SPRINGFIELD STAGES HUGE KLAN AFFAIR

Newspaper Men "Arm" Themselves
With Adding Machines
To Check Marchers

Find 10,081 in Procession—50,000
View Parade—A Big Fireworks
Display Is Given

(Special to The Fiery Cross)

SPRINGFIELD, O., Sept. 10.—At a gigantic ceremonial held here as a part of an all-day celebration, 3,500 candidates were initiated into the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan on last Saturday night. The ceremony was held at the fair grounds where their families gathered for the affair.

The initiation was started at 9:30 and was continued until midnight. Four large electrical crosses lighted the scene. A large electric engine bearing three K's blazed forth during the ceremony which was watched by the huge throng in rapid succession. Three fiery crosses were burned.

One of the hits of the day was the Klark County Klan band of forty pieces. At one of the band passed the grandstand playing "Onward, Christian Soldiers," at which time the entire assembly stood with bowed heads as it passed the stand.

Big Parade Held

A parade in which 10,081 persons took part passed through streets that were packed with an eager throng. The parade left the fair grounds promptly at seven o'clock and despite the many rumors to the contrary, previous to the affair, not one single act was in evidence that of rumors had any foundation. Klansmen on horseback found a place in the procession which was profuse with American flags. It took almost one hour and fifteen minutes for the parade to pass the grandstand. Many coats were in the parade. Klansmen from Indiana and a few from West Virginia were said to have taken part. The parade was followed by a band of four hundred furnished music for the marchers. The number of marchers in the procession which was profuse with adding machines.

The majority of the Klansmen marched with their hands on their hips and the marchers as they applauded.

PERPETUAL MAYOR WATCHES IN VAIN FOR KLAN PARADE

Organization Initiates Huge
Class as Sensational Chief
Executive Fumes

Tippecanoe County Holding Series of
Open-Air Meetings—Much Enthusiasm Manifest

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Sept. 10.—While "Sensational" Durgan, perpetual mayor of Lafayette, was busy with his entire police force on last Wednesday night, watching for the parade of the Ku Klux Klan at the fair grounds, the controlling stock in which is owned by the Klan organization, initiating a class of more than 700 candidates. The event so worried the mayor that he even had the fire department on the alert and was himself kept so busy that he didn't have enough time to prepare a speech for the un-American Unity League.

It is believed here that if the Klan doesn't quit holding meetings that Lafayette's sensational chief executive will not have time to prepare for his candidacy for governor of Indiana. Of course, it is possible that Mayor Durgan will not run for governor, but as Indiana Catholic Record "named" him as a candidate, it is thought that he might make a protest.

His Crowd Present

The meeting which so upset the mayor was held by the Klan and attended by a crowd of more than 8,000 persons, the first of whom began to arrive as early as 4:30 in the afternoon. The initiation was public and in addition to the class of 700 men, 200 women were taken into the Women's Organization.

Music was provided for the occasion by the Brownsville band of forty pieces. A speaker delivered an address which was well received by the thousands present and cheered repeatedly. The speaker spoke in a clear voice and held his audience to the last. He explained the principles of the Klan in a very lucid and convincing manner. He spoke from the judge's stand at the front of the parade.

The initiation ceremonies were held inside the race track. A large American flag was hung near the judge's stand and behind the flag was an electrical cross which shone through the folds and presented a beautiful sight.

Unfortunately, Mayor Durgan did not get to see the ceremonial as he was very busy with his police and the crowd which he believed was a "twenty roughnecks from the plank road," who it is understood were "low-down ordinance" passed by the city council.

Plans are being presented wholly by and with the compliments of the undersigned.

Kewanna Knights of the Ku Klux Klan."

The complete approval of the manager and the audience was expressed in prolonged applause.

KLANSMEN LAST FRIDAY AT ROCKFORD PROVES WONDERFUL SUCCESS

Spectacle Is Witnessed by Vast
Crowd—Approximately One
Thousand Are Initiated

Indianapolis Quartet Is a Feature
of Program—Grand Dragon of
Illinois Speaks

ROCKFORD, Ill., Sept. 8.—The first night of the progress of the Ku Klux Klan organization was presented at a big two days' gathering in a diving park, near the northwest corner of the city, last Friday and Saturday nights.

Over 2000 men and twenty-four robed horses were utilized in the parade and the spectacle was witnessed by a crowd variously estimated at between 75,000 and 100,000 people from Illinois and adjoining states.

