart boys of the mountains, as well as those residing in the Blue Grass section, are taking to the Klan in ever-increasing numbers. The enemy is slowly but surely being displaced.

It is now believed that Kentucky will go over for the Klan in much greater numbers than ever before anticipated. Kentucky is Protestant, and the citizens beginning to learn the truth and to know that the malicious slander propagated against the organization is not a part of the great principles on which the Klan stands, Kentuckians are rushing into the fold.

Organization Is Needed

The Lexington affair has shown the residents of this state that an organization like the Ku Klux Klan is badly needed in America which has an unbroken right can be plotted and carried out on free America.

Kentuckians now realize that America needs an organization to inculcate into Americans the American principles for which our forefathers fought and died.

STEEL DEMAND STILL SHOWING INCREASE

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—Unfilled orders of the United States Steel Corporation on July 31, made public today, totaled 5,910,763 tons, a decrease of 475,498 under those at the end of the preceding month, and the smallest since July 31 of last year, when that total was 5,770,161 tons.

While the decrease was about 75,000 tons more than Wall Street had anticipated, it reflected a better demand for steel in July than June, when the decrease was 50,000 tons below the preceding month. Making allowance, however, for the smaller shipments in July, it was estimated by market observers that bookings last month were 3,000 tons a business day more than those in June, the daily gain being smaller than trade reports had indicated.

Advance Orders on Hand

Orders now on hand represent approximately five months' business at the current operating ratio of 90 per cent. Elimination of the twelve-hour day is expected to slow up shipments, but steel men do not look for any marked improvement in the industry until September or October, so that a further decrease in tonnage next month would not appear probable.

The high mark in unfilled tonnage this year was reached in March, when the total was 7,403,332 tons. In the four months since orders have declined 1,492,669 tons, or approximately 20 per cent.

COUNTRY'S LARGEST FLAG AT MARSHALL

Patriotism at High Pitch When
Speakers Address Throngs
on Americanism

(By Kitter.)

MARSHALL, Ind., Aug. 11.—Is one of the largest patriotic rallies ever held in this part of the county Marshall witnessed her first Ku Klux Klan demonstration last Monday night. The meeting had been widely advertised as a patriotic rally, in charge of Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, with a cordial invitation to every American to attend.

The streets of Marshall were early jammed with hundreds of people, and the few parking spaces available were filled with automobiles from here, Rockville, Kingman, Terre Haute, Vevodenburg, Bloomington, Crawfordsville and other surrounding cities.

The demonstration opened with a beautiful Klan parade. Knights, in full regalia, formed at the main street crossing beneath the World War memorial arch and moved in

silent formation to the high school building. The crowd that lined the streets was estimated at 3,000 people, one of the largest crowds that ever packed the streets of this little city.

School House Too Small

The Klansmen debanded at the school yard, where the remainder of the crowd waited. By the time the Marshall quartette was ready to continue the program the crowd filled to overflowing the school yard. It had first been the intention of local Klan officials to use the school for the speaking, but the large crowd made this impossible. Following a song by the Marshall quartette, the local Boy Scouts, numbering about fifty, went through a splendid flag drill that won the applause of all.

Following this drill a well-known Parke county speaker addressed the crowd on the subject, "The Ku Klux Klan and America." His speech was enthusiastically received, and Marshall certainly went on record as approving of the Klan.

Fiery Cross Burned

The quartette then sang "The Old Ragged Cross," and as the words of that old song floated across the fields there suddenly flamed up in the eastern sky a huge fiery cross, emblem of the Klan. As the cross flared up a mammoth American flag

was unveiled at half-mast. The flag was one of the largest flags ever raised in this county, and as it was removed it had once been the flag of Theodore Roosevelt. It was very appropriate that it should fly as a tribute to President Harding.

Women's Organization Assists

The Klansmen were assisted in preparing for the demonstration here by the Women's Organization. There were at least twenty-five ladies in the parade. The Klan is very strong here, including most of the desirable men of the community. After the demonstration Monday night there was a stack of membership applications three inches high on the Klan official's desk.

Fort Smith Hold Meet to Initiate Candidates

FORT SMITH, Ark., Aug. 14.—Fort Smith Klan No. 15, held another big outdoors meeting in a large field just south of the city last night, at which nearly one hundred aliens were made citizens of the invisible Empire beneath the large electric cross, after which some good speakers entertained the Klansmen with speeches on Klankraft and other matters of interest to Klansmen.

DISTURBER OF KLAN CEREMONY IS FINED

Autoist Who Was Arrested by Klansman at Sebring Will Appeal to Higher Court

SEBRING, O., Aug. 11.—Hitternash at the trial of Dean Huseroff, charged with recklessly driving his automobile during a Klan ceremony here last Saturday, was so great that Sheriff Paul Lyden of Mahoning county stationed six deputies in the court of Mayor Harold Mushrush to maintain order Friday night. A fine of \$25 and costs was assessed.

