### SERIES OF MEETINGS IN RANDOLPH COUNTY

**WINCHESTER, Ind., Aug. 17.**—Before one of the largest crowds that ever assembled in Lynn, the Ku Klux Klan on last Friday night held a very impressive ceremony at which time a large class of candidates were taken into the organization.

Scores of good meetings were held throughout the county, including Modoc, Farmland, Ridgeville, Saratoga, and several of the week at Lynn with a public speaking, band concert, and public naturalization.

At seven o'clock in the evening Main street was jammed with automobiles and by eight o'clock a crowd estimated between three and four thousand had gathered on the schoolhouse yard where previously a platform had been built and where for more than an hour they listened to an address on the principles of the Klan, which was delivered by a speaker of national note. The speaker was applauded from time to time and his talk was received with such enthusiasm that he was forced to stop many times until the enthusiasm subsided before continuing with his talk.

#### Band Concert Given

Following the public speaking was a band concert given by the Newcastle band which lasted for forty-five minutes, after which a trio from Newcastle favored the large crowd with several numbers. At the conclusion hundreds of persons signified their intentions of becoming members of the organization.

A parade headed by four mounted Klansmen marched to the spot where the public initiation was to take place. During the march hundreds of people fell in line, including a great many women. At ten o'clock the time set for the ceremony, and the streets were almost impassable, and by the time the parade reached the point where the ceremony was to take place hundreds of automobiles were jammed in the park. At ten-thirty a huge fiery cross blazed into flame. It was then that within a circle of Klansmen a large class of candidates stood ready for the ceremonial which then got underway. As the cross flared upward the candidates pledged themselves to uphold the Christian religion and the Constitution of the United States.

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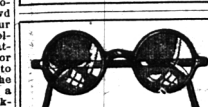

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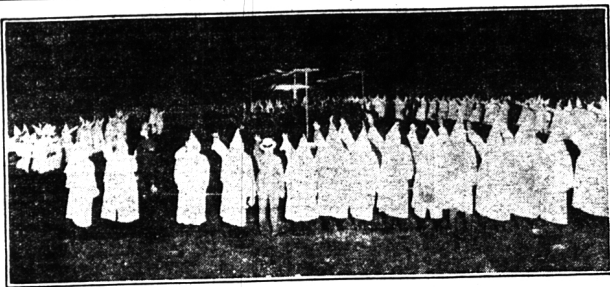
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## Seven Hundred Initiated Near Boston

other matter that doesn't appeal greatly to citizens of this city. Due to the fact that Mayor Durgan journeyed to Indianapolis to speak before the un-American Unity League at a time when peaceful meetings of Protestants were being attacked by mobs of hoodlums, under leaders well hidden behind the scenes, it would appear that the mayor has become an active agent of the un-American Unity League. The organization appeared in black hats by Joe Roach, an assassin, and Mad Pat O'Donnell, a jury fixer, and whose forces have been added of late, one John McNamara, ex-convict and dynamiter.

As Mayor Durgan was "appealing" for the "elimination of fanaticism," reports were being received from Steubenville, Ohio; East Chicago, Ind.; Elmira, N. Y.; Winnebago, Minn., and many other points, that peaceful Protestant citizens were being attacked.

**Police Have Protestant Minister**  
In Elmira it was necessary to call the police to have a Protestant minister; at East Chicago a hoodlum threw a stone to start the raid on the Protestant gathering and struck a man in the face. It was necessary to call on the police for protection. At Steubenville a mob of 3,000 fanatics, according to newspaper stories, attacked 100 men emerging from a hall where they had held a peaceful and legal meeting. One of the attacked men was shot and many others injured, and by the same forces that Mayor Durgan represents, Mayor Durgan, who is calling out against "fanatics," Mayor Durgan doesn't mean "fanatics"; he means Protestants must be eliminated.

At Winnebago a man was stoned from the platform on which he wished to speak and exercise his right as an American citizen under the Constitution of the United States. This man had the same inalienable right to speak as did Mayor Durgan when he "appealed" for the "elimination of fanaticism." The incidents named above are but a minor few that took place over the entire country within a space of two days, and

Mayor Durgan was lending his aid to that organization which glories in these outrages.

### Small Chance of Curing

Mayor Durgan no doubt promised those present that he would do all in his power to "cure" the Ku Klux Klan in Lafayette. Luckily, his power to do this is represented by a naught with the rim erased. The purchase of three-fourths the stock in the fair association by the Klan at this place gives a comprehensive idea of what Mayor Durgan can do to "bust the Klan" and to aid in the fight on Protestantism.

A committee from the Klan is co-operating with the secretary of the fair association for the giving of the 1923 fair. The income from the fair grounds has thirteen years to run.

Just opposite the truck were two tents between which swung a large banner bearing the word "Information," and on one of the tents was a sign reading: "Men—K. K. K. While on the other was a similar sign, thus: "Women—K. K. K." All desired information was given out at these places.