Beginning with a scene depicting the gathering of the original sixteen members of the Klan on Stone Mountain in Atlanta, four years ago, the program showed in pantomime the phenomenal growth of the Klansdom to its present proportions. The scenery prepared for the staging was forty feet high and 200 feet long, and under the auspices of Klan No. 76, of Illinois, and its officers, at a total cost of approximately \$15,000, the program closed with a \$2,500 pyrotechnic display, and the fête closed Saturday night with the grand initiation of a class of about 1,000 members. A class slightly less than 1,000 members was initiated on the previous night.

Grand Dragon Speaks

A number of speakers delivered public lectures both before and after the parade. The Methodist minister of Mt. Vernon, Ill., and Edmund DeBarr, Klan lecturer from Atlanta, spoke before the parade. The Grand Dragon of the Klan of Illinois, J. Edgar Hoover, spoke after the parade.

One of the features of the program was the singing of an Indian Klan quartet from Logansport which the crowd encircled again and again.

The meeting was widely advertised as "The Great Midwest Pageant of Klans" and it was attended by a large crowd.

The opening day kept the crowd down to 25,000 at the minimum, but clear Saturday night, when the parade and night brought people to the grounds in numbers that could not be accurately estimated.

Women were employed three weeks preparing the grounds for the event. A pipeline was laid from the city to the grounds to provide drinking water for the visitors and the grounds were illuminated by improved electrical equipment.

CULPRITS DRIVE AT NIGHT IN
RAIDS ON PROTESTANT
MERCHANTS

Letter Writers Also Busy "Regretting"—Coincidences Are Peculiar—Snake Placed in Garage

Incorporating in their list of deprecations that of shattering plate glass windows of Protestant merchants, the forces opposed to Protestantism in Indianapolis have put into operation a brick-heaving squad that rides each night on its nefarious work. While this method of operation has been in effect for some time by the alien interests in Indianapolis, together with their boycotting program, reports of the last week show a carefully laid out plan to intimidate and coerce the Protestants of this city.

During the past week the large plate glass windows of the Weaver Furniture Company in West Washington street were shattered at 2 o'clock in the morning by having five bricks hurled through them. A firm operating at the corner of Madison street and Morris street, the wrath of those anti-Protestant forces and had their windows broken out by bricks.

The night-riding vandals, however, seem to be perfectly safe from the police as alleged chief of police Rikhoff is more concerned "getting" in this business than in trying to stop the heaving of bricks by agents of the anti-American Union League of which he is a member.

CATHOLIC PROPERTY SEEKS EXEMPTION

Do Not Want to Pay Taxes on Strome Hospital—Suit Filed May Affect Entire State

GREAT BEND, Kan., Sept. 10.—A suit seeking to have the county clerk and the county treasurer enjoined from in any manner spreading the word that property upon the tax rolls of Barton county or from in any manner seeking to collect taxes, either directly or indirectly, or from selling their property for taxes, was filed in the clerk of the district court's office recently by the nuns of the Third Order of St. Dominic against C. F. Younklin, county clerk, and W. F. White, county treasurer. Simultaneously a temporary restraining order granted by Judge H. A. Hall of the probate court restraining the two county officials from spreading the properties of the plaintiff upon the tax rolls, together with a surety bond of \$500, was filed in the clerk's office. The order was granted by Judge Hall because of the absence of Judge C. R. Douglas of St. John, of this judicial district, who is on his vacation.

Allege Institution Is Charitable
The nuns of the Third Order of St. Dominic, who operate the Strome hospital here, allege that their institution is a charitable one and should be exempt.
The case will be tried at the November term of district court.
The hospital's taxes this year total more than \$2,000.
The case is looked upon as a test case for other Catholic hospitals of the state.

INDEPENDENCE

By KEITH K. KENNEDY

(The following article is reprinted from the July 8 issue of *The Fiery Cross* after the receipt of a request.)

Independence is the God-given right of each and every individual. It is the heritage of truth, light, and intelligence; the spark that sets fire to the torch of liberty.
Down through the annals of history we find despots, tyrants and ecclesiastical powers of foreign birth, and today we celebrate the famous Fourth of July as the RICHEST and MOST POWERFUL NATION IN THE WORLD.
But what about this system that caused the French revolution, this system that caused Spain to drop from the world's greatest power to a mere hollow shell, this system that caused Ireland to turn traitor in the world war, this system that placed images of saints along the road to that living hell of yesterday called Siberia, and who might flee to death a woman, kiss a wooden toe and be immediately forgiven?