Attorney J. W. Powers, Youngstown, counsel for the defendant, declared the case would be carried to the common pleas court on appeal. Huseroff was arrested by John Arnold, said to have been clad in a Klansman's regalia, who was sworn in as a special police officer for the evening's celebration. Witnesses, friends of Huseroff's, declared that he was not driving fast or recklessly. Throughout the trial efforts to inject the religious faith of Huseroff were made by his lawyer.

After hearing the testimony, Mayor Mushrush assessed the fine, declaring he regretted that a heavier penalty could not be assessed. In summing up he pointed out that the religious faith of neither of the parties involved had any weight with him in making his decision.

OHIO KLAN WILL RECEIVE CHARTERS DURING DECEMBER

KING KLEAGLE OF OHIO ISSUES OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENT WHICH WILL BE ENTUSIASTICALLY RECEIVED

(Special to Fiery Cross)

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 14.—News which will be received with elation throughout Buckeye Klandom, is that all Ohio Klans will receive their charters in December. Many local organizations have already reached their set quotas. The news will spur others on to get their memberships up to the set number before that time so they can benefit by the order.

The official announcement to this effect, which was issued here today by the state office of the Ku Klux Klan, reads in full as follows:

Text of Order

"Whereas, in the course of the development of patriotism in the state of Ohio and in response to the sentimentality of Christianity which has been in the life of every Klansman and the development of the great spirit of the state in the trying days surrounding our fight from the beginning down to the present time; because of our expanded and more hand of men into the gigantic army of Christian soldiers that are being assembled by us in the great state of Ohio from day to day, the time has come to announce to the state that all organizations will be chartered on December 20, except those bodies who have set a charter quota and have not attained it.

"Let us make this one of the greatest days in the history of the state of Ohio, when all good citizens will kneel in common accord and praise thanks to Almighty God for the wonderful achievement and blessing which has been bestowed upon this state where the beneficent will be passed to posterity. God in his wonderful wisdom and generous mercy has united us and we have built better than we dreamed, until today there is not a nook or corner of the state where the fiery cross has not illumined the heavens and the flag blazed the way for patriots to a greater future.

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Calls for Enthusiasm

"See that a burning fire of enthusiasm thrives in the breast of every member of your organization, so that he will awaken to the responsibility to do by his own means as it has been done by him, so that the closing hour of the final day every available son of a white man's every under a white man's flag will be carrying the glorious light in answering the modern clarion call.

"Remember that an enthusiasm, single-handed, will remove mountain barriers, where an army of workers without enthusiasm will not excite a tremor of interest; and then remember, that when the fire of enthusiasm is kindled in the hearts of men, they will rise to the occasion as only true sons of America can."

CANDIDATES INITIATED

WILMINGTON, Del., Aug. 13.—A class of five hundred candidates were initiated at the top of Penny Hill near this city on last Wednesday night, as two giant fires crossed blazed from the hilltop. The meeting was one of the largest held near this place for several weeks. A national officer of the Ku Klux Klan delivered an address immediately preceding the initiation.

POLICE LEAD PARADE

Women of the Ku Klux Klan joined in the recent parade and celebration conducted by Choptank Klan Number 5, Realm of Maryland, at Cambridge, Maryland. The joint parade was led and headed by the band of the Federalburg Klan. Refreshments were served all visitors at the Cambridge Klavern.

ADVOCATES PUBLIC SCHOOL COURSE IN PATRIOTIC IDEALS

Director of Education Riegel Seeks Aid of Six Societies in Examining History Books

Plans Are Under Way to Stamp Out Illiteracy in Ohio by 1930—County Superintendents Asked to Aid

(By Staff Correspondent)

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 13.—Especially commendable is the announcement made by Director of Education Vernon M. Riegel, that courses of study especially designed to instill patriotism and love for country in school children, will soon be put into effect in Ohio public schools. It is not enough that the school child should gain an idea of the greatness of his native land from ordinary courses of study such as his history and civics, it is pointed out. There must be an organized effort to plant the ideals of the United States in the mind of every student that they can not be forgotten. The deplorable attitude towards race and their enforcement which is more or less prevalent today, would not exist to such a widespread extent if proper training along patriotic lines were given.

To Examine Histories

The first step in bringing into effect this program will be a thorough investigation of all American histories now in use in Ohio's public schools. In this work Director Riegel has enlisted the aid of six patriotic societies. They are the Daughters of the American Revolution, G. A. R., Spanish-American War Veterans, American Legion, Ohio Society, Sons of the American Revolution, Ohio Federation of Women's Clubs and the Ohio League of Women Voters.

A letter has been sent to the heads of each of these organizations asking for whole-hearted support. The keynote of his letter is that it is time steps in this direction were taken to accomplish desired results. At the same time that he has opened his campaign to stamp out illiteracy in Ohio, Director Riegel has announced his plans for warring on illiteracy in Ohio. This best line of attack at the source of this evil is through Americanization work and night schools.

Work Is Continued

This work was previously handled by the Americanization department. At the last session of the general assembly, however, funds to continue the work were not appropriated and it was regretfully discontinued. In part, however, it is being continued by the state department of education. Every county superintendent of education has been asked by M. W. Simpson, who is in charge of adult education in Ohio, to obtain the names of every illiterate within his territory. Thus, educators can aim at the source of the evil and rapidly eliminate it.