Cheer after cheer greeted the line of women in full regalia who carried large American flags and who made very pretty spectacles as they passed along between the throngs that gathered on either side.

The throng in the side of all foreigners, better known as The Fiery Cross truck, also blazed its way along the line of march.

Long before the parade the police were compelled to stop all parking of machines within the fair grounds and all streets were jammed with autos as were all roads leading to and from Tipton.

When the marchers finally disbanded at the fair grounds a short talk on the principles of the Klan was given by a well-known speaker and was received with much enthusiasm by the audience. The Klansmen and their families then visited the various places of amusement and the exhibits.

Captain Sherlock Pope, bodyguard to Limber Lunged Lew at the present time, would, no doubt, be in charge of the secret service. It is possible, with the entire secret service of the United States at his command, he might find out why a touring car license, issued to the city of Indianapolis, is used by John McNamara, ex-convict, in a Ford sedan which, to all intents and purposes, belongs to John Mullin. Also, he might inform the public where Mullin got the car.

During his spare time, Captain Pope could like enough pictures of golf links—and possibly find the missing link while doing it—to warrant Limber Lunged Lew in taking over the duties of Colonel House, Armitage, instead of just giving him a little \$17,000,000 water company here in Indianapolis.

**Brooks and O'Donnell Placed**  
"Doggie" Brooks, motorcycle cop, would most probably be elevated to the head of the internal revenue department, due to his vast experience in collecting revenue for the un-American Unity League, which, no doubt, would give him space in the White House by Limber Lunged Lew, from which it could carry on its campaign of destruction of all things Protestant.

"Mad" Pat O'Donnell, who spreads so much bull, would, undoubtedly, find a place in the cabinet as secretary of agriculture, while Fred Cline, now of the park board, would be made secretary of the treasury owing to his wonderful sagacity in money matters. Under his magic hand, barren wastes could be picked up for a song in The Great American Desert and sold for fabulous prices for locating government hospitals.

It is believed that Conclimac Otto Vay will find a way on the ticket as vice-president, both for the reason that vice-presidents are never heard of and so he can be in close touch with the Senate so that he may get an anti-mask bill introduced in Congress to prohibit the soldiers wearing gas masks. Vice-President Ray has a horror for masks.

There is no doubt President Limber Lunged Lew would nicely round out his cabinet. For secretary of state there is Joe Roach, assassin, who most probably would be in the summer office in Montreal, Canada, from which he now issues so many statements. He would amply be fitted for the position on account of his untiring work among the foreigners, and would be most efficient in foreign affairs.

### Secretary of Labor O'Brien

The vast experience of Armitage, ex-member of the park board, obtained in a commercial way with his mules, fits him, without doubt, into the office of secretary of commerce. Francis F. Hamilton, whom the taxpayers of Indianapolis, who have had any business in the building department, have found such a General Nuisance, would immediately become attorney-general. The fact that he is not now qualified under the law to hold the position he has would amply fit him for closing the office of attorney-general without having become an attorney.

After these appointments there remains but one vacancy in the Limber Lunged Lew cabinet, that of postmaster-general. Due to the speed attained by the Frenty-Pont which Patsy McNamara drives, in wild rides over the city at night with a

brother of Secretary of the Navy Mike Glenn, the mail could be delivered with great dispatch by Patsy, who was placed on the police by Secretary of War Ribboff. This, of course, would make it mandatory on President Limber Lunged Lew to make Patsy, ex-price fighter, postmaster-general. He would be very good at licking stamps.

The administration would then be complete and get under way with a bang by Limber Lunged Lew announcing off the three-mile limit and ordering a new copy of the unwritten law placed in the congressional library.

An office, of course, would be provided for Dr. Amelia Keller, where she could take up, in Washington, her duties of being neither Catholic, Jew nor negro.

CARLISLE, Ind., Aug. 21.—Threats from the organized opposition did not stop the large parade of the Women of the Ku Klux Klan here one night last week when 500 of them marched through the main part of town, guarded on each side by American men.

It was reported that attempts have been made to intimidate the women in various ways recently, and their members and meetings have been molested by alien forces of men, the main figure in the opposition, it is alleged, being a well known physician, who declared that the women should not march.

The parade, however, was held and witnessed by large crowds. The women received much applause as they marched.

### LAPORTE WELCOMES KLAN AT BIG MEETING

Automobiles Crowd Streets and Vast Crowd Cheers When Little Red Schoolhouse Passes

LAPORTE, Ind., Aug. 20.—That Americanism is coming to the fore in Laporte was evidenced Saturday night when the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan held their second parade here.

Approximately 500 Knights paraded. They marched in columns of twos and received a hearty welcome when they first came upon the scene. One of the biggest demonstrations of approval was carried on when the little red schoolhouse, mounted on a motor truck, passed.