The answer is easy. They are throwing their forces into America. Their clergy must live in splendor. The countries they have ruined are no good for them now. America is rich. It is the land of promise. But America is EDUCATED. It is hard for them to wear where people are educated, so the line of attack does not come by the building of prisons to put people in that is the only way they do. They are too far outnumbered to try their wholesale torture stunts, so there is only one way left—from Rome comes the mild cry, "BREAK DOWN AMERICA'S SYSTEM OF EDUCATION."

Must Guard Liberty
When a nation has established her independence she must forever guard against the insidious workings of ecclesiastical powers of foreign birth, and in order to be more fully prepared to fight the enemy of liberty one must seek knowledge of her past performances.
The history of any nation will do as an example, and we pick out one at random, say—France. They had a bloody revolution over there at one time. Let us find out what it was all about.
At the time immediately preceding the bloodiest period of the world's history, there were in France, 12,000 monks, 60,000 curates, 37,000 nuns, 2,500 monasteries, 1,500 convents and 60,000 churches.

One-fifth of all the land belonged to the king, one-fifth to the nobles, and one-fifth to the church. This land was by far the richest land in France and the Abbot St. Germain des Pres alone had 800,000 acres. This three-fifths of the whole country was, of course, non-taxable. It was a happy state of affairs—for the clergy and the church. But there were twenty-six millions of PEOPLE struggling for a mere existence on the barren two-fifths that remained. The doctrines of paternalism in the state were completely triumphant. The clergy, reduced to a formal ran thus: "It is the duty of the state to teach man what things to do. It is the duty of the church to teach man what things to believe. As for man, it is his duty to be governed. That is—and was—the object of his creation. He must receive with unquestioned simplicity and obedience whatever is doled out to him by the priest to whom his management, his interests, his destiny in this world are entrusted.

All these maxims were adopted by the house of Bourbon, and the French people were asked to forever accept this condition of intellectual and bodily bondage. It is easy to see through the whole scheme. The royalty gives a rich part of the country to the church, which in turn, holds the subjects in ignorance and superstition in order that they will do the will of both state and church.
And thus the merry farce went on until the worn tyrant, Guillotine, blood, headless bodies, rivers polluted with flesh and bones brought terror to the hearts of those who had held the multitudes in slavery for so long.

Higher Intelligence Unknown
Being brought up under Catholic instruction, the revolutionists naturally knew nothing of the higher intelligence and had to resort to brute strength and superior numbers against what they had thought was religion.
Yes, history repeats. Russia, taught with the same teachings, held in ignorance by the same system, is now doing what the French did then. What difference does it make whether the church had in St. Petersburg or Rome—the teachings and the system are identical.
No individual or collection of individuals can exist under this system that works under the guise of religion, and sooner or later nation after nation rebels and asserts its independence, which it should have had from the beginning.

At no other epoch in the history of mankind was the human race emerging so rapidly from its old condition as the period in which our forefathers were colonizing in America. It was the age in which tradition suffered and ancient tyrannies were started from the throne. The lustiness gown that draped the shoulders and ignorance of the middle ages was ripped and sundered by the sword of knowledge. The emancipation of mankind from the thrall of tradition and ancient tyrannies was the sickening past was fast approaching.

In America at that time artificial reverence was done away with. Man was not bow to no man, nor the domination of another no better, no wiser than himself. He was beginning to realize what our Saviour meant when He said: "Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." It was a new man and a new society—one more free and the other more generous than the world had yet permitted to exist.

March 7, 1845, vice-behavioral brain bugging as ever, made an attempt to foil its nobility and clergy upon the founders of the new world. But it reckoned without reason, for revolution put the bugle to its lips and blew a blast that echoed to the four corners of the earth. When the smoke blew away then came the Fourth of July and the signing of the DECLARATION OF THE INDEPENDENCE OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

KLAN MARCHES IN SPITE OF THREAT

5,000 Witness Parade That Attorney Arthur Fitzpatrick Tried to Incite Riot Against

BAKERSVILLE, Okla., Sept. 10.—In spite of attempts at intimidation by threats of violence and published statements by one Arthur Fitzpatrick, a Bartlesville attorney, that "no masked mob would be permitted to carry the American flag down the street," the Ku Klux Klan paraded the streets of Bartlesville, guarded by 300 deputies sworn in for the occasion. Five thousand people lined the streets as the Klansmen marched in orderly procession, and no movement was made to prevent, nor was it hampered in any way, though it was confidently expected by residents of Bartlesville that there would be bloodshed, owing to the plot-inciting utterances of Fitzpatrick.
The parade had been preceded

by a mass meeting at the ball park of opponents of the Klan, which was addressed by Fitzpatrick, who declared he would either jerk the flag from its holder or die in the attempt. He advised the 2,000 persons in the grand stand to arm themselves and prevent the parade, assuring them that they would be provided with special commissions, omitting, however, to mention where the commissions were to come from. Fitzpatrick himself carries a special commission from Governor Walton.

