WOMEN HOLD FIRST MEETING AT AUBURN

Class of 100 Ladies Take Oath of Americanism Before Huge Fiery Cross

AUBURN, Ind., Sept. 15.—The Women of the Ku Klux Klan held their first meeting here recently and a class of 100 candidates were given the oath of Americanism.

Among the many features of the meeting was a song written by a member of the Women's Organization, entitled "Onward, K. K. K.," and sung by the women's quartet of Garrett.

A solo by a young lady from Waterloo, and several numbers by a quartet from the same place, were received by the crowd with hearty applause.

At the close of the musical numbers a speaker of national fame took the stand and for two hours held his large audience in rapt attention while he delivered a stirring address on the principles on which the organization stands. The speaker was interrupted many times by vigorous applause and when he spoke of bringing his address to a close, cries went up from the crowd for him to "go ahead."

After the address, a huge fiery cross burst into flame and the candidates gathered about it where the oath of Americanism was administered. The moon, coming forth from behind the clouds in the east, threw its pale light over the fantastic scene, making a picture that left a lasting impression with all those present.

More than 500 machines were parked about the place which will give an idea of the crowd that attended the meeting in addition to the vision of the organization and its showing intense interest in all communities.

Enthusiasm is at a high pitch and it is understood that many other meetings will be held in the near future.

GROWTH OF KLAN IN SOUTH IS STEADY

Georgia and Louisiana Very Active—Flood of Membership Applications in Texas

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 18.—Eastern newspapers commenting upon the steadily huge growth of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan in Georgia, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and in the Eastern and Northern states, declare that this growth is offset by loss of membership in the South.

The Southern states for the most part are now organized realms, which are under their own state administrations and where charters of the Klans have been closed thus taking them from a provisional status. Actual figures show that the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan is showing a steady increase both in membership and in activity in every state south of the Mason and Dixon line.

Louisiana Klans Flourishing
The Realm of Louisiana has ninety-two Klans. Every one of these organizations is reported in good standing.

"Good standing" means that meetings are held regularly, that dues are paid locally and nationally and that the Klan is active and fully functioning.

The Grand Dragon of the Realm of Georgia, a visitor at the Imperial Palace recently, commented upon the enthusiasm and activity of the Klans within his realm, some of which are six or seven years old.

"Never have the Klans in my realm been so active in the interest of Klankraft as at present," the Georgia Klan executive says. "We are issuing new charters for Klans in Georgia almost daily. Our membership in the home state of the Klan is greater than ever before."

The editor of the Imperial Klankraft of this city has received a letter from a Klansman at Dallas, Texas, which says "applications for membership in Dallas Klan are pouring in. We expect to initiate a class of many thousand on Klan day at this state fair of Texas." Texas has over three hundred active Klans.

Alabama Klans Active
"Every Klan in Alabama shows a material increase in membership during the past three months," says the Grand Dragon of the realm.

Steady growth of the chartered Klans is reported in Arkansas, Tennessee, North Carolina, Florida, and Virginia.

It hardly looks as if the Klan were losing ground in the Southern states when the newspapers carry reports almost daily of great open-air naturalization ceremonies at which thousands of alien come within the borders of the Invisible Empire.

The Klan is established firmly and forever in the South and its phenomenal growth in the Northern states will make it a solid bulwark for Protestant Christianity and Americanism throughout the nation.

Thousands Are Admitted
It may be interesting for Klansmen to know that in the middle Western and eastern states alone during the week ending August 18 fifteen thousand aliens were naturalized. This does not include the increase in membership in the chartered Klans of the country. There are of course more chartered than provisional Klans in the organization.

LARGE KLAN MEETING HELD AT SCOTTSBURG

SCOTTSBURG, Ind., Sept. 18.—One of the most impressive sights ever seen here was the gathering of more than 2,000 men and women at the fair grounds, who stood in unison and sang "America" and "Onward, Christian Soldiers" at a meeting held by the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan recently.

A stirring address on Americanism was made by a nationally-known speaker to the big crowd in the grandstand and the orator brought many bursts of applause from his audience during his talk.

Two large fiery crosses were burned in the field directly in front of the crowd and eight Klansmen in full regalia sang "The Old Rugged Cross" in the soft glow of their light. A large class of candidates was then naturalized in the initiation ceremony of the order, and after the oath of Americanism was administered the Women's Organization took a large class into their order.

HUGE CROWD GATHERS AT ALL-DAY PICNIC

Speakers, Initiations, Band Concert and Big Parade All on Klan Program

CLAYTON, Ind., Sept. 18.—All roads leading into town, where all streets in town, were pressed to capacity Saturday when a mammoth crowd of persons gathered into town to attend an all-day picnic held by the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

Several well-known speakers gave interesting addresses on Americanism, patriotism and the principles of the Klan and were very enthusiastically received by the large crowds who gave them rapt attention.

The Brownsburg band rendered a concert during the afternoon, and at night a huge parade was formed with long lines of Klansmen in full regalia following a company of fifty knights on horseback.

Taking part in the parade was the Women's Organization, marching also in full regalia, and various floats bearing symbols of the order were cheered along the line of march, as were the marchers themselves.

Class of 100 Initiated
After the parade, a class of 100 were naturalized in the initiation ceremonies of the Invisible Empire in the light of one of the most beautiful fiery crosses that many had ever seen. The cross burned with an even light for two hours.

The streets and country roads were heavily crowded with traffic throughout the day but there were no accidents of any kind reported owing to the skillful way in which the traffic was handled by the Klansmen.

20,000,000 Radio Fans by 1928, His Forecast

CHICAGO, Sept. 17.—In less than five years there will be a radio audience in the United States of 20,000,000, Dr. Leo DeForest, radio inventor, said in a message sent by radio from the steamship Leviathan to the delegates attending the annual meeting of the American Radio Relay League.