The approach of the marching Klansmen was announced by the music of the city band. The strains of music that came from their instruments and the sight of the fiery cross as it made its approach to the waiting populace, estimated at 10,000, was a most inspiring and patriotic scene, to say the least. A Klansman, mounted on a horse, headed the parade, followed by the burning fiery cross.

Composed of Representative Citizens

A prominent citizen was heard to remark that the Klan was certainly composed of representative citizens. He could see who some of the Klansmen were because their visors were worn turned up. There were many who marched with open faces and quite a few marched in their civilian clothes. Many remarks of praise were heard from different sources and this one demonstration should add a considerable number of members to the Laporte Klan.

Streets Jammed With Cars

The streets contained so many automobiles that it was found necessary to park the cars in depths of two on both sides of Lincolnway where the main line of the march was carried on to a very successful completion. The side streets were lined with cars and it was practically impossible to find a place to park unless one arrived downtown at an early time in the evening. In fact, crowds began to assemble two hours before the Klansmen appeared. Klansmen were present from many other towns.

The Klan is becoming better known and is receiving a cordial welcome in Laporte.

### MORE RAIDS AT EDINBURG GET RESULTS

KLAN DECLARES WAR ON JOHNSON COUNTY BOOTLEGGERS; WINE IS CONFISCATED

Alleged Druggist Found to Be Selling Many Gallons of Jamaica Ginger Each Month

EDINBURG, Ind., Aug. 20.—The Klan has declared war on bootleggers in Johnson county. This was learned when another series of raids took place last Saturday and arrests made and liquor confiscated. The arrests followed other made here recently and arrests at county fairs near this place.

The raids Saturday were conducted by Deputy Sheriff Taylor, Tom Bottom, marshal of Franklin, and a Klan investigator. One of the places visited by the officers was the home of Charles Mason, 204 Keeley street, where a quantity of liquor was confiscated. Mason was not at home and the warrant could not be served at that time. A quantity of Jamaica ginger was found in a safe, together with other liquor, and in a shed on the premises empty boxes that had contained bottles of Jamaica ginger. It was believed by the officers that Mason was then out after a supply of liquor.

Wine Is Confiscated

Anton Bussmeier, alleged druggist, was said to be operating without license, and who is located at 200 South Holland street, was arrested and is now at liberty on bond. At his place there was found a large amount of Jamaica ginger in a glass jar which was labeled as a popular drink. Five gallons of wine were also found at this place and a filled quart bottle labeled whisky. About two hundred two-ounce bottles which are thought to have contained Jamaica ginger were also found by the officers.

Bussmeier is said to have told the officers that he paid boys one cent each for gathering up the bottles for use again. Receipts show that Bussmeier was receiving from ten to fifteen gallons of ginger each month. He said that he had told the drug company of whom he purchased the ginger, to "shut him out" when they thought he was buying too much.

It is known that young men have been buying Jamaica ginger and taking it to certain pool rooms and placing it in soft drinks. In fact, it is said, has increased at an alarming rate. Also it is alleged that boys buying Jamaica ginger of Bussmeier would also buy a bottle of some soft drink and go outside to mix them.

More Arrests to Follow

That more arrests will follow is felt sure as it has been rumored that Klan investigators have been at work here for some time past. Bootlegging has increased in this vicinity since a rapid rate that the Klan has started a war on the illicit dealers in liquor in this county. To date the organization has made good headway in its cleanup and the purchase of liquor is much harder than a short time ago.

It is understood that much trouble has been experienced in trying to "land" Mason and that three warrants were issued for his arrest before it was effected.

### BIG CLASS INITIATED AT GIBSLAND, LA.

GIBSLAND, La., Aug. 20.—The public initiation of a large number of candidates, as staged here last Thursday night under the auspices of Gibsland Klan No. 59, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, was a most successful and highly impressive ceremony.

Despite the heavy clouds, which threatened a hard downpour about dark, several hundred Klansmen and visitors from Arcadia, Homer, Haynesville, Athens, Minden and other nearby towns began arriving in autos and on a special train over the L. & N. W. road till the main street from the business part of town to the ball park, where the ceremonies took place, was almost solid line of cars and visitors. At 8:15 the first of a long line of hooded figures swung out of a side street, the Klansmen Temple, and forming a circle of part of the business portion of town started up South Main street for the ball park.

### THEY 'LOVE CHURCH'; FLY ITALIAN FLAG

MARION, Ill., Aug. 20.—Declaring that they "loved the United States" but that they also loved their church, a number of Italians in the west part of the city displayed an Italian flag on a pole forty feet high one day last week while an attempt was being made by them to organize what Catholics there are in this city into a congregation. There is no Catholic church in this city. It is said that the Italians had been warned of the danger of flying a foreign flag from a high staff without placing an American flag above.

No disturbance accompanied the removal of the flag, and the Italians have erected an altar and are celebrating the "Feast of the Assumption." The sheriff has given them permission to erect another flag-staff if they display on it the American flag.

