## BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

Public General Bills and Resolutions introduced in the 93d Congress of the United States concerning the impeachment inquiry and all related matters. These are arranged by broad general subject categories.

## Executive Privilege

S. 858. Introduced by J. William Fulbright. February 15, 1973.

A Bill to amend title 5, United States Code, with regard to the availability to the Congress and the General Accounting Office of information to the executive branch of the Government.