Had Constitutional Rights
Immediately after the speech of Fitzpatrick, Rev. Donald H. Lagrone addressed the crowd, stating that the Klan had a constitutional right to parade, and that the remarks of Fitzpatrick would not cause a change of plans.
The legally constituted authorities of Bartlesville, the sheriff and chief of police had given permission for the parade, and it was due to them that the special guard of 300 police-men was furnished the paraders.
It is said that Fitzpatrick could not be found after the parade by reporters who wished for a statement from him as to his change of mind.

COUNTY PAPER NOW HAD AT MARIETTA, O.

Klan Grows Very Fast—Junior Order Is Now Functioning—Initiation Held

MARIETTA, O., Sept. 8.—A Columbus paper, sent out by the national speakers' bureau of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, advised a gathering of several thousand men and women at Cogswell field, near this city, the past week. The speaker took at his home, "The Program of Americans for America."

The Klan of Marietta sang several beautiful hymns. An unidentified Klansman sang a solo. The Klansmen then introduced to the assembled men and women the first Old man of the Junior Knights of the Ku Klux Klan. Marietta has the greatest honor of having instituted the first Junior Klan organization in America. The Juniors are traveling at such a rate here that they are making the Senior organization "get a move on them."

Take in 600 Members
At 10:30 p. m. the fireworks were set off and the novitiates, numbering close to 600 were lined up. The robed Klansmen formed a beautiful living fiery cross, and were marched through the cross four abreast, two men and two women marching to the strains of that inspiring Christian hymn, "Onward, Christian Soldiers." The novitiates ceremony were conducted under the rays of two large fiery crosses.

The Klan has about reached its quota here in Washington county. Its power is being felt, however, and soon this county will be a better place in which to live.

"Klankruff" Printed
The new Marietta Klan paper, "Klankruff," has just begun to live and breathe in this county. Its voice will ring in the ears of the Klansmen of this county. I am sure that the interest of the Klansmen here will be fostered by it. It will stimulate the growth of the Washington county Klan which has not reached the age of one year.
Meetings are held almost every evening in the rural districts of the county and hardly a night passes but what a fiery cross shows forth its glow, giving all a reminder that the Ku Klux Klan was here yesterday, here today and here forever.

BLYTEVILLE KLAN HOLDS BIG MEETING

BLYTEVILLE, Ark., Sept. 10.—Last Thursday night the local Klan held a big meeting and demonstration five miles west of here, which was attended by Klansmen from Leecheville, who came on a special train, also Klansmen from southeastern Missouri and all of Mississippi county.
They had a big barbecue just before the speaking began, which was enjoyed by all present.
After the speaking a large class was initiated, followed by a parade, led by a large fiery cross on a trolley car, which passed through the principal streets.
The Klan is real strong in and around Blytheville, and is doing well.

THE FIERY CROSS

IN past years it has unfortunately
been only too often the case that a
prison sentence, even for a minor of-
fense, has ruined a man's career to
the extent that on gaining his free-
dom he has found all the doors shut
to him which would lead to normal
employment. He has thus found him-
self almost forced to turn to crime.
Hence it is no surprise to learn of
the organization of various societies,
etc., in different parts of the world,
for the purpose of helping the over-
coming of this state of affairs. Such
societies arrange to take care of
prisoners on their being released from
jail and thus help to bridge over
the gap which has ere this proved
so impassable to many. It is part
of the work of these societies to
connect a man with a job, in this
case that is the main object, in-
stead when such a thing seems
most difficult to him.

One such organization, called the
Central Prisoners' Association, oper-
ates in a number of the middle west-
ern states, and has during the last
year accomplished a remarkable
amount of good in this manner. It
helps equally the man on parole and
the discharged prisoner, and Mr.
Lyon, the superintendent, recently
told an interviewer that he had to
warn prisoners that if they were
paroled from half a dozen or more in-
stitutions. He said also that his ob-
servation had led him to believe that
a gradual change for the better was
being made in the parole system, as
he had found that only once in a while
did a paroled convict fail to make
good when given an opportunity.