### ORANGE COUNTY KLAN IS GAINING RAPIDLY

ORLEANS, Ind., Aug. 21.—One of the largest crowds ever gathered together in Orange county surged to the Chautauqua one evening last week to hear a nationally-known speaker give an address on the principles of the Ku Klux Klan.

The speaker delivered a masterful talk and drew into the many facts of existing conditions throughout the country that the general public was not aware of. He was applauded continuously throughout his discourse and at the conclusion of his speech the heavens vibrated with the roar from thousands of throats.

The day following the address the local office of the Klan was swamped with applications for membership, and Orange county citizens are flocking to the great American order daily.

A large fiery cross was burned after the speech.

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### STILL IS CAPTURED AT SULLIVAN, IND.

SULLIVAN, Ind., Aug. 20.—Activities by the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan in furnishing information and aiding the local authorities in rounding up bootleggers and other law violators last week resulted in four arrests and the capture of one still, fifteen gallons of mash and a quantity of white male whisky. Two of the men who were arrested have been bound over to the circuit court. They were liquor law violators.

P. C. Lodge, secretary of Roger Williams Lodge No. 32, Providence, R. I., has been elected for the forty-eighth consecutive time.

### TO AID HOME

The lodge of Texas makes it mandatory upon the local lodges to add \$100 to the initiation fee of each new member, which sum is donated to the support of the Masonic homes of that state.

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**KLANSMEN AT MARION TO CELEBRATE SEPT. 3**

MARION, Ind., Aug. 21.—What is expected to be one of the biggest Klan meetings ever held in this part of the state will be held here on next Labor Day when a great Klan celebration will be held. One of the features will be a mammoth display of fireworks in the evening. On the day's program are bands, glee clubs, quartets, speakers and drum corps. Klansmen in gala will be stationed along the roads to guide visiting Klansmen to the spot where the big meeting will be held. Among the speakers will be national officials of the organization and the head of the Women's Organization will deliver an address.

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**BOOTLEGGERS 'SMOKED OUT' AT RICHMOND, IND.**

RICHMOND, Ind., Aug. 20.—Due to the activity of the Ku Klux Klan of this city a number of bootleggers have been "smoked out" and their stills confiscated. A number of these men have received sentences and at the present time it is expected more will be pulled up to explain their actions in connection with the sale of liquor. The arrests that have been recently made are understood to be but the beginning of a series of arrests which will be made on information furnished the authorities by members of the Klan who are bent on better moral conditions in Richmond and in the county.

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**Parachute Leap Features Klan Celebration**



At Franklin, Indiana, on August 11, during a big Ku Klux Klan celebration, Luther Dennis, aviator, made a sensational parachute leap from the balloon shown in the picture. A painted cross twenty-two feet high appeared at two places on the big bag. These crosses could be seen distinctly after the big bag was hundreds of feet in the air.

**ENGLAND'S ACTION BRINGS SURPRISE**

Conditions at Ellis Island Are Attacked by Great Britain—Charges Not Disputed

**WOMAN ROUNDS UP BOOTLEGGING RING**

Relentless Effort Results in the Arrest of Scores of Alleged Illicit Dealers

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 20.—Considerable surprise was manifested in high official circles today at the action of the British government in making public the report of Sir Auckland Geddes, ambassador to the United States, concerning alleged conditions at Ellis Island.

Regardless of what conditions may exist at Ellis Island, it was declared, it is hardly the function of a British ambassador to give directions to this government as to how it should conduct its own internal affairs.

Strongest suspicions were expressed that the whole matter of the publication of the Geddes report by Lord Curzon was due to the fact that the British government is disturbed at this time because of the tendency on the part of her citizens to emigrate to the United States.

Veterans Eager to Come

It is well known that world war veterans in England have for months been in destitute circumstances and that despite the efforts of the government to encourage a migration to Canada and to Australia that many of the most desirable class of British subjects have indicated an intention of going to America.

Numerous speeches delivered in the house of commons and sundry interpellations of government policy with regard to emigration have made it perfectly clear that the British people are deeply alarmed lest the power of their young manhood shall be drawn to the United States, rather than to the British dominions of Canada, Australia and New Zealand.

Some Shipped to Chicago

Fleets of vessels were operated between the Bahamas and the Georgia coast, convoys were provided to distribute liquor inland, while booze known to have passed through the hands of the ring has been traced as far as Chicago, St. Louis and Cleveland, where it was being sold.

A special intelligence service, maintained by the ring to protect its operations, hampered Mrs. Willibrand's pursuit by causing her on two occasions to substitute an entirely new force of operatives for agents who had been recognized.

Two years ago the attention of Mrs. Willibrand, a woman of great personal charm, was drawn to the activities of the ring. She ordered dry agents put on the track of the leaders, and when they proved unsuccessful in trapping them, obtained a number of department of justice agents to take up the chase.