"Radio will have a continually expanding influence on the welfare of the world," said DeForest's radio-gram. "It will make people happier through its entertainment utility, healthier by its dissemination of information, and better through its power to promote understanding."

MT. WASHINGTON HAS KLAN CEREMONIALS

Fake Fire Alarm Turned In When Gigantic Fiery Cross Is Lighted

MT. WASHINGTON, Md., Sept. 15.—The open-air meeting and naturalization here on September 14 was a big success. The affair was held under the auspices of the Hampton Klan and Klanmen from the Thomas Dixon Klan and Thomas Jefferson Klan took part.

It was a joint naturalization event and aliens to the number of 156 were initiated into the three Baltimore Klans. A large crowd 75 feet

and 80 feet across illuminated the field, while over 3,000 Klansmen, all in full regalia, attended. Those attending the meeting were of the grade in the Klan of which there were about 1,500.

Fanatic Gives Alarm
Some little excitement was caused shortly after the fiery cross was lighted by some fanatic turning in the fire alarm, which necessitated the Baltimore county firemen making a run of four and one-half miles. This happened at about 10:30 p. m. Nothing else out of the ordinary took place.

Dr. J. H. Hawkins, of the Imperial Palace, in behalf of the Imperial office, in a public speech at the grounds offered a reward of \$50 for information leading to the arrest of the party or parties guilty of turning in the false alarm of fire.

fect, stressing particularly the difference between the assimilability of the old and new immigration. In 1910 the census reported in 1910 and the monumental work still stands as the broadest and most authentic information on the racial, social and ethnic qualities of these diverse peoples. Since that date the researches of other agencies have added facts corroborating these of the commission.

"Let me state briefly the most important of these vital facts. They are alarming to one who has the true interests of America at heart and who desires that it shall be the greatest moral and spiritual force the world has ever known for the spreading of those two great civil concepts—government by the consent of the governed and government for the common welfare—in every land.

"First of all let me state briefly a few salient facts showing that the source of our immigration has changed. Before 1883 more than 85 per cent of all the immigrants from Europe came from England, Germany, Scandinavia, the Netherlands, Belgium, France and Switzerland. Then a great immigration movement began from Italy, Austria, Russia, Poland, Greece and the Balkan states, until, in the years before the war intervened, more than 70 per cent of our total immigration was coming from southern and eastern European nations.

Italy Leads Immigration
"Just before the outbreak of the war, Italy alone was furnishing more immigrants than came from Great Britain, Germany, Scandinavia, France, the Netherlands, Belgium and Switzerland combined! "With this momentous change in source came a great increase in the

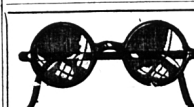

"Our immigration was more than doubling. It had suddenly become an influx—and an influx of Latin races. In the years from 1910 to 1920 no less than 2,000,000 immigrants came to us from the new racial groups. The average number of immigrants per year was 1,000,000.

"That was the thought-provoking record under the long-time policy of practically unrestricted admission to our gates. Many of us Americans going about in our busy life have made our own observations of some of these new types of immigration and have picked up from the newspapers and in other ways casual information about them. Many may have formed some opinion in the way as to the quality of this new human material for the purposes of the republic.

"I wish to give you the epitomized results, not of casual observation and reading, but of the great governmental inquiry of the Immigration Commission and the other agencies that have assembled and interpreted masses of detailed facts bearing upon this question. "And in stating the results of these scientific inquiries as to whether the immigrants of these newer types are an aid or a detriment to our racial stock, I do so without prejudice, in a spirit of kindness to all men, seeking simply the common welfare of this people and its honest helpmate to the world.

"Moreover, please bear in mind that the census and the conclusions drawn from them apply not to those nations as nations or peoples, but to that element of them which has drawn itself to America. The older immigrants, I have said, were the best individuals of their races for American purposes. It is clear that the individuals who came to us under present conditions from the south and east of Europe are not the best of their respective races. We should not judge their home countries as a whole by these samples.

Immigration Now Inferior

"In this spirit let us face the following facts: "In the first place, the new immigrant has been shown to be much inferior to the older type. The native American stock in soundness of body and mind and in physical and mental development. The immigrant from some of these newer racial sources is also inferior in moral character.

"The evidence on these points is clear, abundant and incontrovertible. A few examples in proof are sufficient: "During the war the rejections of drafted men proved the relative unfitness of the foreign-born for military service as compared with the native and older immigrant stock. A comparison was made between war of eastern cities and the native and older immigrant stock. A comparison was made between war of eastern cities and the native and older immigrant stock.

"Our war records of the physical and mental health of the drafted men give a far more complete and authoritative index of the health of our population than was ever available before. Not only was there a physical examination of every man called by the local draft board, but those not rejected by them were subjected to much more detailed examination after their arrival at the encampments. All told, two and three quarters of a million men were examined.

Mental Disease Prevalent
"A 1600-page, official compilation of the results, prepared by the office of the surgeon-general of the army, reveals the fact that some form of mental disease or deficiency was found in 50,000 of the men.

"These medical examinations were separate from the army intelligence tests—psychological tests that revealed the predominance of a low grade of intelligence among the foreign-born men—a predominance especially due to the newer immigrants. These were seven grades of intelligence recognized from 'very superior' down to 'very inferior.' Among the foreign-born soldiers almost half were in the two lowest grades, 'inferior' and 'very inferior,' with a mentality equivalent only to that of a normal 11-year-old American boy. Two-thirds of the Poles and Italians were in these lower groups. These intelligence tests covered 300,000 foreign-born men. We can not doubt the validity of the comparison of the intelligence of federal and state institutions for the custodial care of the constitutionally diseased, the dependent and the criminal, with special reference to whether the new races of immigrants contribute more to their share of the burden of social inadequacies in such institutions. The study was made by Dr. Harry H. Laughlin, surgeon expert of the Carnegie Institution, who presented elaborate statistics compiled by the most scientific methods, and this is his conclusion on the whole matter:

"In reference to feeble-mindedness, insanity, epilepsy, tuberculosis and deformity, the older immigrant stocks are vastly sounder than the recent.