The organization of these societies
marks a wonderful advance in the
world's thought. It is gradually be-
coming recognized that in a great num-
ber of cases so-called criminals are
victims of circumstances rather than
inherently depraved, and it is being
discovered that the good in them can
be brought out if they are given a
chance to prove themselves. The day
is fast passing when a prison was
looked upon as a house of punishment
in which the inmates were to be
made to suffer to the limit, to be
then turned loose upon the world to
weak upon it if their weakness was
what they have been made to en-
dure.

Of course there are still many bar-
barous prisons and inhuman meth-
ods of punishment employed in them,
but on the whole there can be but
one change for the better, with a
resulting improvement in the mor-
ale of the prisoners themselves.

U. S. S. VIRGINIA IS SUNK BY BOMBERS

Battleship New Jersey Is Also
a Target for American
Aircraft

NORFOLK, Va., Sept. 8.—One
bomber weighing 2,000 pounds dropped
from an airplane 10,000 feet in the
air sent the battleship Virginia to the
bottom of the Atlantic ocean off
Cape Hatteras, today. The battleship
New Jersey, also a target for aerial
bombers, was still afloat at last re-
ports here but was so badly damaged
she was expected to go down at any
minute.

The Virginia was hit several times
and several bombs fell in the water
on both sides of her, but it was one
bomb that practically split the ship
in half and she went down in ten
minutes. The old ship actually
sank thirty-two minutes after the first
aerial bombers began their attack on
her.

Bomb Spells Doom
The bomb that spelled the doom
of the Virginia struck her at a ter-
rible point down her three smoke-
stacks, demolished her fighting
masts and ripped her deck almost
from top to bottom. The ship sank
so fast that other bombs dropped
from the air and intended to burst on
her decks sank in the water in foam
from the vessel after she had
disappeared below the surface.

The quick sinking of the Virginia
retarded the plans for a test
program of bomb dropping
from airplanes. It was planned to
keep the Virginia and New Jersey
for two days for two or three aerial

QUAKE FUNDS PILE UP FOR RED CROSS

Navy Is Doing Everything Possible to Rush Aid to Stricken Japan

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—From one end of the country to the other the people are joining with zeal and earnestness in the drive to raise relief funds for stricken Japan. Funds have begun to roll into the headquarters in Washington and other headquarters, and before the drive had hardly begun it became plain that \$5,000,000, the sum called for by the Red Cross with approval of President Coolidge, would speedily be raised. At the same time the Navy Department, War Department, Shipping Board and other government agencies are doing all possible to rush supplies of food and medicine to the devastated regions. Every chapter of the Red Cross has telegraphed to headquarters that its organization for raising its quota is perfected and that contributions are coming in. A cable was received from Hawaii announcing that thousands of dollars had been contributed. President Coolidge kept in close touch with the progress of the relief movement and the raising of funds and was much gratified, as was Ambassador Hanhara of Japan. Plans Are Perfected
Conferences at Red Cross headquarters were held Wednesday morning and afternoon, with a view to perfecting plans and speeding along the raising and dispatch of relief supplies to Japan. The executive committee of the Red Cross decided to take over the purchasing and shipping department of the American Relief Administration to insure expeditious handling of relief supplies to Japan.

COPENHAGEN, Sept. 8.—The late President Harding is included in a list of about thirty persons who are being proposed as recipients of the Nobel peace prize, says the Christiania Aftenposten. INVESTIGATION OF ANTI-KLAN RIOTS NOW UNDER WAY

Alien Mob Fires From Dark Upon Klansmen and Class of Candidates

More Than Fifty Americans Are Shot and Injured at New Castle, Delaware

WILMINGTON, Del., Sept. 8.—Investigation is now under way here following the ogling of a rigid inquiry by Acting State Attorney-General Platter into the recent anti-Klan riots in which Klansmen were fired on from the dark at the close of an anti-Klan burning in an open field at which three hundred candidates were taken into the organization. The attack occurred on August 31 at New Castle, Delaware, when a mob estimated at 1,500 opened fire, wounding members of the Klan who stood the glow of a fiery cross. Scores Shot and Injured
A youth and a man were shot in the battle, and more than fifty were injured less seriously. Ten were treated at a local hospital. The wounded youth is in a serious condition. At the same time state detectives are pushing their investigation into the riot. New Castle police also are conducting a probe. Mayor Eckles of New Castle declared although no arrests have been made yet, he is "contemplating ordering several."