MIDNIGHT SUFFER

Gibbsland Klan Number 55, Realm of Louisiana, a few days ago conducted a most impressive public naturalization ceremony. Sixty-six aliens were naturalized and after an address on the patriotic principles of the Klan, the initiates of Klansmen were entertained at a midnight supper.

50,000 SPECTATORS

The much heralded gathering of the Klans at Seattle, Washington, last month was even greater than expectations. Fifty thousand spectators, men, women and children, saw Klansmen of the Realm of Washington stage their ceremonial near Seattle. There was an impressive fireworks display and over a thousand aliens were naturalized into the Invisible Empire. Thousands of Klansmen participated.

AN ANSWER TO MANY INQUIRIES

Many letters have been received by The Fiery Cross asking the religion of President Coolidge. The college is a member of no church although it is understood that he attends the Congressional church of which his wife is a member.

ARRESTS PUT ONLY TEMPORARY STOP TO RACE BETTING

Beulah Park Track, Near Columbus, Is Scene of Extensive Gambling on Horses

Ku Klux Klan Secret Service Men File Warrants Which Are Served by Sheriff But Knocked Out in Court

(By Staff Correspondent)

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 13.—"In again, out again, going again," is the policy pursued by operators of pari-mutuel machines at Beulah Park race track, Grove City, southwest of here, where the Grand Circuit running races have been in full swing for the past week. Last Monday secret service men for the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan swore out seventy warrants and an equal number of affidavits for the operators of the machines and paying booths at the Grove City track. A warrant for the arrest of E. D. Shepard, manager of the Capital City Racing Association, charging him with permitting gambling on premises under his control and a search warrant for the seizure of all paraphernalia, were issued. The warrants were "John Doe" warrants.

Justice of the Peace Irvin Demore, of Jackson township, issued the warrants. Deputy sheriffs and specially deputized men who were to assist in the arrests gathered in the basement of the Methodist church at Grove City.

Sheriff Assists

Following the law, Squire Demore called Sheriff Frank Holycross of Franklin county, saying that he had not had enough men to serve the warrants and asked for help. The sheriff came. However, he refused to serve the "John Doe" warrants, saying that the supreme court ruling required a description of the party to be arrested.

Mr. Shepard was placed under arrest. In his arraignment before Justice Demore, it was noted that the warrant for his arrest wasn't signed and the case was forthwith dismissed. However, gambling at the track on Monday, after the fifth race, stopped. Nevertheless, it was resumed the following day. Thursday seven operators were arrested by the sheriff, charged with operating the game and selling tickets. They will have their trials on August 28.

The racing at Beulah Park continues for another week. What action will be taken by the state to stop it is agreed that arresting does no good, for the sheriff is no longer permitted to arrest, than the accused get out on bond and resume their operations.

Fifteen Machines

Fifteen pari-mutuel machines and twenty-two paying booths are located under the grandstand. Everyone was gambling. In the crowd were seen many of the "John Doe" type characters and bootleggers of recent days. The extent of the evil, however, extends to secret business men of Columbus who have been spending most of their time at the rail since the races opened.

CHILDREN'S JOYRIDE

St. Joseph Klan Number 4, Realm of Missouri, recently took all the children cared for by charitable organizations in that city for a joyride. The youngsters from the homes and orphanages were put in automobiles and driven by Klansmen to a amusement park where they enjoyed themselves during the evening and were provided with all the ice cream they could eat.

FRUIT DEALER ADMITS THE MURDER OF WIFE

Mother-in-Law Also Killed—Bodies Found in Packing Cases

BEDFORD, Mass., Aug. 14.—Nurse George Teakos, 35, a fruit dealer of Franklin, N. H., was arrested today after the mutilated bodies of his wife, Natalie, and her mother, Mrs. Katharine Adams, were found in packing cases in salt marishes. Teakos confessed, according to police, to murdering the women Saturday night in his fruit store in Franklin.

Meeting Is Held in Memory of President

LANCASTER, Ky., Aug. 13.—On last Thursday night both the Ku Klux Klan and the Women's Organization held meetings in commemoration of the late President Harding. At the conclusion of a short address by a local minister the entire assemblage knelt in silent prayer.

SPEAKER GETS APPLAUSE

BUCHLAND, Ohio, August 13.—Last Thursday night an enthusiastic audience was present to hear a local speaker deliver an address on the Ku Klux Klan. The speaker was greeted with much applause.

Klan Aids Aged Negro to Recover Eyesight

FRANKFORT, Ohio, August 13.—Elijah Lockier, aged 73, negro, can once again see the light of day. A successful operation was performed to remove cataracts from his eyes. A month ago the old gentleman was at a loss as to how to finance the expensive undertaking. Hearing of his need a group of Klansmen one day visited his home and left a substantial donation with a letter directing that the money be used to perform the operation. This act of kindness has done much in this vicinity to dispel a deal of wild notions as to the attitude of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan toward the colored race.