"The number of inmates dealt with in these calculations is large enough to justify considering the several groups as fairly representative samples of their particular types in the whole population."

"The outstanding conclusion is that, making all logical allowances for environment conditions, which

may be unfavorable to the immigrant, the recent immigrant is a present a higher proportion of inferior, socially inadequate qualities than do the older stocks."

Crime Average Runs High

"Of crimes in particular, Dr. Laughlin says: "The countries which have lowest crime rates are those which have come to the present state of civilization from the foundation of the population of the United States—such as Great Britain, Scandinavia, Ireland, Germany and France. These immigrant groups that run high in crime are from the countries of southern and eastern Europe."

"The Italians, the Greeks and those of the Balkan states have from two to three as many criminals in our prisons as the proportion of these races in our total population would entitle them to if they were only average in their criminal tendencies. "Finally, the death rate of our foreign-born is shown by the census to be appreciably higher than that of the American stock. In any people the death rate of infants is so high that it materially swells that for a people as a whole. But, on the average, immigrants are about 20 years old when they come to America and there are consequently very few foreign-born babies in the country. Yet the foreign-born death rate, even without the factor of infant death rate to swell it, is higher than the American. This was in 1910. No figures are available for 1920.

"When it comes to literacy the census shows that only two and one-half per cent of native white persons from ten years of age, and up, are unable to read and write, thirteen per cent of the foreign born of ten years old and up can not pass these rudimentary tests. The particular deficiency of the southern and European races in this respect was brought out by the Immigration Commission in 1910 in its report, which showed that the immigrants of these races at the time of their admission were thirteen times as many as the immigrants from the northern countries.

Low Grade of Mentality

"Children of these immigrants, the commission showed, are considerably below the children of native-born parents in ability to pass their work at school, or to attain distinction. Relatively few of the ever show in high school. This condition among the children may well be explained by the lower grade of mentality among the foreign born men themselves in the army intelligence tests.

"This startling series of facts is from official records. There is here no product of passion. I repeat them in no spirit of indictment. I mean that they should be looked at not even as the fault of the particular individual concerned, for the science tells us these types of disease, of mental deficiency, and social inadequacy are hereditary, carried by the blood of the generation, and are, for that very reason they are more serious and must require a national impairment, unless we heed the warning in time.

"To continue to admit the members of inferior races into this country on a large scale can only mean a steady and inevitable decline in the physical, mental and moral well-being of the American nation. "Next, let us look at what is termed some of the 'social' results of this newer immigration. Ethnological experts have advanced convincing arguments to the effect that immigration in the long run does not result in a new addition to the total population, but a gradual displacement or substitution of immigrants for native-born—the birth rate of the native stock being due to correspond approximately with the increase of immigration. Moreover, there appears to be a tendency toward the gradual displacement of our native stock by descendants of the new immigrants from the fact that the birth rate of our foreign-born inhabitants is very much larger than that of native stock.

Birth Rate Per Cent Astonishing

"A recent pamphlet published by the New York State Department of Health contains the following remarkable statements: "Attention is directed to the fact that 73.1 per cent of all births to foreign-born women were to Italian, Russian and Austro-Hungarian races, and that these races accounted for nearly 27 per cent of all the births occurring in the state outside of New York City, although they furnish less than 7 per cent of the total population."

"My friends, the significance of authoritative statements like these can hardly be overestimated. Unrestricted immigration would appear to result in a gradual contraction of our native American stock. Shall we take the responsibility for continuance in such a course?

"One of the oft-deplored tendencies in modern American civilization is the over-increasing congestion of population in cities and industrial centers. Let us see what influence the new immigration has here. "New York City, for example, a typical immigrant from Poland or Czechoslovakia, lands at Ellis Island before the quota for the month is exhausted, does he go as a pioneer to Alaska, or as a farmer to the sparsely settled West? It is not likely. He is far more likely to be absorbed in some 'immigrant colony' in New York or Pittsburgh.

"He lives in about one-third of one room, and adds to the over-crowding of the city, and the increasing menace of foreign colonies with low standards of living and anti-American traits.

Crowded Into Industrial Centers

"Statistics show that nearly half of our total foreign-born population is crowded into the great industrial cities of the United States having a population of 1,000,000 or more, while only 25 per cent of our native

whites of all types are found in these congested districts. The steady tide of the new immigration into these districts is such a constant menace to the standard of civilization which Americans hold dear.

"Perhaps the best evidence of the failure of the recent immigrant to become assimilated is found in the widespread existence of immigrant colonies and immigrant communities throughout the United States. They may be found in every important city near the Atlantic seaboard—and to enter one of these districts is to feel as though one is in a section of another country which has been transplanted bodily into America. The "Minority Faction"

With the perpetual fight which the Indianapolis News has waged on that part of the Board of School Commissioners of the City of Indianapolis, which has the welfare of the schools at heart, all stories in that paper reflecting on the present school conditions come with poor grace.

The school conditions, especially the lack of proper buildings and the crowded conditions, are bad at this time is a well-known fact. However, it can hardly be considered appropriate for the newspaper that has been the chief factor in bringing about these conditions to comment editorially on "the lack of facilities" and to carry news stories about "crowded schoolrooms."

The Indianapolis News has ever waged a fight in favor of the "minority faction" of the school board, which at the present time is headed by Charles L. Barry. In the past the same influences which are now represented by Mr. Barry had the support of the Indianapolis News. These influences have ever fought progress in the public schools of this city and with the result that school standards have dropped and at present it is necessary to have.