This is the first outbreak against the Klan in Delaware, which, it is said, has been gaining membership in large numbers for some time past. Attacking just as a torch was applied to a huge wooden cross, the mob succeeded in breaking up the initiation and forcing the Klansmen to flee after strenuous fighting. Many of the injured, who were badly beaten, were treated on the field and near the scene of the riot by physicians from hospitals there who rushed to the farm in ambulances when word of the battle reached Wilmington.

Several were hurt when the Klansmen in an effort to break up the attack drove their motor cars into the crowd, mowing men and women down. A class of 300 candidates had been initiated into the order and the ceremonies were coming to a close when the fighting started. A huge flaming cross, used at all Klan ceremonies, had been ignited and several blank cartridges fired off about it by the Klansmen.

Seemingly as the signal for the start of the clash, when the igniting of the huge wooden cross, bedlam broke loose. The robed figures were visible indistinctly in the darkness and under sea lights of a smaller cross, presented a weird and ghastly appearance. A curious crowd of spectators, friends and families of the Klansmen lined the open field, held back by Klan guards, some in regalia and some in civilian clothes. Just as the flames swept up and lighted the horizontal bar of the cross, the first volley of shots was fired at the Klansmen.

Four mounted men, dressed in their robes, came charging across the field where a group of boys were standing, from whence the firing came. Mob Rushes Klansmen
The boys fled in all directions. Instantly a wave of men swept from the roads outside the field, where more than 100 motor cars were waiting, and rushing to the cross, overthrew and extinguished it. As this took place, the mob of men and boys, during the entire ceremony had been standing in nearby fields jeering the Klansmen, attacked. Crashing down the fence surrounding the farm, the attackers rushed into the field.

The Klansmen, amid volleys of shots from the members of the attacking mob, attempted to disperse their assailants. They were rushed off the field. In the darkness that followed the extinguishing of the cross, lighted only by the flash of pistol shots, the fighting began in earnest.

The Klansmen, after a short stand against the invading crowd, fled to their motor cars. Friends of the Klansmen who had been standing among the spectators, came to their aid. Stones and clubs were used in the battle which followed.

Flow Through Mob
Klansmen who reached their machines started the cars, and without hesitation plowed through the milling crowds gathered in front of the motors, injuring several of them. As the Klansmen started to see in the motors, the crowd attacked with renewed vigor, some leaping on the running boards of the cars and beating the occupants inside. Several of the injured were left lying on the field while the battle was carried to the road. Within a half hour the fighting ceased, as all the Klansmen had gained their cars and fled.

A few minutes later as the Klansmen sped toward New Castle, they passed through a colored settlement known as Hare's Corner, on the outskirts of the town. A large group of colored men and women, armed with Klan machines and shotguns, awaited them with a barrage of sticks and stones. Residents near the field telephoned to New Castle and Wilmington when the riot started and details of police were rushed to the scene. Within 15 minutes they arrived the fighting had ceased.

Popular New Women's Quartet in Demand

The usual rules governing the much discussed law of supply and demand seem to be somewhat out of adjustment in the matter of Klan singers, for it appears that the demand for quartets is much in excess of the supply at this time.

A new women's quartet, the "Golden Queens," an organization of local women, made their initial appearance at the Marion motel, where their offerings were greeted with remarkable enthusiasm. These ladies have a repertoire of very pleasing songs, whose sentiments will appeal especially to that class of sober-minded, yet patriotic individuals who respond to the highest ideals and inspirations of the spirit of Klansmanship. Their repertoire includes sacred songs, parodies of the better class, also songs of local interest, and patriotic selections. They are now open for engagements and their

INITIATION HELD AT WILMINGTON, DEL.

WILMINGTON, Del., Sept. 10.—The Ku Klux Klan initiated a class of more than 300, just outside of Northeast, Md., about 15 miles west of this city, Friday night. More than 7,000 persons from Delaware, Pennsylvania and Maryland crowded into the field in which the ceremonies took place. Fifteen hundred automobiles lined the road nearby. Two bery dories, 25 feet high, were erected about 50 feet apart. As they blazed bombs were exploded and the crowd was kept around and put through it. A well-known speaker, Wilmington addressed the crowd.

Old settlers of Ferris declare there were more people in Ferris Saturday than ever before in the history of the town. The parade went off with clock-like precision. It started at 8 o'clock and was over by 9 o'clock but at a late hour Saturday night the streets of Ferris were still crowded with visitors and the demonstration by the Klansmen was the sole topic of conversation.