Dodge Income Taxes

At the same time Mrs. Willibrand put tax investigators on the case. With the result that last year four were indicted for violation of the tax laws involving millions of dollars of dodged income taxes.

Yet she was unsatisfied. The importation of liquor was not curbed. More aleuths were put on the scent in their chase they ranged the entire country east of the Mississippi in search of evidence. Almost insurmountable difficulties were encountered, so clever and powerful were the principals.

Arrest Leaders and Agents

Bit by bit, however, the case was built up under her guidance, and Wednesday she felt the moment had come to strike. Agents armed with warrants swooped down on the principals and their associates and arrested them.

Mrs. Willibrand, who formerly lived in California, believes she has a perfect case.

**Don't Dispute the Charges**

There is no tendency among officials to dispute the accuracy of the observations of Sir Auckland Geddes concerning conditions at Ellis Island.

Department of labor officials, however, were quick to point out that in making public this report the British government has failed to recognize the fact that America is not called upon, under existing international practice, to maintain Ellis Island at all.

**FORMER BROKER GETS TWO YEARS IN JAIL**

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Aug. 20.—Ernest A. Knoblauch, junior member of the bankrupt firm of Borden & Knoblauch of this city, was today sentenced to two years in the county prison when he entered a plea of nolo contendere to a charge of passing a worthless check for \$450,000.

The check was made out to Kean Taylor & Co., of New York, for a payment of a block of United States Treasury certificates.

When Knoblauch's trial was resumed his counsel, after a conference, said he wished to withdraw a plea of not guilty entered on the charge and enter one of nolo contendere. The sentence is to date from the time the banker was committed to jail last November after his firm had failed. The firm's liabilities were announced as in excess of \$800,000, with assets of about \$175,000.

Feeling in his own behalf, Knoblauch said he had been the victim of a blackmailing scheme, and had given, approximately \$25,000 to a young woman in Atlantic City.

**DEER CREEK** Ind., Aug. 22.—This place was alive with a surging crowd of Americans one evening last week to witness a parade of the Ku Klux Klan which was made up of a large number of Klansmen in full regalia, several beautiful floats, bands and companies of mounted men. Fiery crosses threw fantastic shadows in the woodland and together with the bursting of bombs and aroused enthusiasm to a high pitch.

A speaker, explaining the principles of the Klan, was received with applause throughout his entire talk. Every available space in the entire village was crowded to the utmost.

Early this week the Standard Oil Co. reduced its prices at the pump, not only in South Dakota, but proportionately throughout its territory, although stating that before the Standard Oil Co. would cut new prices further developments in South Dakota would be awaited.

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# **KLANSMEN ARE STRUCK DOWN**

(Continued from Page 1)

Weirton, W. Va., where a Klansman was killed. Upon arrival there they learned that the West Virginia Klansmen had joined the Steubenville Klansmen in holding a celebration at Brilliant, seven miles south of this city. They immediately proceeded toward Brilliant.

The local organization already has in the possession of affidavits to prove that members of a certain church secret society were so armed on the hilltop in Steubenville down the road on the West Virginia side of the Ohio river. One of the cars carried a miniature electrically illuminated fiery cross, while others were decorated with the same flag. These symbols, figuratively speaking, acted as the "red rag" before the bull."

**Watched From Hilltop**

The hilltop roadways, it was learned on authority, were lined with Klansmen. The business section of the city, when the machines drove up, used to get some lunch. One man and an eighteen-year-old boy were left in charge. Immediately after the Klansmen began to gather about the machine and argue with the two men. The first act of violence came from one of the mob, a Klansman, who fired from the machine, saying to the occupant, "You should be ashamed to use this flag in this manner." At that signal, others of the mob began to tear flags from machines, damage the motors, and some even went so far as to upset two of the automobiles. By this time word of the trouble had reached the party of Klansmen who had gathered near Market street restaurant. When

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they appeared on the scene the fighting increased. They were so greatly outnumbered that they could put up little resistance. It is said that about forty members of the attacking mob were themselves badly beaten. Hardly a Klansman escaped without injury.

The fighting lasted for one hour, from ten until eleven o'clock in the evening. Spectators who gathered only made the Jan in North Fifth street, between Market and Washington streets, however.

As deplorable as such a situation is in no way compares with the conduct of the police. Local Klansmen, who are in close touch with the local political situation, unhesitatingly declare that the police aided in the riot rather than trying to stop it. As evidence of this they point to the fact supported by affidavits, that when the first machine was turned over and its occupant dragged out and beaten, a police officer was standing on the corner in full view of the mob.

It is further said that evidence has been given that the police patrol before it arrived at the scene of the battle, passed through the old fifth ward and picked up a load of rioters to assist in "giving the Klansmen what has long been coming to them."

**Foreign Police Force**

When it is realized that on the Steubenville police force of thirty men there are twenty-eight men who are not natives of this country, it is not surprising that there are a few colored men and one Hungarian in the plausibility of some of their actions during the trouble seems well founded.