At the present time the building program is being held up by the State Tax Board, on which sits Phil Zoercher, who has been one of those who have been very bitter in their fight on the school board. The result is that the minority faction has succeeded in almost disrupting the school board and has balked up to this date all building programs that might give the children of Indianapolis proper buildings in which to secure an education.

The children of Indianapolis are the real sufferers at present as a result of the attitude of the Indianapolis News, which acts as the mouthpiece of the "minority faction." On last Friday it was necessary to dismiss five schools on account of no heat in the buildings, this being a direct result of the aid given the faction of Charles L. Barry by the Indianapolis News. The entire system is disrupted by those who keep up a continuous nagging at the members of the school board, who are trying to give to Indianapolis school children that which they deserve and have every right to expect.

During the month of July the school board met with the State Tax Board. It had waited all night and agreed to go before the tax board as persons who could legally sign such a paper. Only eight of these persons were legal signers, but the school board waived all rights. This fact merely serves to illustrate that with which the majority members of the school board have to contend.

The bond issue of \$1,355,000 asked by the school board is being held up, and from the attitude of the Indianapolis News it appears that for paper will all it can do to defeat the issue. The money is for the construction of eight buildings, included in which are the proposed colored high school and a new high school on the west side, the latter would do much to add conditions at Shortridge and Manual. The bond issue would also take care of the purchases of ground valued at \$135,000 and the improving of sanitary conditions in the schools throughout the city.

The Indianapolis News believes that this building program should be delayed. "The News has believed" this for the past three years and put forward the argument that the city should wait until "prices have gone down." In the meantime, the rising generation is being sacrificed and stunted on an education; the members of the school board, who would give the children that which they should have, are being attacked and the aid of the Indianapolis News and Phil Zoercher, in blocking all building programs for the betterment of the schools of Indianapolis.

KLANKRAFT SPREADS OVER PENNSYLVANIA

Protestants Rally Following

most astonishing jump in membership was made in Pennsylvania during the second day period just past. The spread of Klankraft in Pennsylvania comes on the heels of the murder of Klansman Thomas R. Abbott at Carnegie recently. Protestant Americans in the state evidently resent this outrage and the brazen attempt to curb their constitutional rights of American citizens by religious fanatics.

PUBLIC OWNERSHIP OF MINES LOOMS

Government Report on Coal
Contains Thirty-seven
Recommendations

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.—Unless the public receives better service from the coal industry, public ownership of that industry may become necessary.

The United States Coal Commission so intimates in a report on "labor relations in bituminous coal mining," made public recently. The report contains thirty-seven recommendations and suggestions.

These conclusions are presented, the report states significantly, in the hope that they "may help to point the way to better relations and to such service to the public that resort to public ownership may be unnecessary."

Certain of the more important recommendations of the commission follow:

Both sides should give study. That both sides study means of meeting the fundamental problem of unemployment through stabilization of the industry.

That joint commissions be established to make thorough studies of the principal jobs and the existing rate differentials, looking to revision of the rate structure at present marked by so many inequalities.

That the government collect and publish rates and rate changes in the nonunion fields.

That check-weighmen be employed by the men in nonunion fields "as a means of insuring confidence in weights."

That the form of wage payment known as "sub-contracting" and that leasing of convict labor to operators be discontinued.

Limitation of Output. That both sides make a serious study of the problem of undue limitation of output and of the causes which have led to it.

That each agreement in the union fields provide that disputed cases of discharge be settled promptly through conciliation or arbitration and that nonunion operators place adequate checks on the exercise of the right to discharge.

That "violence, thuggery and gun-work" be condemned whether or not practiced by the union to enforce complete unionization or by the operators to prevent it.

That individual contracts which are not free-will contracts be abolished.

That the right of union and non-union workers to advance their cause by "peaceful and honest persuasion" be recognized.

Avoid Standard Cutting. That a system of national negotiations with district agreements worked out to avoid standard cutting wars between districts.

That a continuing umpire be appointed in each district.

That more attention be given to the training of superintendents and foremen in problems of management, especially in dealing with labor under an union agreement.

The report advocates the fullest of publicity in all phases of the industry and stresses the need of closer contact between district union officers and the men.

"BIBLE BRINGS NEW VISION"—COOLIDGE

People who have been moved to doubt President Coolidge's Protestantism should recall that in all of his public utterances his mind has traveled along paths which were fundamentally Puritan. Naturally he is the president of all the people and must react to the forces that play upon him from all directions, striving to be just and impartial in everything, and manifesting an openness of heart pleasing to the varied classes he is bound constitutionally to serve. But, throughout all of his public thinking runs the indicative thread of sane private opinion—the clean loyalty to duty and to the demands of a democracy whose constitution makes clear the free will of a dynamic commonwealth founded by Puritan forefathers.

The nature of the president's attitude toward the things which Americans hold dear comes out with clearness in a single paragraph of his speech to the New York Y. M. C. A. convention.

"It was for the principle of personal judgment in matters of religion that the English and Dutch were contending and which set the common people to reading the Bible. There came to them a new vision of the importance of the individual which brought him into direct contact with his Creator. It was this conception applied to affairs of government that made the people sovereign. It raised up the common man to the place which heretofore had been reserved for a privileged class in church and state. It ennobled the people. The logical result of this was the free man, educated in a free school, maintaining a free government. It was the American colonies that defended and re-established these everlasting truths. It was because religion gave the people a new importance and a new glory that they demanded a new freedom and a new government. It can not in our generation reject the cause and retain the result."

Perhaps these words show without further comment how little Protestants have to fear the drift of the chief executive's opinions. As some one has said, "A man who talks thus understands what the reformation meant—especially the Calvinistic end of it."