It is a most encouraging sign that a branch of the Klan has been organized at Auckland, New Zealand, the purpose being to combat certain Asiatic influences. It is said to have been organized by a cable from Melbourne that the lodge already has a membership of nearly 1,000.

Klan life will be a continuous battle for years. Don't think that you can win the reward due to the patriot and deduce the heat and the burden of the day. You will be beset by thugs at each gate. Your life may often be in danger. But the prize you seek for is a great one. A nation that lives near to the ideals of the Fathers—will be worth all of your efforts and all of your pains. And remember that the Klan expects constancy of you. Anybody could be a traitor for a dollar's sake. The true Klansman can not be a traitor for any price whatsoever. Remember that there is a sense in which you do not now belong to yourself. Your life is not wholly your own to do with or to surrender or to drive along exactly as you drive it before you dedicate it to your country. One of the greatest demands made by Klan life is SERVICE. You must prepare yourself as a farmer prepares his land. The seed you must sow will have to do with sacrifice.

Hyman's "All Wet" Anguish
The other day a man was fined at New York for wearing a bathing suit at Coney Island which was deemed "improper." In his defense he submitted a photograph showing the great and puissant Mayor Hyman arrayed in a similar suit at Palm Beach. The answer to the judge, of course, is that locations determine propriety and impropriety—or the legal interpretation of them. But—do they?

Bullet and Trees
Many wise and good Americans believe that our entry into a world court would prove to be a panacea potent enough to rid the world forever of the noxious plague of Mars. But these deluded patriots fail to grasp the fact that the attitude of the United States upon matters which are really none of our business would only give the European diplomats a little more trouble and in the end would mean less to the struggling factions of the old world than a melting snowball on the corner cook's stove of the devil.

It is a far better idea, now that we are out of this foreign-tempestuous fiasco, to stay out of it, permitting Europe to take care of her own, while we use our energies in building good roads and new public school buildings.

We have our own problems to take care of. In a country where Protestant fraternal organizations are as numerous, where public schools are as numerous as the stars in the sky, and where the privilege of "assembly" is proscribed, where a harmless parade is the subject of attack by a hellish mob, where it is a criminal offense to read the Bible at "morning exercises" in our schools, where even the policemen and firemen of a city are unable to control the vicious swarms of people bent upon injuring a peaceful meeting of the Klan in an Old Fellows' hall, where vice runs the street wearing a foreign face, where all of the disintegrating forces of a very old enemy of the Christian church flare up to do their unappealing work of destruction, it is not wise that we should our children come where our efforts will actually mean something to the race?

Ten billions of trees planted in better than ten billions of bullets planted in the battlefields of the old world—fields already dyed crimson by wasted human lives.

It is not that we should refuse the hopeful service of brotherhood—the humanitarian, altruistic impulse, God forbid! It is simply that we should clearly recognize what best constitutes actual humanitarian effort. Our duty always begins at home no matter how far it ultimately reaches. To strengthen our republic, to provide for the education of our children, to build our commercial as well as military defenses, are things that concern us more than sitting on a dinky throne-chair with a bunch of dinky agreements of nations who have no more interest in our welfare than has a drove of comets in endless space.

It is a poor charity that robs one's own children to feed a spry buzzard!

REDUCTION OF TAX RESULTS IN SPLIT

President Coolidge Opposes
Any Cut at This Time—Is
Backed by Smoot

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—The plan of Chairman Madden of the House appropriations committee for extensive tax reduction by the next Congress ran against a snag when he laid it before President Coolidge.

Representative Green of Iowa, slated for the chairmanship of the House ways and means committee, which has jurisdiction over all tax and revenue legislation, returned to Washington and announced his opposition to any program for modification of the tax law at this time. Chairman Green stated that he would go to the White House Friday to submit his position to the President.

Smoot Also Opposed

Already Senator Smoot, who is scheduled to become chairman of the Senate finance committee, which likewise has jurisdiction over all tax legislation in the upper branch of Congress, has declared his opposition to proposed tax cuts. He has presented his views to the President at a conference.

Ordinary opposition by the chairmen of the two committees having jurisdiction over any given legislation is sufficient to keep the executive branch from moving forward with his proposed revenue measure, under the customary procedure will be that of a mere member of the House.