Out of the fighting mob four men were arrested. Strange as it may seem, they are all members of the East Liverpool Klan. As the editor of the Steubenville Gazette said in an editorial the following day: "There is considerable comment on the fact that while the police force and the sheriff acted in a cowardly manner on the scene when the mob was overturning and wrecking automobiles and beating men up, not one member of the mob was arrested." Evidence has been produced that in at least two of these arrests where the Klansmen are charged with carrying concealed weapons, they were framed by the police.

These men were released from the county jail the following night under \$1,000 bond each, while the law places a limit of \$500 for the bond in such cases. These men, with the others arrested after the following morning by the sheriff for carrying weapons in their automobiles, will be tried Tuesday before Justice of the Peace Stone.

The latter two arrests were made when two machine loads of East Liverpool Klansmen arrived in Steubenville early Thursday morning and, instead of being given the possible assistance to their distressed brothers, a report that the fighting was far more extensive than it really was, had been sent to East Liverpool. This wild story brought the armed Klansmen. While it is admitted that they made a serious mistake in coming to this community armed, they were under the impression that it was a matter of defense and a situation which demanded the assistance of every law-abiding citizen.

**Shoot Klansman**  
At two o'clock Thursday morning

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near the Pennsylvania railroad passenger station was staged the second act of this un-American idea. Led by Harry L. Gibson, a Paulsboro freight conductor, a state prohibition officer and a man long known prominent in Jefferson county Klan activities was assaulted and shot by a gang of foreigners.

Gibson was jerked up behind him and struck him with a blackjack. Only slightly stunned, he was held around, dragged to the rear and fired once. The bullet penetrated the hand of his assailant and at the same time it was in the chest of a member of the gang who had just stepped out from behind a box car near the rear of the train from their places of hiding and opened fire on Gibson. He was wounded in the nose by one bullet, while another entered his neck and lodged at the base of the brain. It was later removed. Displaying the same courage, Gibson is always shown. Gibson is displaying through at Gill hospital. He is constantly under the care of two American nurses.

John DeSantis is under arrest and Mosco Spinnetti is also being held for the attack upon Gibson. The assailants escaped. Charges of shooting with intent to kill have been placed against them and their bonds fixed at \$5,000 each.

For a time the un-American elements of Steubenville thought they had won the battle and were about to submit. But while the city was still in an uproar of excitement members of the Jefferson county Klan, who had been at a meeting at Richmond, twelve miles west of Steubenville, Thursday night, A. A. Gibson, a Klansman, decided to hear the truth about the riot.

**Text of Statement**

"The citizens of Steubenville last night were given a sample of the kind of people who endorsed Mayor Hawkins' administration.

"Mayor Hawkins was renominated by the hoodlums, the riff-raff, the bootleggers, the gamblers and the entire lawless element of this city, and they are now trying to elect him to a second term in office. They are citizens who refused to vote Tuesday are directly responsible for the conditions that exist in Steubenville. Mayor Hawkins is ousted. Let the good people of this city hang their heads in shame for Steubenville is being branded as the most corrupt and lawless city in twenty states.

"Last night a party consisting of seven machines which were decorated with the American flag, drove into our fair city. These machines were hauling debris from American citizens. Five machines parked on Fifth street opposite the Travelers Garage and all that was left of the night was a restaurant on Market street to eat. Immediately the cars were surrounded by 500 of the roughest, most cowardly men in our city. This mob pulled the two men from their machines, horribly beat them with rocks and blackjacks and we have it on good authority that, as one of our policemen was searching one of the victims for weapons, the mob was reaching over his shoulder beating the man. The machines were overturned and damaged and the American flags were snatched from the machines, torn to shreds and trampled.

"This attack was deliberately planned and premeditated.

"Two hours later D. L. Gibson, a man working for the Penney and who has for some time past been known as a Klansman, was attacked by three foreigners, as he was crossing the tracks at Washington street on his way home from work, and was brutally beaten and shot.

"As a result of the renomination of Mayor Hawkins this city has been turned completely over to the lawless and an American citizen has absolutely no protection. The entire police force including the chief of police is not only friendly to these elements but also antagonistic to the Klan and several of them have openly threatened.

**Black Hand Active**

Word was also received that the World Society, which is particularly strong in Steubenville, planned to blow up the homes of Mayor McCullough and Prohibition Enforcement Officer Wm. J. Richmond. McCulloch's home was partially wrecked by a black hand bomb a month ago. Richmond's home was also damaged by a black hand bomb in a similar attack. Here Mayor McCullough enforces the law that can be enforced in practical life in this city. It is the county. That is why the Italians and other foreigners who are active in the bootleg trade are bitter against the mayor and his officers.

Friday night a meeting was held at Knoxville, where about seven hundred men attended the first gathering, turned out.