NEW MASONIC BUILDING

ROUND-THE-WORLD SERVICE TO START

Pacific Coast Line Will Operate
First of Its Kind Under
Any Flag

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.—Chairman Edward P. Parley, of the United States Shipping Board, announced recently the sale of seven combination freight and passenger ships, known as the 502 type, to the Dollar Line, whose home office is in San Francisco.

These vessels will be operated in an around-the-world service starting at San Francisco and touching Japan, China, the Philippines, Java, Straits Settlements, Singapore and India.

Passing through the Suez Canal, they will call at Egypt, Mediterranean ports and New York, going through the Panama Canal to home. By arrangement with the board, the service is guaranteed for five years.

First Service of Its Kind. This will be the first round-the-world service of this kind under any flag. The shipping board is of the belief that this service will be of great value to the American travelers and merchants.

These ships were built by the New York Shipbuilding Company and are of 10,533 gross tons register and 6,195 tons net, five of them being now operated from New York to London. They will be supplemented by other fast freight ships.

The first vessels to be sold by the shipping board as a result of their advertisement of April 28, 1923, were two ships to the Grace Line, which will be supplemented by their own vessels and operated from the west of North America to the west coast of South America. This service is guaranteed for five years. These vessels were the Rotarian and the Orcus, both cargo vessels of about 7,500 tons each. They were built by the Todd Drydock and Shipbuilding Company of Tacoma, and completed in 1920.

WOMEN RELEASED AFTER QUESTIONING BY POLICE. LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Sept. 17.—Mrs. Martha Casper and Mrs. Gertrude Gravier, arrested in St. Louis Tuesday for questioning about the murder of Mrs. Myrtle Elizabeth Hamilton in this city on the night of August 20, were released by Sheriff Homer Adkins after a thorough investigation of the alibi offered by the two women.

Sheriff Adkins said that it would have been impossible for the women to have been in Little Rock the night Mrs. Hamilton was killed.

JAPANESE FEAR WINTER FOLLOWING QUAKE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—Japan's fear of clothing and building to protect the multitude of sufferers has been recognized by the American Red Cross which authorized the quick shipment of hundreds of thousands of pieces of underwear and outer clothing as well as large quantities of corrugated iron sheltering. Urgent requests came from the stricken areas that the advent of cold weather made immediate action imperative.

An indication that the Japanese government is fearful that freezing weather will take a heavy toll from the half-nourished population was found in a message received at the Japanese embassy here. It said that in addition to shelter and clothing, heating apparatus of all types was needed, and gasoline was asked for.

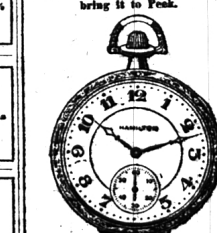

SAYS FLOTILLA WAS FAR OFF COURSE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.—Rear Admiral Robert E. Cochrane, commanding the United States fleet, reported to the Navy Department that an adequate explanation had been given for the unusual position of the seven American destroyers when they were wrecked on the California coast Saturday night. He declared the squadron was far off its prescribed course and was steaming in a fog at 20 knots.

Officials in charge of the inquiry

have been ordered by the department to expedite any information bearing upon the causes of the disaster, without waiting for completion of the investigating board's report.

Secretary of the Navy Edwin Denby was said to feel that the unusual features of the case necessitated special action.

Estimates of visibility, which obtained at the time of the disaster, Admiral Cochrane said, varied among officers on the destroyers. His message did not go into details.

A contract for the salvaging of the Chaucer, the only ship of the seven regarded as having salvage value, has been approved by Secretary Denby.

GRAND DRAGON SPEAKS BEFORE COAL MINERS

(Continued from Page 3)

Many of our coal mining towns, our best manufacturing centers, our steel towns, and others, are almost entirely made up of foreigners who have little claim to Americanism. It is the fact that they walk on American soil. In almost every other way they are foreign to American principles and political and social ideals.

Contrast Is Cited

"In contrast with the new type of foreigners in the cities I am sure your mind will flash to the thousands of farming communities of this great Mississippi valley where so many English and Germans and Scandinavians settled in the earlier period and to which some of these nationalities still come.

"Russian Monopolies have also settled in a few farming localities of the west, and in New England along the Atlantic coast. Foreigners are going into farming. There are half a million foreign-born farm operators in the United States, but most of them are here in this Upper Mississippi valley of ours and most of them of these older races. None are harder working or better farmers. A higher proportion of them owned their farms in 1920—higher proportion, I say, men owned their farms than in the case of our native farmers. And their farms averaged fifteen thousand dollars in value against eleven thousand dollars for the natives.

"It is the increasingly industrial character of our civilization that is congesting our cities and towns. The new type of foreigner is by no means to be held responsible for this. He simply adds to its intensity. The older immigrant, on the other hand, more often tending to go on the land, was largely a counteracting factor. Where he settled in the city or town he was mainly a worker in the skilled occupations and trades rather than a common laborer or factory operative. In the twelve years from 1899 to 1910 there was an increase as high as a proportion of the immigrants from northwestern Europe were men in skilled occupations and was the case among those who came from the rest of Europe. Few of them find their way to the slums.

"No, there is no doubt, my friends, that the newer stocks of immigrants contribute far more to our distinctive 'city' problems than do those other races that we have welcomed. With such benefits to ourselves, to share in their heritage.

Standard of Living Is Criterion

"The standard of living is perhaps the best criterion of the civilization of a nation, and we in America have prided ourselves on securing and maintaining a higher standard of living than any other country in the world.

"The immigration commission made a very careful study of the standard of living of the different races in this country. As measuring this standard, it made comparison of wages, of health and sanitary conditions, of crowding in tenement houses and the number of persons occupying a single room, of child labor and numerous other factors which serve to indicate the standard of living conditions. In each of the above-mentioned studies the new immigrant was found to exist at a lower plane of living than even the lowest classes of our native-born. The great majority of Greeks, Italians, Slavs and Poles in this country live in a condition of poverty, congestion and dirt that is unbearable to the average American.