Meets Coolidge

Representative Madden laid his plan before the President only in a general way. However, he arranged for an appointment to see Mr. Coolidge at the White House to submit his proposal in detail.

The Madden plan calls for continuing legislation that will automatically reduce income and profits taxes in proportion to the amount of surplus of receipts over expenditures shown by the treasury at the end of each fiscal year. By his plan Representative Madden hopes to lower the taxes of the person of small income.

Representative Madden also favors the plan of Secretary of the Treasury Mellon to cut the taxes in the higher brackets, on the theory it would release money not tied up in tax-exempt securities for commercial and industrial development and thus bring in increased revenue from those sources.

Mellon Wants Lower Tax

The Mellon plan calls for reduction of the tax on top bracket incomes of \$80,000 or more a year from the present 63 per cent to 53 per cent and lower brackets in proportion.

Representative Green holds the view that the revenue is too uncertain as yet to warrant any reduction in the tax rate. His idea is that the present revenue law should be given a thorough trial before tampering with it.

There are others who hold the view that if the present tax rate is revenue over expenditures it should be applied toward reducing the bonded indebtedness of the government and cutting down the heavy interest charges, rather than cutting the tax rate to save a few cents or dollars to the individual taxpayer. They hold that the taxpayer would be more benefited in the long run by this plan than by a tax rate cut.

\$210,293,922 FORD BALANCE IS SHOWN

Total Assets Are Listed at Vast
Amount of \$597,000,000—Is
Greatest in History

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—The Ford Motor Company on June 30 last had a total cash balance of \$210,293,922, assuming the good will item unchanged at \$20,517,986, according to a compilation made public by Jones and Company. This is the largest sum ever publicly disclosed by the Detroit motor concern and is the largest cash holding ever reported by any industrial concern in the world.

The minimum profits indicated for the four months ended June 30 by a comparison of profit and loss surplus of the company's June 30 report and with a more detailed report filed in Massachusetts, were \$54,351,569. Allowing for moderate depreciation, earnings on the Ford capitalization of 12,546 shares of stock are now placed in the "four-figure class." All these profits accrue to the Ford family, in which the entire ownership of the company is vested.

Total Assets \$597,000,000
Total assets of the Ford company are \$597,000,000, compared with less than \$100,000 twenty years ago, when it was organized in the state of Michigan. At that time Henry Ford's total capital investment was only \$28,000, some of which had been subscribed by friends of the present "king of the motor industry."

TRIAL FLIGHT OF ZR-1 TO BE IN SEPTEMBER

First of Its Type Ever Built in
America—May Fly to
North Pole

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 8.—With favorable weather conditions the first trial flights of the United States navy's new air-monster, the ZR-1, will be made this month, and if the hopes of the builders are realized and the plans of the operators do not go awry these flights will be extended gradually until within a few months every important center in the United States will have been visited. The people in all sections of the country will thus be given an opportunity of seeing the first rigid airship of its type ever built in America.

A later flight to the north pole possibly may be undertaken. Such a venture laid under the aegis of the navy's plans to that end have been made.

Mammoth Hangar

"Mammoth," "monster" and "giant" are the only words that are at all adequate to describe the hangar at Lakehurst, N. J., where she has been assembled and is now housed. Even they do not convey concrete conceptions of size and the dimensional figures when they are stated are more bewildering than impressive.

When we are told that the ZR-1 is 580 feet in length and that the hull has a diameter of seventy-nine feet with a total gas capacity of 2,115,000 cubic feet, we know that she is big, but as to just how big the mind remains a bit hazy.

When we are informed that the Lakehurst hangar's inside dimensions are, roughly, 300 feet in length by 250 feet in width and 110 feet in height, we know that it is immense, but the figures still leave us with only a vague idea of what they mean.

A Mental Picture

However, when it is stated that the ZR-1, if brought down in a sufficiently wide city street, would overtop comfortable two standard city squares in length and would tower to the height of the ordinary eight-story building, we may get a mental picture of the airship that conveys approximately a real idea of her size.

And when we are told that the hangar would cover almost three city blocks, that two average twelve-story office buildings could be pushed through its doors side by side and lost in the interior, or that three baseball games could be played within it at one time without one encroaching upon another in the slightest, we begin to realize what "mammoth" means when the word is applied to the Lakehurst structure.

It would be difficult to estimate the size of the crowd, although some thought that there were 10,000 Klansmen and spectators at the ceremonies on the park grounds. The grandstand was filled, while the race track, and the circle inside for a distance of several feet and the grounds outside the fence were thronged.