"The attitude of city and county officials is reflected in the statements given to the press Thursday, that all Ku Klux Klan meetings would be prohibited and the community setled down. Mayor Hawkins and his cohorts seem to think that the Klan is to blame entirely for the trouble. He believes the best way to prevent mob violence is to stop native-born Protestant Americans from meeting in free assembly. His honor and his faithful police department do not seem to realize that the only way to prevent such a disgrace is to arrest members of the rioting mob.

Mayor Hawkins was originally a charter member of the Steubenville Knights of the Ku Klux Klan. Two years ago he was placed in office on a clean-up platform by the vote of the church people. Not for one hour after his election did he enforce any clean-up program. It was because he failed to live up to his promises to the people and his oath as a Klansman that he was banished from the Invisible Empire.

For this reason, Mayor Hawkins, coupled with his desire to please the political palate of the ring, is bitter against the Klan. In a statement given to the papers he says, "Members of the society started out to blackjack their way into control and when they found that the sheriff, the prosecutor, the chief of police and myself had views on the subject of law enforcement, in their mad rage they called us criminals."

**Idea of Own**

When his honor says that he has ideas of his own about law enforcement he speaks the truth. Any visitor to the fair city of Steubenville, the leaders of the mob who will take the time to walk down Water street and back onto High street will see how "splendid" is the mayor's idea of law enforcement works.

When in their statement to the press the officials of the Steubenville Klan said that the city was being branded as the most corrupt and lawless city in twenty states, they knew where they spoke.

Conditions all along the streets of the Steubenville waterfront are such that no self-respecting man or woman dare be seen in the neighborhood.

If Mayor Hawkins' raised blue-eyes have time to assist a mob of rowdies in beating up native-born, Protestant Americans, why haven't they time to clean up the houses of ill-fame that make Steubenville a pool of moral degeneracy.

The election result was only the beginning of this ugly outbreak. The underlying cause has many contributing factors. The corrupt press has misled a vast portion of the English-speaking citizens, while a weekly publication printed in Italian comes out with the grossest falsehoods against the organization under such titles as, "K (Ingdom) or K (Idnapers) & K (Illegals)." The attitude of officials and the court toward law enforcement has given a certain element here the idea that they could do anything they

pleased and "get away with it." Had it not been for state prohibition laws, the present officers of the Klan would be very busy. Within the city of Steubenville the police even conspire at many forms of lawlessness.

**Many Murders**

The past six months there have been eight murders in this community, which has a population of thirty thousand. None of these murders has been brought to trial. On the other hand, state officers, in the pursuit of their duty have at times been forced to kill a man in self defense. Without exception, every officer who has gone to that extreme to uphold the law has been forced to stand trial through the efforts of Prosecuting Attorney Staunton Pearce.

The most glaring case was that of the five officers who on Friday night, August 10, killed John Malone, a convicted whisky runner, after Malone had drawn a gun and fired an illustration of the regard for law and legal court procedure held by the Steubenville police. These men were charged with first degree murder and then released on \$10,000 bond each.

Another case was that of a man who was charged with first degree murder and then released on \$10,000 bond each.

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**Call on Governor**

Twenty citizens of Steubenville Saturday laid before Governor Donahy a mass of evidence in affidavit form, asking that he take immediate action in seeing that order is at all times maintained and that the law be held supreme in their community.

Ohio's chief executive declared that he would at once send warnings to Mayor Hawkins, Chief Carter and Sheriff Lusk, ordering them to do their duty and live up to their oaths of office. Should they fail, not only will they be removed, but martial law will be established, the Governor promised.

At the present time those individuals who participated in the mob attack last night are still in jail, but little by little the local Klan is gathering evidence and diligently tracing clues which in the end will lead to the prosecution of many of these guilty.

Just to show the lawless elements of this community that the Steubenville Klan is not whipped and never will be whipped, efforts are being made to have the state gathering scheduled for September 28 brought up to August 28. If state officials of the organization grant this request, those parties whose interests toward the Klan culminates in street fights will have more on their hands than they can easily deal with, should they see fit to "keep the Klansmen in their place."

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men who they believed to be members of the Klan.

"Because of the fact that Mayor Hawkins has permitted his avaricious greed for power and office to pervert his mind and overbalance his reason, we publicly make known that he was one of the original members of this organization in Steubenville and further state that he was the first man in Steubenville who was a direct result of his renomination, we publicly brand him as a potential murderer and demand that he and his chief assistants resign.

"Too long have the good citizens of this city tolerated these conditions, too long have we suffered the insolence and abuse of every known kind of criminal, too long have public officials smoothed over their damnable practices with pleas of better business and decency to delay the God's sake stop digging your own grave. Men and women who have been in a state of terror, who have had and womanhood left in your blood, wake up to the fact that you are living in a sump hole of moral pollution and degeneracy.

"This city will be clean and our laws will be respected and such damnable practices as were witnessed last night will cease."