"The great argument which is advanced for relaxation of our immigration laws at the present time is the economic one. It is said that we need immigrant labor for American industry; that we must have it if we are being held back by an inadequate labor supply. Judge Gary of the United States Steel Corporation paints a pathetic picture of

American business thrived and held far below its capacity because of the scarcity of labor which would pour in from abroad without the asking. If we only gave it a chance.

"Do human beings exist simply in order to give labor power for industry? Such is the logical conclusion from Judge Gary's argument. Rather, my friends, let it be said that industry exists in order that it may be the servant of humanity and that it may give organized opportunities for making a living to these human beings abroad here.

"If the gates were opened wide and all admitted, how long before would produce an overabundance with resulting curtailment, greater unemployment than we have known before and stagnation of industry!

Immigration Reduces Wages

"The inevitable economic law of diminishing returns teaches us that after a certain point the more men there are in any country the less each one gets, for the increase in the product of labor is less in proportion to the increase in laborers.

"There is no such thing as a permanent scarcity of labor. In any country soon adjusts itself to the actual supply of labor on hand, without diminution of the per capita reward for the worker or producer, and with an increase in such return.

"Stated in plain terms, the demand of large manufacturers for immigrant labor at the present time is hardly a demand for cheap labor. It is a demand for men who will accept work at wages below that which the American standard of living demands; for men who will work longer hours than Americans; for men who will undertake the most dangerous and health and comfort insist should constitute a day's work; for men who will undertake the most dangerous and health and comfort insist should constitute a day's work; for men who will undertake the most dangerous and health and comfort insist should constitute a day's work.

"But can not the employers see that 'so far as their market is the home market and in most lines this is predominantly the case, the buying power of the mass of the people is the support of the market? An impoverished people cannot buy what the employers produce. Inevitably we saw that in the business depression of the last half of 1920 and the year 1921. The same principle is at work all the time, though not so clearly obvious. The unemployed group as a whole, too cheap to employ, is a liability, not an asset, to 'common welfare' is not only an ideal, it has a practical value for our entire industrial and commercial life.

"Let us remember this all-important fact: If our immigration policy at present, as so shall our nation of the future be. The standard of living of these men will of necessity be the standard of living of American laborers of the future; just as we have seen that the physical and mental qualities of the immigrant become those of the nation of the next generation.

"What kind of a political citizen does the new immigrant make in our American democracy? The answer is around the world. He never becomes a citizen at all, for the percentage of southern Europeans who take out their naturalization papers is much smaller than that among the northern Europeans. Of Germans, Irish, Scandinavians, Britons and Americans, from 60 to 75 percent are citizens. Of Italians and Poles, less than 30 percent. The immigration commission reported that only a little more than half of the newer immigrants ever learn even to speak the English language. How can they mingle in the discussions of American politics without it?

Read Foreign Language Papers

"No, if they read at all, they read papers from our over-growing foreign-language press; and for social fellowship they join some racial immigrant organization. Such conditions do not make the right kind of citizens of the United States.

"Suppose the Latin or Slavic immigrant does take out his naturalization papers and become an American citizen. In rare cases he may turn out to be one of the best we have, imbibing the true American spirit of independence, of freedom from enslaving traditions, of conscientious participation in the great objects of citizenship. But much more often he becomes an American only in name. His political interests and ideals are still those of the country from which he came; his views are molded by those of his fellow-immigrants and by the nationalistic and often anti-American foreign-language papers which he reads.

"In national affairs he is a menace to free America; in state or local affairs he tends to become a menace to the peace and good will of the houses. This is a grave reality, which is evident in every election. It is the understanding of the part of the revolutionary patriots of 1776 that public affairs were paramountly important, that the government was the all-important element in human life that made them ready to give everything, even their lives, to the enterprise of creating a new thing upon the earth—a government of, by and for the people, resting on their consent and organized to secure the common welfare. That is the kind of Americans we should be. Too far, God knows, have we all known—have American citizens fallen below that high ideal of patriotism. Ours is a movement to raise these heights of understanding and devotion. Will a continued flood tide of these newer immigrants help us?

Can Not Ignore Fundamental Facts "Italy produced her Garibaldi; Poland her Kosciuszko; Athens of old, names that will shine through all time. But those who are coming to us in these modern days from these regions of the earth are not any. There is one more argument frequently given for unrestricted immigration which remains to be considered. This is the sentimental appeal, often advanced, that America who has her gates open to the poor and oppressed of every land. Naturally this argument makes a strong appeal to freedom-loving Americans whose hearts go out in sympathy to the aspirations of the less fortunate across the sea.

"But it can have no place in determining the immigration policy to be followed today. We cannot afford to ignore the fundamental fact that to admit the oppressed of other lands today would operate, in the distant future, only to work worse oppression on our own citizens. To the people already in America we owe a greater duty and one which we can not ignore. Further than this, it is extremely doubtful whether permitting the unrestricted flow of immigrants would be of real benefit, either to the immigrants themselves or the countries from which they come. The millions of Europe and Asia to emigrate here now are we likely to help in any way the coming political and social reforms in Armenia, in Russia or in Turkey? The mere stating of the problem argues for a restriction of immigration to show the false basis of altruism on which the so-called sentimental argument is based.

"No, my friends, there is no escape from a rigid selective restriction of immigration at the present time, if we are to have a healthy and a healing light to the nations of the world.

Rigid Restriction Necessary

"If a way can be found to admit only those immigrants who are not harmful; if the great army of untrained and unskilled labor can be selected of the fit, rigid restriction of the unfit, this is the only immigration policy which can save America today. Any other policy will invite inevitable destruction to what may be called the 'American race'—the American standard of economic and political life.

"The problem confronts us now as never before. The new congress must adopt a permanent immigration law to take the place of the so-called three percent law, which called for a new law. "It is a grave responsibility which is faced today by those representatives and senators who are soon to decide on a permanent immigration policy for the United States. The effect of their decision is not for the next few months or years, but for the future generations. It was the thoughtless importation of African slaves in the early days of the republic that later brought on a Civil War which has left this nation in twain, and which leaves a heritage in the form of a negro problem today that is a constant stumbling block to national progress. So the unchecked importation now of hordes of southern Europeans will bring its inevitable and equally disastrous heritage to the character of the American nation of the future. The immigration policy which we adopt today will not produce its vital effects at once; these will come a generation or two later, and the American citizenry, American standards of living and American qualities of manhood and womanhood of that time will be largely determined upon the character of the racial stock that today we permit to become the percentage of the nation.

Americans Must Rally

"Every true American must rally to the colors in this struggle to save America—a struggle perhaps even more serious than that which we waged in the Civil War, because its insidiousness and concealed nature make the danger less apparent. The fate of the American nation today hangs in the balance just as truly as during the great battle of Gettysburg sixty years ago."

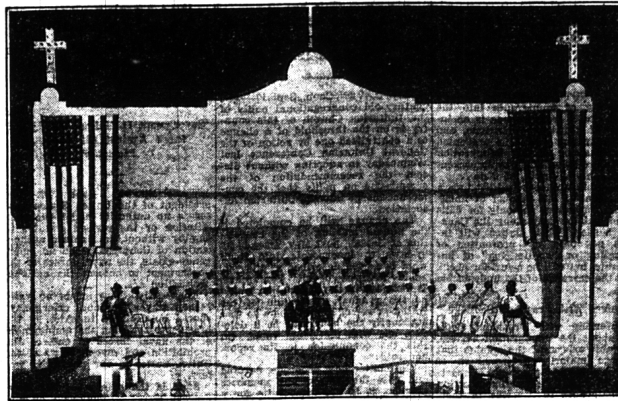

ABBOTT FUND NOW IS BEING CREATED

Would Care for Little Children of Klansmen Murdered by Religious Fanatics

(Special to Fiery Cross)

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 17.—The Ku Klux Klan headquarters has issued an appeal to the Klansmen of the country, inviting contributions for the support of the widow and children of Thomas R. Abbott, the Klansman who met death at Carnegie, Pa., from the hands of a mob of Roman Catholic sympathizers who attacked a peaceable Klan procession August 25 in that city.

The Imperial Night Hawk, the official publication of the Klan, will receive contributions for the purpose of establishing a trust fund for the support of Mrs. Thomas R. Abbott of Atlanta, Ga., and her two small children. This trust fund will be administered by Sam H. Venable, Imperial treasurer, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan. Checks and contributions should be made and mailed to the Imperial Night Hawk, post office box 1204, Atlanta, Ga. They will be acknowledged in the columns of the Klan official publication.

Indignation is voiced because of the recent acts of violence committed against the Klan by avowed Roman Catholics and their sympathizers has stirred the minds of the people. The work of mobs in various states has resulted in a wave of passionate protest against the lawlessness of religious fanatics which does not subside. This feeling has gained force through the action of Pennsylvania officials, who view so tolerantly the murder of a Klansman.

GOSHEN, Ind., Sept. 15.—A crowd of approximately 8,000 persons gathered about six miles south of here recently at a meeting held by the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan in which a large class of candidates were naturalized in the initiation ceremonies of the Invisible Empire.

ALEXANDRIA, Ind., Sept. 15.—Following a parade consisting of 300 Klansmen in full regalia, an initiation was held here recently by the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan in which a large number of candidates took the oath of Americanism by the light of a bright Fiery cross. After the initiation, a large display of fireworks concluded the evening ceremonies.

KLANSMEN TO MARCH WITH RAISED VISORS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 15.—The Ku Klux Klan will parade down Pennsylvania avenue early in September.

No visors will be worn by Klansmen because of the law passed by the commissioners prohibiting the use of them on parade. District of Columbia Klansmen have complete charge of the parade and more than 20,000 members are expected to march down the historic avenue. Women of the Ku Klux Klan will participate in the parade along with the male membership. High officials of the order from all sections of the country will be in the nation's capital for the demonstration. More than 5,000 government employes, members of the Klan, are expected to form the main body of the marching legions.

Fiery Cross Seen 2,000 Feet Above Town

KEYSER, W. Va., Sept. 13.—The Knights of the Ku Klux Klan burned a cross on the crest of the Alleghenies last week, the largest ever seen in this part of the country. It was located 3,277 feet above sea level and 2,418 feet higher than the city of Keyser. The cross was approximately 50 feet high with wide cross arms.

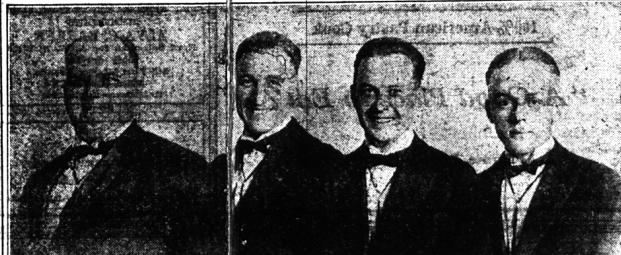

CABLE WOULD HALT SMUGGLING OF ALIENS

Says "Bootlegging" Immigrants Is Becoming Serious—Will Present New Bill

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—That smuggling of immigrants into the United States from Canada is an industry of growing proportions, and that it can and should be prevented by extensions of the immigration service are beliefs held by Representative John L. Cable, of Ohio.

Mr. Cable proposes to introduce a bill increasing the number of immigration inspectors not only for Ellis Island, but for any along the Canadian border. Their duties will include not only the prevention of smuggling or "bootlegging" of immigrants, but will be a further check upon the entrance of the undesirable alien.