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# **CHILD LABOR SHOWS ALARMING INCREASE**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 20.—The supreme court decision which ended the anti-child labor legislation, has resulted in an increase in child labor, according to statistics supplied by the government.

These figures show that one million children between the ages of 10 and 16 were employed in January, 1920, of which one-third were from 10 to 13 years of age. During the industrial depression of 1921, the number diminished, but these three reports from twenty states show an increase of thirty per cent in child labor.

In the last year, the number of children employed in the United States has increased by 57 per cent, according to the child labor report.

**Indiana Shows Increase**

In the quarter of 1923 in Baltimore, Md., Detroit, Hartford, Indiana, Jersey City, Manchester, Buffalo, Newark, New Haven, and Waterbury the percentage of increase over 1922 is given as 24. In the present year saw increases in child labor, especially in Connecticut, where in January, 1923, the number of children employed was 10,000 more than in June, 1922, an increase of 57 per cent, according to the child labor report.

**Editors Are Distressed**

Educators are distressed not only because of the failure of health which result from too early employment of children in industry, but because the school can not educate the child who does not attend it, and the young child has no time for study.

The contention of the child labor-proponent that the working child can go to school at night is wholly unfounded. It is pointed out, since to learn requires application, attention, and interest, and none of them are possible to a body and mind wearied with a day's toil.

MOORES HILL, Ind., Aug. 18.—The college campus was packed one evening last week to hear a well-known speaker give an address on the Ku Klux Klan, and interest in the organization of true Americans is at high tide.

**Women Meet At Carbon**

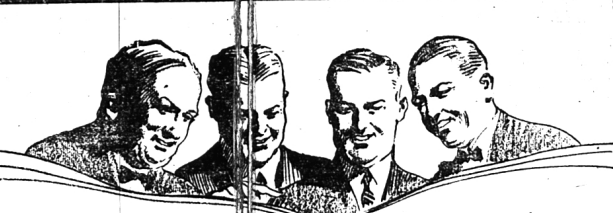

# MOTION PICTURES TO BE TAKEN OF ECLIPSE

CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—Motion pictures will be taken of the total eclipse of the sun on Sept. 10, which will be observed from Santa Catalina Island, off Southern California, by Director Edwin B. Frost and a party of scientists from Yerkes Observatory. It became known today.

The period of total obscuration will be about three minutes, and it is planned to speed up the motion pictures so they may be projected on the screen for about three minutes. Four cameras, in batteries of two, will be placed fifteen miles apart, it was explained, so as to minimize cloud interference. Two of the cameras will work automatically during the eclipse.

# Florida Klansmen Form Procession Through City

TAMPA, Fla., Aug. 20.—Led by a car on which an American flag at half mast was displayed, a long line of automobiles carrying Klansmen in full regalia and wearing white gloves, passed through this city on last Friday escorted by city motor-cycle police. It is understood that the Klansmen were on their way to a destination at which they were to hold services in honor of the late President. Tags on the different cars showed them to be from Plant City, Sagota, Brandtstown and other towns as far away as one hundred miles. The second car in the procession carried a lighted electric cross. No word was spoken by the Klansmen as they slowly passed through the city.

# Burn Cross and Hold Initiation at Brazil

BRAZIL, Ind., Aug. 20.—The burning of a large fiery cross took place here one evening last week when more than a hundred candidates were naturalized in the initiation ceremonies of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan. A large crowd witnessed the ceremonies, which were followed by a short address on Americanism in which the speaker received liberal applause during his speech. A terrific cheer went up at the lighting of the cross.

# Memorial Service Is Held at Stone Bluff

STONE BLUFF, Ind., Aug. 22.—The flames from a huge fiery cross lit up a field about two miles from here one evening last week when the Fountain county Klan held a memorial service in paying tribute to late President Warren G. Harding. The services were closed by the entire assemblage singing "America" and the meeting was dismissed after a prayer offered by a local pastor.

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# PRESIDENT CLEARS DESK FOR ACTION

Is Mastering Details of Regular Presidential Duties—Meetings Canceled

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—President Coolidge has cleared the executive desk of pressing matters to such an extent that he was enabled last Thursday to cancel the regular semi-weekly Cabinet session which was to have been conducted at the White House Friday.

Questions requiring immediate attention were disposed of at the Tuesday session of the Cabinet and the calling off of the Friday session will permit the President to give his entire time to mastering the numerous details of the regular presidential routine.

**Consults Cabinet Members**  
President Coolidge has been following the practice of consulting members of the Cabinet from time to time individually, regarding the affairs of their respective departments. In this way he has avoided long-drawn-out sessions of the entire Cabinet and at the same time has been able to find bedrock with each member of his official family.

While reports tonight from the anthracite coal conference in New York were not as encouraging as those received this morning, nevertheless, there is a feeling in Administration circles that the crisis in the anthracite situation has passed.

The un-American action caused many residents to join the organization who had been taking time "to think it over."