Confers With President Coolidge

Conferring with President Coolidge on the immigration service, Mr. Cable expressed the opinion that a large majority of members of Congress would oppose the Department of Labor's plan for selection of immigrants to America in their home lands, on the ground that such a procedure would involve the making of treaties with countries affected, which countries themselves were not in favor of the proposed selection.

Only U. S. Vise Necessary

In spite of this opinion, friends of the idea in Congress are pressing confidently forward in the belief that the very opposition of foreign countries to the selection of immigrants before and not after embarkation is a reason for insisting upon it, and with the idea that no treaty is necessary, and that the refusal of an American visa is all that is required to enforce American selection ideas upon those whom inspectors abroad consider undesirable.

UNITARIANS TO JOIN WITH AMERICAN BODY

Vote Decides Action—Change to Be Completed in May of 1924

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Sept. 17.—The century-old congressional policy of the Unitarian Church of this country is on the threshold of a change to a centralized one by action of the Unitarian Conference last Wednesday in adopting without dissent the recommendation of the commission on polity that the conference merge into the Unitarian Association.

The change will be completed at the annual meeting of the association at Boston, next May, amends its by-laws to incorporate into itself what has been described as the valuable features of the conference. One change in the association would be the gradual elimination of the voting power of its members 40 to eventually the body will be a delegate one with individual votes. On this the commission in its report had said:

"No matter how generous, devoted and wise the body of life members may be, it is a democracy for a part to legislate for the whole."

Action Came Unexpectedly

The unanimous action of the conference came after an unexpectedly short session. In the program the entire day had been set apart for discussion of the report because of importance of the proposed change. The delegates sat in the hallways with the conference officers on the day. Dr. Griffin, of Philadelphia, made a report. There seemed to be no one to express objection to the changes and action was carried affirmatively by a vote of 100 to 0.

The Rev. Dr. Samuel Eliot, president of the association, voiced it was believed, the sentiment of the body by an expression of desire to cooperate in carrying through the merger. This cleared away any doubt that was entertained as to the result.

The shortened session of the conference gave delegates opportunity to attend other meetings, several of which were held informally by other organizations in the denomination meeting here.

Wednesday night the general conference held a platform meeting at which Dean C. H. Brown, of Yale Divinity College; Arthur E. Morgan, president of Antioch College; Dr. Franklin C. Southworth, president of Middlebury Theological School; and the Rev. H. E. B. Spaight, of King's Chapel, Boston, were the speakers.

Scores Existing Order

The last named declared that the time had come when, in dealing with students, "purposes which are ecclesiastical rather than religious." He maintained that a principle which is designed to lead students to become part of the existing ecclesiastical order, to hold or win them to some particular group, is out of date.

His was one of three addresses dealing with "Religion and Youth," and much of it described the student conference (Unitarian) at the Isles of Shoals in July, at which seventy-five national institutions were represented.

KLANSMEN PARADE AT NORTH SALEM, IND.

NORTH SALEM, Ind., Sept. 18.—This city was jammed to capacity last Monday when the Klans of the Ku Klux Klan held a demonstration which included patriotic speaking and a spectacular parade that marched through the business district of the town.

A public address was given by a well-known speaker who explained to students the principles of the Klan and who was received with tremendous applause by his attentive listeners.

The parade, interspersed with bands, flying banners, symbols of Americanism, and beautiful floats, made an impressive sight as the long line of Klansmen in full regalia made their way along the line of march. Packed along the sidewalks were multitudes of Americans who cheered the marchers as they passed along. Every available parking space in town was taken, and those who did not come early were forced to park outside of the corporation limits where machine gun lined up all roads for more than a half mile.

NAVY IS NOT TO DO 'BOOTLEG DUTY,' SAYS PRES. COOLIDGE

Sea Fighters of America for Purpose of Maintaining Peace

"Government Is Making Steady Advance Against All Lawless Elements"

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—The president of the United States possesses no authority under the constitution or the revised statutes to employ without the express authorization of Congress, when no emergency exists, the naval forces of the government to enforce the national prohibition act.

Apparently, there exists no valid reason why a "national emergency" should be declared, and by the president justifying the employment of the naval forces to enforce the prohibition and revenue laws of the United States in our territorial waters.

Such is the opinion of Attorney-General Harry M. Daugherty as submitted to President Coolidge in compliance with a request made by the late President Harding for an official opinion concerning the power possessed by the president of the United States to utilize the armed naval forces of the government to combat the unlawful traffic in liquor in the territorial waters of the United States.

Funds Are Lacking

Mr. Daugherty also explains, in his opinion, that there is no appropriation of money made by Congress (available for such purposes) that there seems to have been only one instance in the history of the country in times of profound peace when Congress did authorize the use of naval vessels to enforce the civil and criminal statutes of the United States.

States directed against individuals and when and where no emergency existed.

This was in connection with the suppression of the importation of slaves into the United States. The attorney-general further explains that an emergency authorizing the present to call the military and naval forces to execute the laws exist only when by reason of unlawful obstruction, combinations or assemblies of persons, or rebellion against the authorities of the United States it becomes impracticable in the judgment of the president to enforce the laws by the ordinary course of executive or judicial proceedings.

Emergency Is Declared

"There can be no emergency," said

Mr. Daugherty, "authorizing the president to call out the naval forces to enforce civil and criminal laws until the courts and the civil departments of the government are no longer able to enforce them."

"While there have been numerous violations of the national prohibition act, both on land and within our territorial waters, there have been no unlawful obstructions of the functions of the courts or restraint of their processes, or of the coast guard, the division of customs, the prohibition unit, nor of the marshals and their deputies of the department of justice. All the departments of the government are functioning and making a steady advance against lawless elements."
